### REYNOLDS QUIT WITH WILSON

Attorney General's Split With President Open Secret as Capital-Resignation Expected.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The first sign of the anticipated friction between President Wilson's cabinet and the President's official family is preparing to appear, and as a result Washington to-day confidently awaits the news that a member of the President's official family is preparing to resign. Attorney General J. C. McReynolds is the man, rumor says, is getting ready to quit the cabinet because of trouble with the chief.

The friction between the President and the Attorney General dates back almost to the inauguration. The President considers that the work of the Department of Justice should be kept entirely secret. "Private publicity," according to the President, is invited to apply to the operations of all of the governmental branches except the Department of State and Justice—the former because international politics is not thought to be a matter for exploitation in the public prints, the latter because of the danger of warlike rumors about the Department of State and the Department of Justice.

The Attorney General had other ideas, which he did not hesitate to express to his chief, who, as undoubtedly disagreeable to him, there were a number of "leaks" in the Department of Justice. The results of the proposed procedure of the tobacco trust and a number of other legal cases which the Government intended to take against the violators of the Sherman anti-trust law found their way into the newspapers.

President Wilson objected. The Attorney General replied that he was running the department, and intended that should the President find fault with the manner in which the most important cases were conducted that he would step down and let some one else handle the cases. He said he would not be a party to any conference with the President.

The President held several private conferences with his prosecutor last week. To-day he called him into the White House early in the morning, and after several maneuvers intended to keep the interview private, finally consulted with the Attorney General in his study, after which he told the newspaper men that he was leaving the White House "for the day."

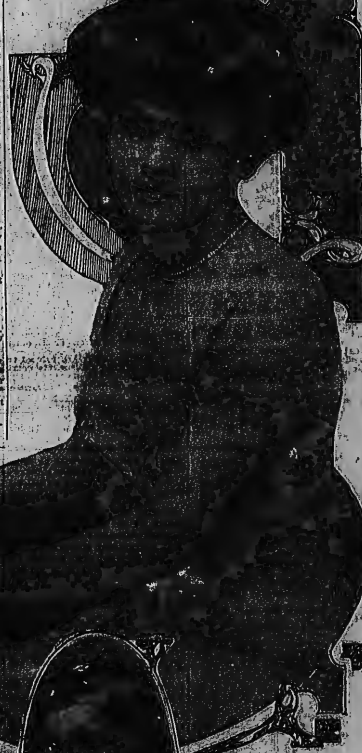
