Cost of Staples Up From May 1 Level

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The average price received by producers of the United States for staple crops increased about 1.3 per cent from May 1 to June 1, which compares with an increase of 1.2 per cent in the same period a year ago and an average increase of 3.4 per cent, during May of the past five years. On June 1, prices for staple crops averaged about 28.0 per cent lower than on like date of 1912, 5.1 per cent lower than 1911, 1.3 per cent lower than 1910, and 12.3 per cent lower than 1909, on like date.

SNOW FALLS JUNE 10 AS MERCURY DROPS

Atlanta Has Its Record Summer Cold Wave—Thermometer Hits 54 Mark.

Snow was falling in Atlanta at 8 o'clock Tuesday—at least nine out of ten persons said it was snow, and it felt like it. Standing at 57 degrees Monday night the mercury tumbled three degrees by morning. A cold rain, taken by many for snow, driven on a high wind pressure still lower right through Tuesday. That the average will run below that of Monday, which was 58, is almost certain.
