CONLEY, GUILTY BY POLICE AGAIN, DENIES CONFESSING TO KILLING

A. S. Colyar Bears Out Negro's Denial of the Existence of Any New Affidavits as Charged Before Jury. Lanford Charges a Felder Plot.

Strenuous denials of any knowledge of the mysterious affidavit reported to have been made by Jim Conley, in which he was said to have confessed to A. S. Colyar that he murdered Mary Phagan, was made to Chief of Detectives Lanford Friday by both men.

Conley, on the grill, declared that he had never heard of Colyar and read his name in the newspapers in connection with the telegraph controversy. The negro said he had never either talked with him or seen him, and that he had at no time made an affidavit other than the ones given to the police.

Colyar made a similar denial. Following the examination, Lanford declared that the whole report was wholly without foundation. He also stated that Conley had reiterated the truth of his former affidavit and that there was nothing further to add to it.

"I attribute this report to Colonel Fowler's work," said the chief. "I merely gave assets that he had in league with the defense of Frank; the attorney to tell me to modify the waters of this investigation, to shield Frank and throw the blame on another."

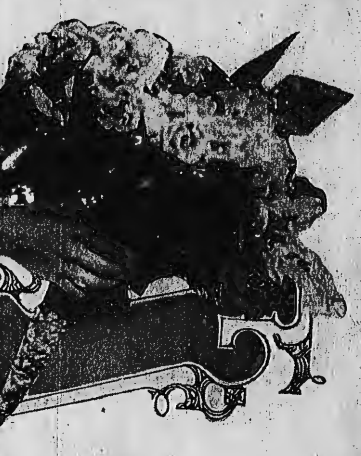
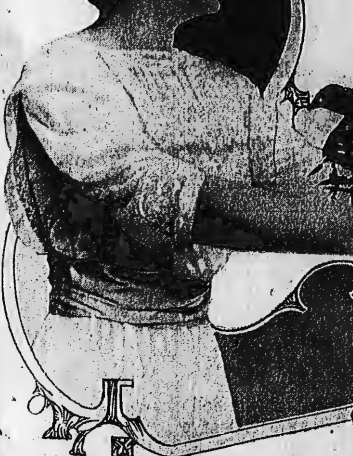

JACKSONVILLE, June 5.—Every step in clearing up the painter insurance mystery now hangs on the reports of chemical and pathological analysis of Painter's vital organs by Baltimore chemists, and to-day matters are at a standstill at Jacksonville end. Neither the coroner, insurance agents, the family nor the E. O. Painter Fertilizer Company is making a move, and none is in prospect until Baltimore is heard from. A veil of secrecy seems to shroud developments in Baltimore.

Painter's will was recorded for probate late this afternoon. It is a veiled document that gives no estimate as to the actual value of the estate left by the fertilizer manufacturer, who on May 22, lost his life in the St. Johns River, under mysterious circumstances. Less than \$4,000 in special bequests are specified, the remainder of the estate going to the widow and daughter who are named as joint administrators.

Of the special bequests, \$10,000 goes to relatives during the first time, that to receive the income only, the property to remain in the hands of his daughter and to revert to her upon her death. The other bequests are in the interest of horticultural, education and church and charitable purposes, except each employee of one year or more shall receive one month's salary at vacation time.

The will was probated before Judge H. B. Phillips county judge, after the widow, daughter and sister, Mrs. F. W. Williams, rumored to be Miss Painter's fiancée, had visited the court house together and inquired as to the procedure necessary. The application for probate was signed by Mrs. M. A. Painter, the widow, and Miss Oida Painter, his daughter.

Drawn Down Year Ago.
The first clause covers all his estate in that except amounts that are specified further on in the document. It was drawn February 10, 1911, and was witnessed by Madge Williams and W. L. Laman. 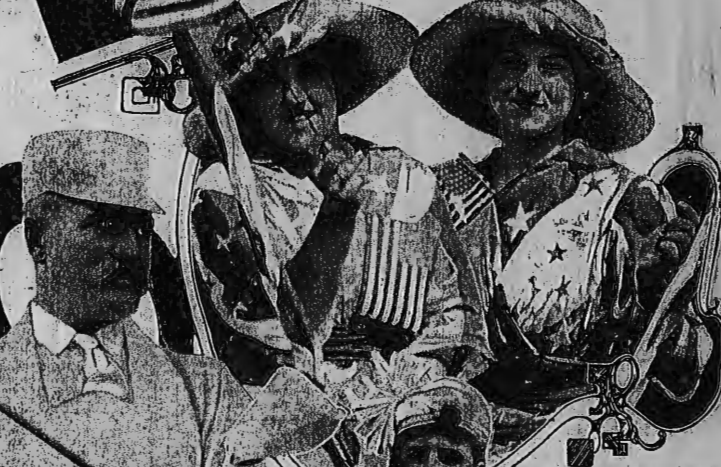
