MRS. FRANK ATTACKS SOLICITOR J. M. DORSEY IN NEW STATEMENT

Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey refused late Saturday afternoon to make reply to the reiterated accusations of Mrs. Leo M. Frank that "torture chamber" methods were made use of by the state to secure evidence from witnesses.

"I haven't had time to read Mrs. Frank's statement fully," declared Mr. Dorsey, "and even though I did read it, I do not know what she really means."

Mrs. Frank's second letter was made public Saturday morning and is as follows:

Atlanta Ga., June 7, 1913.

I think fairness to Mr. Frank requires that the public should clearly understand Mr. Dorsey's position as stated in his card in The Constitution of June 6, and repeated in the papers yesterday, in reply to my statement that he proposes to use testimony which comes from witnesses as the result of torture.

His real position, as gleaned from his card, can be stated in the following sentence which he employed:

"I have only to say, without in anywise taking issue with her premises as I might," that "I welcome all evidence from any source that will aid an impartial jury, under the charge of the court, in determining the guilt or innocence of the accused."

That is to say, he thinks it unnecessary to waste time in disputing the fact that the detectives are procuring testimony from witnesses by torture. He considers this point immaterial. He believes he is thoroughly justified in using tortured testimony, if it is turned over to him, for he says: "I welcome all evidence from any source."

No Charge Against Woman

The Journal and The Constitution stated that he had had my cook arrested and carried to his office and quizzed to such an extent as to drive her into hysterics, and that after this he sent her screaming to the police station in the patrol wagon. After she left his office she was taken to the detective's Torture Chamber, and according to The Atlanta Constitution, she was there had the third degree applied to her to the point of exhaustion, after which she made an affidavit, which the detective, or someone, immediately gave out to the papers.

The Solicitor had no charge against this cook and did not suspect her of any crime. Yet Mr. Dorsey wastes this aside as a trivial matter, not worthy to be discussed by him, because he says: "I welcome all evidence from any source that will aid an impartial jury, under the charge of the court, in determining the guilt or innocence of the accused."

That he and the detectives violated the criminal law in arresting her when they had no charge against her and when they suspected her of no crime, I am told by friends, admits of no doubt. But this, Mr. Dorsey thinks, need not be discussed by him.

Thinks Public Is Opposed

While Mr. Dorsey thinks all this entirely proper, it is the next thing to an impossibility to believe that many persons in the community will agree with him. Indeed, I would be surprised if a single person could be found who would agree with him. He would be surprised if he were in the newspapers, torture chamber testimony to take away a man's life.

When Mr. Dorsey introduces this third-degree evidence to the jury, can it be supposed that he will at the same time tell the jury that it comes direct from the torture chamber?

It is our time to suffer now. Can anyone tell whose turn will come next?

I do not wish to be in any manner bitter toward Mr. Dorsey, even in my feelings, because it is so perfectly clear that his action is dictated by a serious mistake of judgment, and my only purpose is to let the community understand as thoroughly as I can, the interests of fairness to a man's innocent husband, that Mr. Dorsey is proposing to use third-degree torture chamber testimony in an effort to take his life, and that he thinks it is perfectly proper for him to do so.

Know She Can Not Testify

Mr. Dorsey and the detectives know that I can not go on the witness stand and deny the affidavits they have published in the newspapers, wrong from my cook in the torture chamber by the third-degree process, because I am informed that under the law a wife will not be permitted to testify either for or against her husband. The law puts this absolute seal upon my lips, and my only recourse is in letting the community know the facts through the newspapers as far as I can.

I know I can not keep up with all the false affidavits and false rumors and innuendoes that have been so industriously put in the newspapers, but I feel that I should call attention to this instance to Mr. Dorsey's position, which by no boldy justice.

WILSON MAN IN PERSON REPLY TO LOBBYING CHARGE

Says He May Cast Aside Official Title to Defend Himself Against Attack.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—As a result of the attack of Senator Townsend, of Michigan, on the "lobbying" of President Wilson, the Chief Executive to-day is considering casting aside his official title and testifying before the senatorial investigation committee as a private citizen, both as to what he knows of the lobbying interests and also to defend himself against the attacks of Republican Senators.

Senator Townsend's charges that the President himself is lobbying for the passage of the Underwood tariff bill have aroused great resentment at the White House. Secretary of the President to-day said while he did not consider the Townsend charge serious enough to warrant an official reply from the President of the United States, he thought it likely that the President will testify as a private citizen.

Before deciding on such a step, however, the President will consult with several of his Senatorial advisers, and it is considered probable that the White House will be up before the lobby committee and deny and without warning, it is admitted that the President had occasional fits in the extreme because of a number of careful investigations of the lobby situation before making his denunciation of the lobbyists, which started the Congressional investigation.

Committee Against Recalling Senators.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—Democratic Senators on the Overman lobby investigating committee to-day expressed the opinion that the admission of Senator Townsend that he had no specific information on which to base his accusation of lobbying against President Wilson has made it unnecessary to recall Senators who have testified.

"I see no reason for recalling those Senators who have testified," said Senator Reed, acting chairman of the investigating committee. WILSON, TOO, A LOBBYIST, CHARGE OF SENATOR

Townsend Attacks the President for Using "Undue Influence" on Legislators

WASHINGTON, June 7.—President Wilson was branded a lobbyist by Senator Townsend of Michigan, Republican, at the Overman lobby, in city yesterday.

"The actions of President Wilson concern nearest my definition of a lobbyist," said Townsend. "I am certain that some Senators will not vote as their conscience dictates for the administration."

Letters and telegrams alleged to prove that a sugar and wool lobby has succeeded in influencing the Senators were shown by Senator Townsend of Colorado.

Townsend said he has received thousands of communications, some of them threatening him with political attack should he oppose their interests in his State.

Senator Townsend criticized the committee for not having asked members of the Senate whether the President had sought to influence them, and declared that even though the President had not intended it, his recent denunciation of "lobbies" working in support of citizens in the Senate would force certain Senators to vote against amendments they knew to be just.

"Who are these Senators?" demanded Senator Reid.

"I don't care to name anyone," rejoined Senator Townsend.

The two Democratic members of the committee present, Reid and Wood, raised no objection to the President Wilson had used patronage or threats to force anyone to support the sugar or wool lobby, or to support the bill as a whole.

Senator Townsend insisted the committee had not asked any Senator if he intended the President had tried to influence him.

Interrupted Senator Wood, "In view of the definite statements touching the Executive by any Senator who has already testified may be recalled and referred in reference thereto."

Senator Reid, Senator Wood, and every member of the committee agreed.
