SYRACUSE IS FAVORITE OF UNIVERSITY EIGHT

POUGHKEEPSIE, June 21--Syracuse won the variety eight boat race last afternoon. The other crews finished as follows: Cornell, second; Washington third; Wisconsin fourth; Columbia fifth; Pennsylvania sixth. Time, 19:22.3.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 21--Cornell's great water men won the first two-thirds of the annual regatta here this afternoon in a masterly style. The variety four captured a comparatively easy victory, but the freshmen eight won their race in a grinding finish which showed the stuff that will make Cornell's future variety crew.

Wisconsin was second in the freshman eight race; Syracuse third; Pennsylvania fourth; Columbia fifth; Washington sixth. The time was 19 minutes and 44 seconds.

Cornell won by a length and a half the variety four race, the first event of the regatta. Cornell was second, Columbia third, Pennsylvania fourth and Washington fifth. The official time was 19 minutes 47.1 seconds.

Syracuse collided with a stake boat. The sky was slightly overcast but a calm veil of clouds and the river lay still and quiet under the dead weight of a hot sun.

About 10,000 people sat on the banks on the high hills and railway embankments and watched the regatta after the afternoon. The observation train on the west bank were crowded to the last inch and crowds of persons watched the races from the river craft which lined the course from the railroad bridge, a mile down the stream, to the fish mark.

Syracuse Takes Lead.
At 4:10 they were all lined up waiting for instructions from the referee; Syracuse took the water first and had half a length lead before the start.

At the half mile from the finish was a terrific race. Cornell hit up the stroke and in the last ten yards she hit a terrific spurt and won by a clear length and a half. Pennsylvania rowed magnificently and Wisconsin showed surprising stamina and speed.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 21--A threatening morning gave way to a warm sunbath and at noon large patches of blue showed through the broken clouds.

According to the oldest experts, the three in Poughkeepsie this year are the mildest that have been thrown in the annals of college rowing. In this assertion is borne out by the stoomy aspect of light spectators and the distress of bookmakers.

Cornell Big Favorite.
Odds offered are 4 to 1 that Cornell will beat Columbia. Cornell's delay is looked against the field at even money, but not the field against Cornell at the same odds. Now a bet to back the field against Cornell at any odds, but offers 5 to 1 on the chance of any of them other than these two.

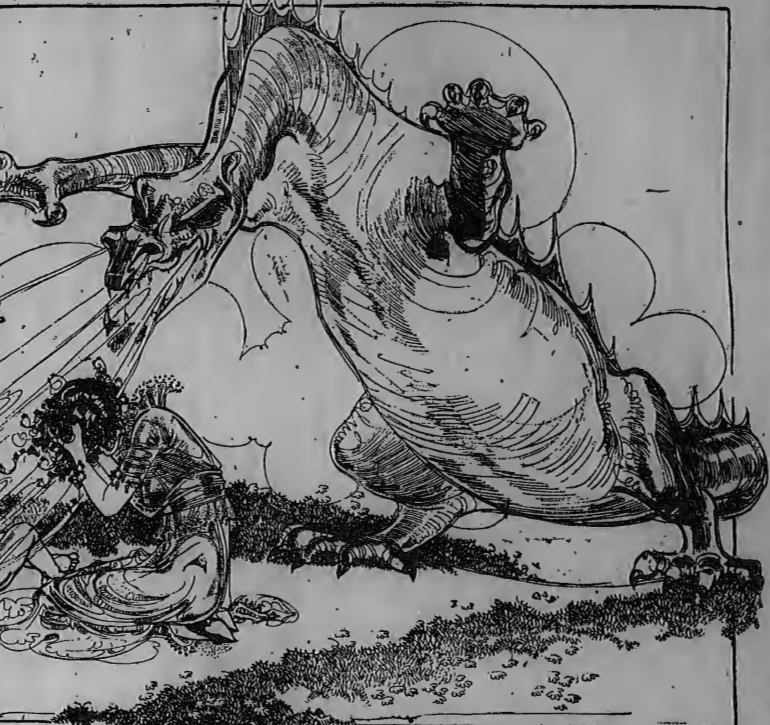

Forecast for Atlanta and Georgia—Generally fair Saturday and Sunday.

One Town Is Hotter, At Any Rate, Than Sweltering Atlanta.

With the thermometer up to 90 at noon and still rising, Atlanta was one of the few places in the country unharmed with a hot wave Saturday, Phoenix, Ariz., was her only rival. Out in Phoenix the temperature was 104. "I have always heard that the original Phoenix rose out of the fire, but I believe Phoenix, Ariz., was with the fire," said Forecaster Von-Herrmann as he read the early morning telegraphed temperature. For it still was far from noon out there. Except for the clouds, Mr. Von-Herrmann said, Atlanta would have had three or four more degrees of heat Saturday. Cloudiness prevented radiation of the sun's rays, keeping the temperature down. There is no moisture in the atmosphere. The forecaster said a little rain would help things out considerably, but he regretted to say no rain was in sight. "Hot and dry" the forecast for the past week, was the forecast for Sunday.

Longest Day of the Summer Has Arrived

Saturday, June 21, is the longest day of the year. The sun rises at 4:17 and sets at 8:12 o'clock, the day being 16 hours and 55 minutes long. "From an astronomical standpoint June 21 is the longest day," said Forecaster Von-Herrmann, of the weather bureau. "But there are other things connected with the breaking of three months of the summer season actually a minute longer. We see the sun a minute after it has actually set, and below the western horizon.

We have but one object and aim. It is that justice and the law be vindicated. We are, however, convinced we have a strong case against the accused.

Mrs. Minn Formby and her sensational affidavit will not be used by the State in the trial of Leo M. Frank, according to a statement Saturday from Attorney Frank A. Hooper, assisting the prosecution.

"We had decided to have it called Monday morning, June 30. Unless the defense makes for a continuance, the case will probably be tried then."
