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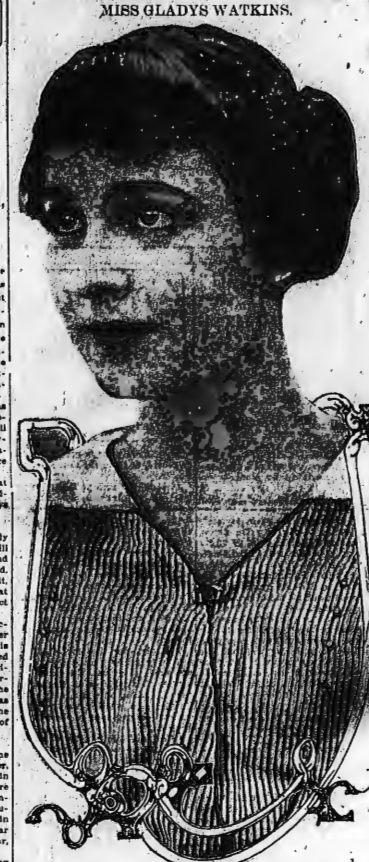
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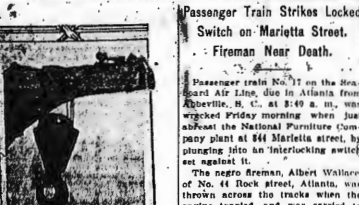

Knicker started toward Wright, but several of the other members of the House intervened and the matter was quickly discontinued. Mr. Knicker declaring that his words carried no innuendo or intimation, but that he was simply asking for information. Representative Wright had moved for a reconsideration of sections 4 and 5 of the general appropriation bill, which the House was considering as a committee of the whole. Three thousand members of the House were present for the vote. Wright interrupted Wright to a speech and insisted if "he" was not inspired by members of the "third house" to ask for a reconsideration. Wright's Retort Sharp. The reply of Wright was that "any such statement was a lie, the possible falsehood." He demanded that if Knicker had such proof or evidence that he at once submit it to the House. Trial Fails to Clear Stabbing Mystery

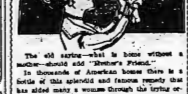

When application was made by the agency for permission to operate in Atlanta and the matter was under consideration by the Police Board, the promise was made that the Pinkertons would work in harmony with the city detective department and would co-operate in the apprehension of criminals.

This promise, according to Lanford, has been kept by all connected with the agency with the exception of Detective Pierce.

The Police Board was asked to take action against Pierce personally.

In the Phagan case Mr. Scott has reported to this department every day and has turned over all the evidence he has found," said Chief Lanford. "During his absence from the city a hoodlum, it was supposed to have been that in which the money due Mary Phagan was placed, were turned over to the attorneys for the defense, and no mention of the fact made to the detective department."

Scott, however, is known to be in possession of facts that deal with the face damaging to the negro Conley, as well as facts that are being used to bring about the conviction of Phagan."

"I wish it understood that I am wholly neutral in this matter," said Scott Saturday afternoon in remarking on the subpoena he received from the defense. "The investigation was made by the Pinkertons without fear or favor. We uncovered a large amount of evidence. Some of it was reliable. Some of it was worthless. It is the light of present developments. Some of it pointed strongly toward the guilt of Phagan, other evidence could be interpreted as very damaging to the negro."

"One function is to present all the evidence to the jury."
