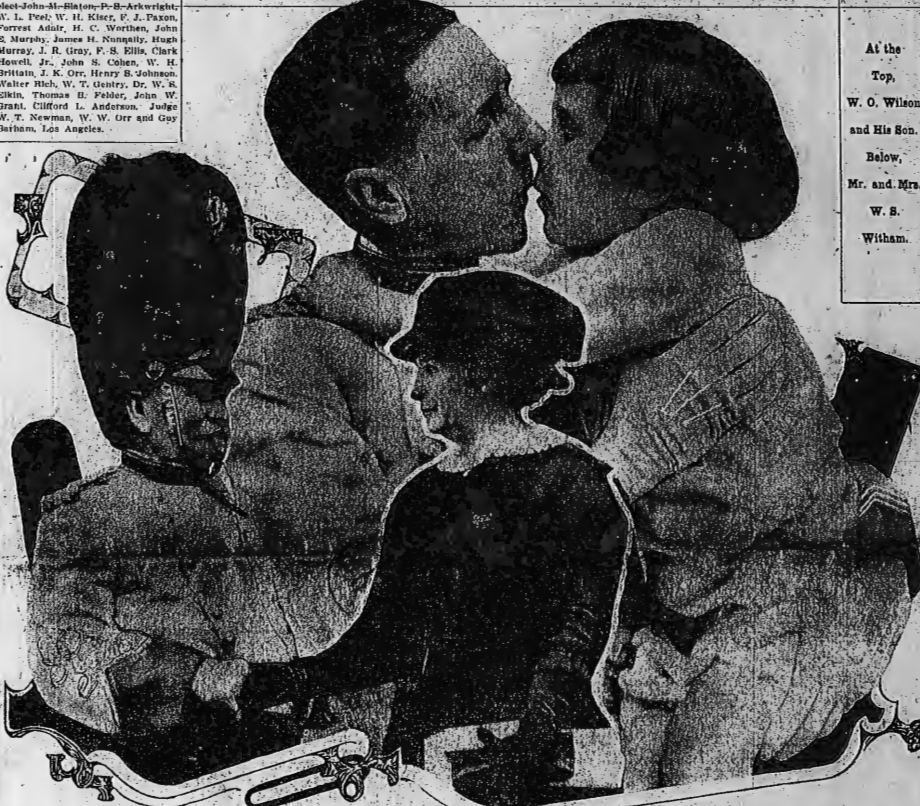
## Mr. Hearst Guest At Luncheon Given By Robt. F. Maddox

## PHAGAN THEORY

**Famous Detective's Aid, C. W. Tobie, Issues 'First Statement' on Work in Slaying Case.**

C. W. Tobie, manager of the criminal department of the W. J. Burns Detective Agency, Monday made public his theory of the murder of Mary Phagan for the first time. He said the man who is representing Burns in Atlanta's greatest mystery until the noted detective arrived contacted at the 1200 post office.

Tobie's theory is that Mary Phagan was murdered inside the National Pencil plant, by some one familiar with the premises, and that her body was dragged to the basement for purposes of concealment and probably destruction. He accounted the fact that she was killed on the outside and dragged inside, and declared that too much business has been given out by men who have only muddled the works.

While no new arrests are expected immediately, Tobie declared the mystery is not at all impossible to solve, and that the guilty man will be apprehended in due time. Meanwhile, he promised to issue statements telling the progress made from time to time.

Burns Express's Theory.  
Here is Tobie's theory as set forth in a *Georgiaian* report of Monday.

Mary Phagan, while in the pencil factory was approached by some one who made an attempt to molest her. She refused, and the man made an attempt to force her. She screamed and the man struck her, burning her against a machine, the impact causing her skull wound.

Seeing the injury, he had indicated the assault become deadly. If the man had not been seen, he would have been sentenced to the penitentiary. Actual murder and prompt disposition of the body offered the only possible explanation, he concluded to do. He completed his work by about a half around the 14-year-old girl's neck and strangling her.

The body was then taken to the basement of the factory, Tobie thinks, because the murderer intended to incinerate it.

There was no fire in the furnace, not enough time was too long. The next possible cause was the manufacture evidence that the murder had been committed on the eighth and the body dragged to the eighth basement floor and dragged the body to make it look like had been brought in from the outside.

The door was opened from the inside, said Tobie. "All the above-mentioned facts indicate that the murder was committed by some one familiar with the factory, one who had probably worked there, and the body was taken to the basement to hide the crime. The hole found there was written for this purpose, also, a hole in the wall."

Big Development Expected.  
Hurredly conference Monday afternoon between Solicitor DeLoach and Chief of Detectives Lanford and other members of the Burns detective agency, persistent reports about the position in the Phagan case were expected to bring the attention of the state in the case.

Neither of the officials, however, would discuss the case, saying only that they had held a conference, and that they were following the case.

'WHITE SLAVERS' ORGANIZED IN NEW YORK

Rockefeller Vice Report Shows Trade in Women is Established on Commercial Basis.

NEW YORK, May 9.—White slavery in the city of New York is established upon a commercial basis, and those engaged in it are organized and controlled according to the report of George J. Kneeland, of the Bureau of Social Hygiene, of which John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is executive, made public today.

Investigators found that an immense trade was not only the alternative of starvation. They did, however, find that the great predominance of white women came from the ranks of those engaged in unskilled occupations. Hundreds of immoral resorts were investigated and hundreds of proprietors and inmates investigated. It is the estimate of George J. Kneeland, that there are not less than 15,000 fallen women in New York City.

Many Found in Streets. The tabulation showed that 8,550 were found in the streets and 1,911 in immoral resorts, tenements, massage parlors, hotels, saloons, concert halls, etc. The report estimates that fully 80 per cent are discarded.

Men who procure girls act as "light-houses," own resorts, rent their property for immoral purposes and "draw up" these girls as described. Men seen to be the real centers of most of the evil resorts, and are described as the "king" of these vice houses of ill fame.

Working Investigation. Mr. Kneeland, with a trained body of social workers, has been working since he probed into the underworld of Chicago, Philadelphia and New York. His report will deal with these cities and with other parts of New York City. The report makes possible day-by-day work with Manhattan.

Others Also Banded Together. From the report by Mr. Kneeland it is evident that not only those who are engaged in vice as a business are banded together, but that the proprietors of establishments such as saloons, concert halls, a certain class of cabaret houses, "king" houses, theaters, amusement parks and excursion boats make an organized effort of catering to vice. Vice and alcohol are being banded together.

During the investigation, from January 21, 1912, to November 15, 1912, 1,232 parties were found and investigated and 1,112 resorts found, including 225 tenement houses. Furloughed rooms were used as houses of prostitution or as particularly dangerous. There are 100 massage parlors in New York City.

Public Dance Halls Scored. The public dance hall was found in New York City. It is reported that 1,000 of these halls reported an income of \$100,000 in 1912 and that 24,000 were engaged in the industry.

These dances are attended by many thousands who are engaged in legitimate recreation, and the halls are usually well managed. These powers that prey upon the public have been investigated and found to be organized. A list of these halls and their owners is being prepared. The report also contains a detailed description of the "vice" houses of the city.

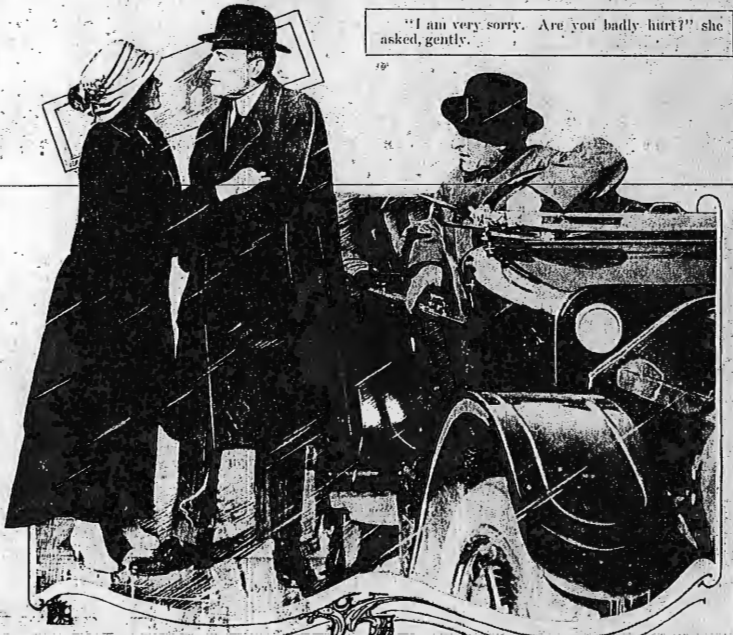

BURNS EAGER TO SOLVE PHAGAN CASE

Famous Detective Expected to Arrive From Europe and Start Work Before June 1.

STARTLING NEW EVIDENCE IS REPORTED DISCOVERED

Important Revelation Looked For To-day—Search Being Pushed With Renewed Vigor.

Colonel Thomas B. Felder announced Monday morning that he had received word from William J. Burns that he would arrive in America before June 1 and would probably be on the scene of the Phagan slaying before that date.

"Colonel Felder said the great detective had taken an unusual interest in the Phagan mystery and he would be surprised to hear from him in America any day soon.

"Burns is more interested in this case than I have known him to be in another," said Colonel Felder. "I am certain that he will hasten his return from Europe on this account and be in America some days before June 1. He will, of course, come direct to Atlanta.

"The meantime developments since his departure have been more than satisfactory. The Burns detective convinced Mr. Dorsey Sunday afternoon that he had touched upon hitherto overlooked evidence of importance, and in his report today we expect valuable information."

Search Grows More Active. With investigation into the mystery more active Monday than it has been at any time during the last two weeks, the Solicitor was hopeful that important developments would be made during the day.

The special representative of the Burns agency was reported to have struck upon an important and heretofore overlooked clue that throws new light on the case. He will make a definite report at 11 o'clock this morning at the office of the Solicitor, when it is not unlikely some announcement will be made.

Colonel Fielder, the Burns detective case for several hours Sunday at the home of Colonel Felder. Rockefeller Vice Report Shows Trade in Women is Established on Commercial Basis.

NEW YORK, May 18.—White slavers in the city of New York established upon a commercial basis, and those engaged are thoroughly organized, according to the report of George J. Kneeland, of the Bureau of Social Hygiene, of which John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is chairman, made public today.

Investigators found that an immense life was being led in the city of New York. They did learn, however, that the great preponderance of fallen women are from the ranks of those engaged in unskilled occupations. Hundreds of immoral women were investigated and hundreds of proprietors and inmates interviewed. It is the conservative estimate of Mr. Kneeland that there are not less than 1,000 fallen women in New York City.

More Found in Street. The tabulation showed that 619 were found in the streets, 1,127 in immoral resorts, tenements, massage parlors, hotels, saloons, etc. The report estimates that fully 250,000 women are engaged in the "vice" business.

Man Procures Girls, act as "light-houses" and rendezvous for immoral purposes and "drum up" trade. They are described as being the real owners of most of the vice resorts, and are described as being "vice" dealers.

In making investigations, Mr. Kneeland, with a trained body of social investigators, are located in New York, the report says, many of which are believed to be for immoral purposes.

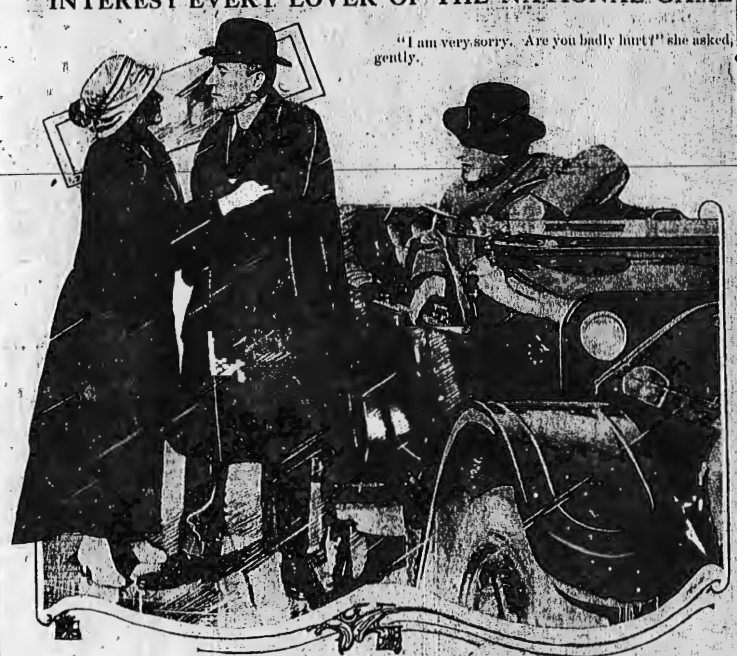

CHARGE OF HERESY STIRS NORTHERN PRESBYTERIANS

Teachings of the Union Theological Seminary Severely Attacked in Report to the Assembly.

Charge that heretical teachings are being spread in the Union Theological Seminary at New York, confronted the commissioners of the Northern Presbyterian Assembly at their session Monday afternoon.

The resolution was contained in one of the minority reports, already read by the majority, and was a rebuke to the Seminary for its teaching of relations between the church and the state.

The new teaching was stated in the report of the following paragraph: "Theology which denies the supernatural, that regards sin not as the result of an abstract transgression, but as a social act, and which regards man as a social being, and a type to which all men are subject, and which acknowledges man's superiority to nature, and which holds that the light is in him, is not the teaching of the Seminary."

The Northern Assembly had been in session at the Georgia state capital since Monday afternoon, and had brought about the election of Dr. John T. Moore as moderator.

The report of the committee on the Seminary was read by Dr. J. M. Wells, of Pittsburg, Pa., and was received with a great deal of interest.

Dr. Stone makes reply to his critics. The report of Dr. John T. Stone to the cry of "politics" in his election as moderator and a new proposal for the federation of the Presbyterian churches of America were the important items on the agenda.

Dr. Stone declared the introduction of personalities into the conference of the Assembly, but would not comment on length on the charge that he had been "dark horse" in being prepared for his work before the meeting of the Assembly.

Dr. W. H. King, of Monmouth, Ill., made the minority report. He said in part: "The report of the committee on the Seminary is a serious matter, and it is to be regretted that the Seminary has not been more open to the suggestions of its friends."

"Last Chapter of Heroes Never  
Will Be Written," Say  
Two of Party.

**WRIGHT AND DEBENHAM IN  
U. S. ON THEIR WAY HOME**  
Bodies of Explorers Buried Under  
Ice That Will Never  
Melt, They Say.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 18.—Fresh details of Captain Robert F. Scott's disastrous expedition to the South Pole are being related by Charles S. Wright and Frank Debenham, both scientists and geologists, who have just arrived from Sydney on the Union Steamship Tabiti.

The two men were at Cape Evans when the Scott expedition left for the dash to the pole, 800 miles away, and Wright was one of the party of eleven which later discovered the body of Captain Scott.

Wright refused to talk of the harrowing scene which greeted the survivors when they located the bodies of Captain Scott, Captain E. A. C. Oates and Lieutenant H. R. Bowers.

"The last chapter in the story of Captain Scott and his heroic comrades will still be written," said Wright. "Their death was too terrible for description. We do not intend to include any description of the death scenes in our official reports of the expedition. It would serve no purpose except to gratify a morbid curiosity."

"We decided to bury them where they died, because it would have been practically impossible to carry the bodies back to civilization." Besides, there would not have been any way in bringing the bodies back to England.

"The men had done their work well, and they were dead. We protected the tent which had served to protect them from the extreme cold of the interior of that terrible strait, and buried the bodies under a pile of ice that will never melt."

"We thought this action more fitting. A rescue was effected overlooking the ice barrier, and we turned our backs to civilization."

"The place is accessible in another expedition, should one be formed to explore the interior of the strait, but I doubt if any such expedition would ever be sent out."

The church he said, gives forth the hope that infants dying in infancy are saved, and that it is the duty of the church to provide for them.

Speaking again, Dr. McCreath referred to all references to the report of the committee and leave the report to recommend that no suggested amendment be sent down to the presbytery on that matter.
