"He has finished his investigation," said the Solicitor, "and we have no further need for him. A detective is one thing and a witness is another. His investigation led us to witnesses. It is not necessary for him, or any detective, to tell the jury what a disinterested witness will tell."

Burns Man Works Quietly. The Burns investigator who took up the case Friday morning has not yet reported to the office of the Solicitor. He is quietly and systematically working out his own idea of the case after a comprehensive outline given him by Colonel Thomas B. Fox. He has succeeded so far in keeping his identity secret.

Colonel Fisher was confident the Burns agency would be successful in concluding the Phagan case.

"We will have the slayer in less than a month," said Colonel Fisher. "I am confident the Burns men will meet with every success. With Mr. Burns in Europe, the man he has sent to Atlanta is certainly the best detective in America. He has been of the Burns work in this country and is his chief right-hand man. Mr. Burns himself will be on the scene shortly after June 1, and then in a confident case will have cleared up beyond any shadow of a doubt."

Proposed Church Amalgamation of National Bodies Applauded Wildly in Convention United Presbyterian Churches of North America To Be New Name of Combination

Completion of Union Goes Over for a Year for Final Perfection of Details.

Plans for the union of the Southern and United Presbyterian Assemblies, which, if effected, will precipitate one of the most momentous changes in the history of religious work in the United States, were submitted to those bodies at their morning sessions Saturday.

The new body will be known as the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Churches of North America.

Committees were appointed by both bodies with instructions to hold a joint conference with a view to bringing about the amalgamation.

Dr. J. W. Blagg, President of the United Presbyterian Churches of North America, presided at the convention.

The union of the two churches will result in a new body with a membership of over 10 million.

In the United Church who can not give an unqualified assent to the doctrinal system contained in these standards. The united church would bear complete testimony to the following doctrine as essential parts of the standard system: (a) The integrity of the Holy Scriptures. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are to be received as the very word of God, and their authority is to be recognized as the only infallible rule of faith and life.

"Father and Son One." "Our Lord Jesus Christ is not only the Son of God in respect to His nature, but also the Son of God in respect to His Father, but with the Father, and with the Holy Spirit."

"Our Lord Jesus Christ, who is God, has in Himself the two distinct dominions with which He has been

invested by the Father as the reward of His sufferings. These are: A dominion over the church, which He is the living head and lawgiver and source of all that divine influence and authority by which He sustains and governs; and also a dominion over all created persons and things which are subject to Him in subsequence to the manifestation of God's glory in the system of redemption and the inheritance of His church.

Attestment for Sin. (d) As to the constitution of the person of our Redeemer, the Scriptures plainly teach that He was conceived by the Holy Ghost in the womb of the Virgin Mary and was born without a human father. He lived a life of perfect obedience, and the shedding of His blood made full atonement for sin and purchased redemption for His people.

(e) The Holy Spirit, the third person of the Trinity, eternally proceeding from the Father and the Son, the divine operation accompanying the word, so act on the soul as to quicken, regenerate and sanctify it; it is His to take of the things of Christ and show them unto men; and without His direct operation the soul would not yield to the motives which present.

In His gracious work, the Holy Spirit is the revealer of the truth and the comforter of the believer. In addition to these essential truths we covenant to join our ecclesiastical bodies in organic unity.

The Articles. "The doctrinal standards now held in common by these two churches, viz., the Westminster Confession of Faith, the Larger and Shorter Catechisms and the doctrinal standards of the United Presbyterian Church of North America, do find a common standing ground in the following statements, and upon the basis of these fundamental truths we covenant to join our ecclesiastical bodies in organic unity."

On Singing Psalms. There is a difference in the historic faith and practice of the two churches touching the matter of psalms in the worship of God. The one church holds the belief that the Book of Psalms is the perfect and divinely authorized ministry of praise, and such is to be used in worship to the exclusion of all devotional compositions of uninspired persons.

The other, while believing that the Psalms of Scripture were designed for permanent use in the church, and should have a large place in Christian worship, holds that other compositions that are in harmony with the principles of Scripture may, with propriety and profit, be used in congregational singing.

Believe Pastors Inspired. We believe that the Pastor of the Church, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, is an inspired man of prayer, and that the Spirit of God indwells each of these souls to be used in the worship of God to the end of time. The United Church will, therefore, take immediate steps to introduce to all its congregations, by introducing and recommending the Psalms of David in the best metrical version of praise, but while strongly commending the use of the Psalms, it is agreed that each church in our respective synods shall be allowed in the matter of congregational singing the same liberty which it now enjoys.

Single Vote to Honor Christ. Finally, recognizing that it is impossible to make specific provision for all cases of difference that may arise, it is understood that these churches enter the union in the spirit of mutual confidence and Christian love, and with the view to the honor of Christ and the extension of His Kingdom.

Rosillo, Obscure Airman, Accomplishes Feat First Time in Teeth of Gale.

RIVAL IN RACE, DELAYED, TRIES TO KILL HIMSELF

Great Through Greats Daring Bird-Man on Early Morning Arrival in Havana.

KEY WEST, May 17.—In a flight which compares to that with any other ever made on the North American continent, Domingo Rosillo, an obscure young Cuban aviator, flew over the Gulf of Mexico from here to Havana, Cuba, 80 miles away, in a noisy airplane, winning the \$10,000 prize offered by the Havana Municipal Council for the first man to cross the gulf.

Leaving the terminal of the East Coast Railroad in a gale of wind at 5:25 o'clock Rosillo skimmed across the intervening stretch of turbulent water without any mishap.

A sensational and dramatic incident, which almost cost a human life, attended the start of the flight.

Rival Thrifts Succeeded.

Augustine Paris, another aviator who was to race the gulf with Rosillo, attempted to leave the starting line but abandoned the flight for fear of the high wind and roughness of the water.

Paris, in desperation, pulled a pistol from his pocket and aiming the weapon against his forehead, threatened to kill himself unless he was allowed to start. Rosillo took the weapon from him.

Wied Held Plane Down.

The aviator then entered his machine, which had been equipped with pontoons and which rested on the surface of the water. The wind was so high, however, that the aeroplane would not rise, and the wires holding the pontoons snapped.

Meanwhile Rosillo, who had got a flying start, had disappeared in a whirling eddy, backing a skillful wind that threatened to send his aeroplane crashing upon the water.

A great crowd gathered to see the aviator start, but in account of the wind and the choppy sea it was believed that neither man would attempt a flight. As a result Rosillo sent a radio telegram to Morris Castle asking after the condition of the weather of the Cuban coast.

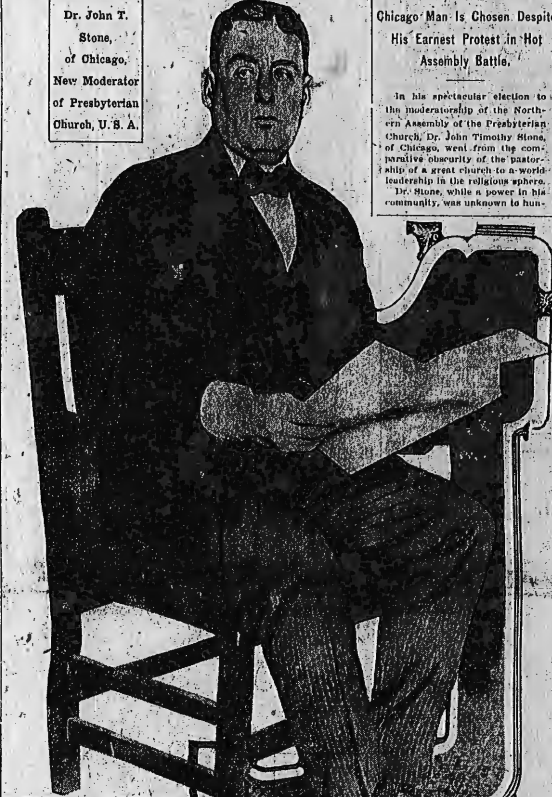
