## TRIAL OF FUGITIVE SET FOR JULY 20

### State Urges Earlier Date, But Objection by the Defense Wins Day.

Principally on the statements of the defense July 23 was definitely fixed by Judge L. B. Roun for the opening of the trial of Leo M. Frank, charged with the murder of Mary Phagan, following a conference Tuesday afternoon with Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey, Luther Roosevelt and Thoben Arnold, of counsel for the defense.

Solicitor Dorsey declared his case was ready for immediate trial, and was willing to clear it off his docket. He urged a speedy trial. Mr. Roosevelt, however, stated his case was not ready for trial, and he would be willing to take the vacation July 4, but was willing to forego it and set the date for July 7, but brought up the Phagan case and July 23 was fixed.

Russia Orders Peace When Sixty Thousand of Ferdinand's Soldiers Oppose Allies.

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian. VIENNA, June 21.—Fighting has begun between the main Serbian and Bulgarian armies, facing each other along the Vardar River, 25 miles south of Ulsak.

On account of the hostility between the Serbs and Bulgarians and because of the strength of the two armies it is feared any serious clash will precipitate another Balkan war.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 21.—This was a critical day in the Balkan situation with the four nations of the Balkan League on the brink of a fresh war.

The Russian Ambassadors at Sofia and Belgrade were instructed to urge the Balkan states to go to war over the appointment of the new Balkan League.

The powers have agreed notice they will not allow any revision of territory won from Turkey, even if the Balkan states do go to war over the appointment of the new Balkan League.

VIENNA, June 21.—King Peter has declined to accept the Russian offer of arbitration without reservation, which is acting as the agent of the powers.

The anti-government party is calling for war, but conservatives believe a war against Bulgaria would not be popular with the people.

Mr. Rosser, however, stated he and his colleague, Reuben Arnold, were forced to go to Emanuel County to try the McNaughton murder case there during the week of July 13. 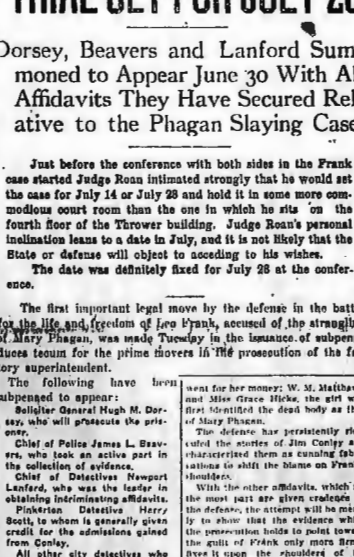

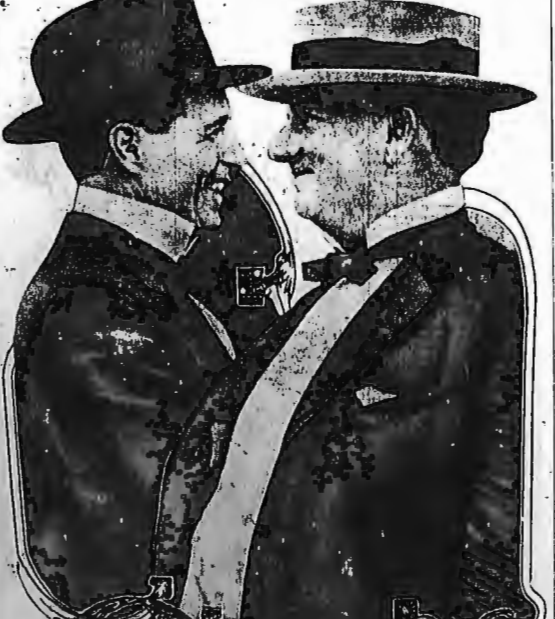

**DIGEST OF CURRENCY  
REFORM ACT WILSON  
WANTS THIS SESSION**

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Representative Carter Glass, chairman of the House Committee on Banking and Currency, has made public a digest of the Administration's currency reform bill which he introduced in the House yesterday. The bill is to be passed by the House before the adjournment of Congress on August 1st. The bill will control the issuance of new currency on application of the regional reserve banks in a Government bank centrally.

There will be no retirement of existing national bank circulation, not of the half-cent and one-cent bills. There will follow a period of expansion and contraction, freshly conceived. It is for us to determine how much currency is to be issued and how it is to be distributed.

The bill will be a part of the Administration's program to reform the currency system of the country. It is intended to obtain three principal objects:

- First—Provision of a basis for national note issues properly authorized.

SOBOTA, June 28.—Bulgarians today withdrew their acceptance of the Car Nicopol proposal to arbitrate the territorial dispute between the country on one side and Serbia and Greece on the other. This may mean the resumption of hostilities.

The Bulgarian press is bitterly hostile against Greece, charging that it has been a long time in securing a fair trial on the basis of the Balkan war. The situation today was decidedly ominous and would have led to the most fearful of catastrophes had it not been for the intervention of the powers of the League of Nations.

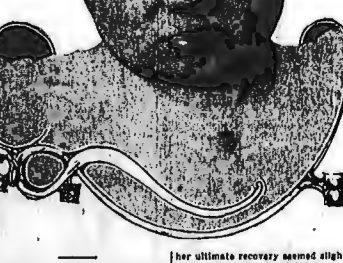
