## 2,000 in Panic on Burning Liner

### FIRE SWEEPS IMPERATOR DOCKS

One Dead, Many Injured in Flames on World's Greatest Liner at Hoboken.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The Hamburg-American liner Imperator, the biggest passenger-carrying ship afloat, which arrived in port last night with 4,100 passengers on board, was swept by fire to ashes as she lay at her pier in Hoboken, N. J.

Second Officer Herman Grobeck lost his life while trying to close the fire doors and confine the flames to the fifth deck, or provision room. It was reported that two seamen had been burned to death, and for a long time they were missing, but subsequently were found.

Many of the crew were injured fighting the flames and battling with the 200-acre passenger, who were panic-stricken as the fire raged. The damage to the ship is estimated at \$10,000,000.

First Cabin Deck Saved.  
By the terrific work, the flames kept kept from spreading to the first cabin and the superstructure, and within four hours the flames were under control. They had licked their way into the coal bunkers, however, and the firemen settled themselves down to carry on the battle with the danger now in the ballast of the ship was entirely over.

Upstairs Roger saved.  
If the fire had occurred at sea under the same conditions, the tragedy probably would have been a duplicate of the Titanic disaster. The Imperator got into her berth at 7:30 clock last night with the largest passenger record in the history of trans-Atlantic travel.

Among her first-class passengers were Theodore W. Williams, John Corry, Samuel J. Gerner, Paul Warburg, Mrs. Rudolph Spreckels, W. C. Woodworth, Charles K. Gerner, president of the Hamburg-American line, and Allison A. Armour.

Flames Spread Quickly.  
The fire was discovered in the provision room on the ship about 5 o'clock. Fast by the oil and fat of the foodstuffs, it spread rapidly. The crew was ordered by the trained fire fighters from Hoboken, Jersey City, and New York.

The provision room is in the after part of the ship, and it is believed that the flames at that point had been communicated to the second cabin before the alarm became general. Steerage passengers, hearing the racking of the walls and elated by a cry of fright which echoed over the entire ship.

Smoke rolled upward from the liner, giving the impression as though the Hamburg-American pier was up in flames. The crew was ordered to abandon the ship.

### REPEL MADE TO FRANK'S ATTACK

Solicitor Cites Prisoner's Statement on Stand, 'Now is the Time, This is the Place.'

Solicitor Dorsey was as busily engaged on the Frank case Thursday as he was any day before Leo Frank was convicted of the murder of Mary Phagan. If the factory superintendent finally succeeds in avoiding the penalty, Frank it will not be because the solicitor has not fought to the utmost of his strength to put the record around Frank's neck.

Briefly but pointedly Solicitor Dorsey Thursday morning summed up his position of Leo Frank's latest alleged statement concerning the trial and the Solicitor's speech.

"Frank," said the Solicitor in his quiet manner, "declared on the stand that 'now was the time and here the place.' That is all I have to say."

The Solicitor declared that the State would ask the new Grand Jury, which will be sworn in Tuesday, to indict Jim Conley immediately as an acknowledged accessory after the fact to the murder of Mary Phagan.

Although sworn out as a result of the long strain, Solicitor Dorsey declared Thursday that it was his intention to keep right at work without taking a vacation. A few days of "taking it easy," he said, will put him in excellent shape for the remainder of the summer.

The wheels of activity in the Solicitor's office, which had stopped for a few hours, started again Thursday as noisily and as smoothly as though there had been no interruption of their tireless activity.

If the lawyers for Frank are going to pull forth Herculean efforts to save him from the gallows, every move on his part will be met with the most stubborn resistance by Dorsey.

When they announced that they would ask Judge Rosen to grant a retrial, the Solicitor gave out that he proposed to ask the indictment of Jim Conley as accessory after the fact from the first Grand Jury at the first session.

In this he appears to display a certain confidence that the verdict of the twelve jurors last Monday will not be set aside. If Frank at a subsequent session should be acquitted, there could be no necessary after the fact of the murder if a jury decided that Frank was innocent.

Solicitor Prepares to Battle Appeal of Doomed Man for a New Trial.

was said to be damaging to the representation.

If the case is reopened by a new trial, the Solicitor presumes that the strands of evidence even more strongly woven than they were at the first trial. The investigation is continuing with almost the same vigor that it did in the early days of the mystery, except that only three detectives are working on the case now. They are Ross Hower, J. N. Starnes and Patrick Campbell.

Frank, Alder Counsel.

Whenever a report comes to the Solicitor's office of any new evidence, it is investigated by the detectives with the same care as it would have received before Frank was condemned to death. It is regarded as likely that Dorsey will have a number of witnesses if another trial is granted him convicted man.

Frank, appearing as cheerful and optimistic as he was before the twenty jurors voted him to hang, is assailing his attorneys in telling them what he considers the weak points of Solicitor Dorsey's case against him. With a mass of clippings and court transcripts before him, he is boiling down the most important testimony of the trial and pointing the various weak links of the investigation as it progressed. Incidentally, he is preparing a statement in reply to the closing statement of the Solicitor which he has described as "a full of holes as a sieve."

The officer is being made comfortable at the tower during the period that he is awaiting final disposition of his case. A new bed and some other furnishings were brought here, and Frank's quarters were fully supplied and renovated.

Frank continued Thursday to work on the statement which he intends as an answer to Solicitor Dorsey's closing speech before the jury. He also received many visitors, among them the mother, Mrs. Ben Frank, who will leave shortly for her home in Brooklyn.

Mrs. Frank's hearing showed no trace of the effect which the sentence imposed upon her son must have had. She was dressed in a white dress and had a black hat with the brand-banned black hat which was familiar to courtroom attendants during the trial.

The prisoner's father-in-law, Emil Belg, joined him at breakfast and remained for two hours. Frank's wife did not visit her husband during the morning.

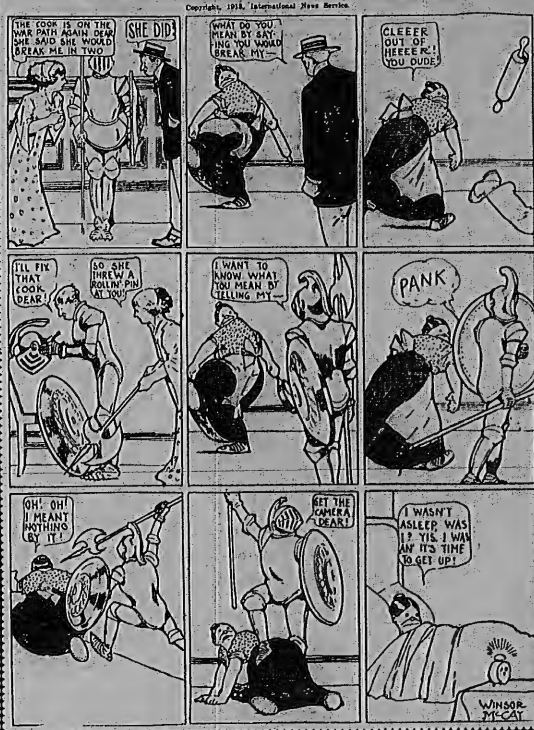

His mother will return to Brooklyn in a few days, but his wife will stay in Atlanta until the argument for a new trial is made October 4.

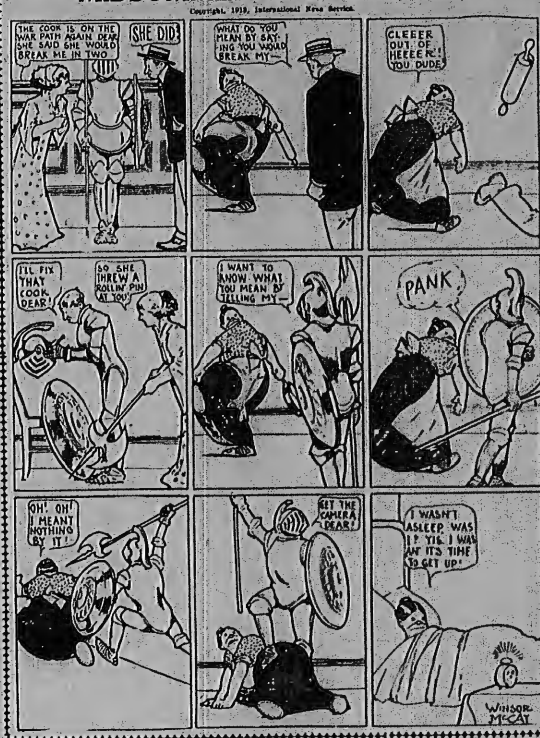

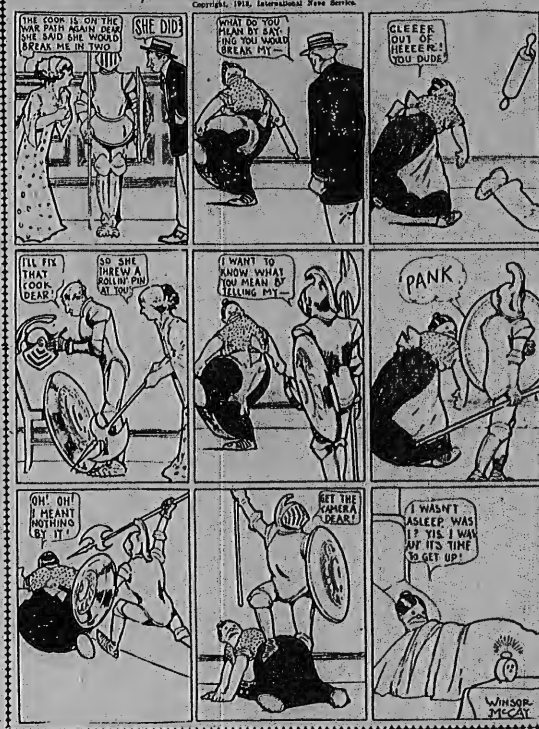

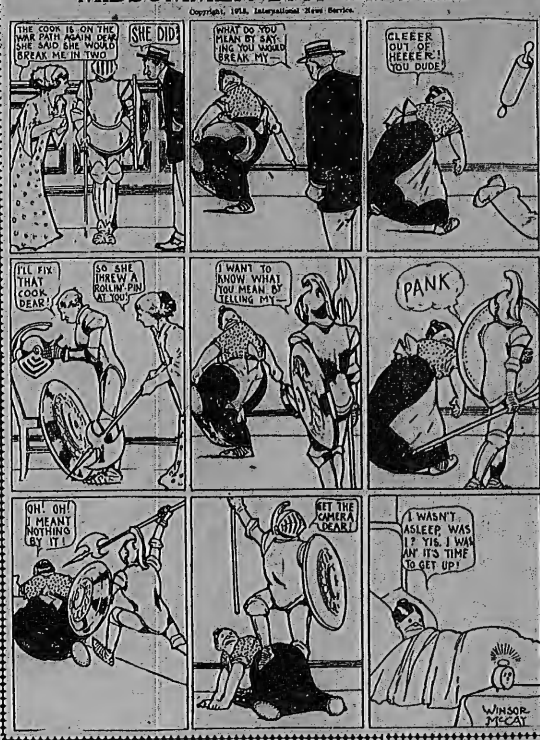

### IMPERATOR SWEEP BY FLAMES AT DOCK

HEROIC OFFICER DEAD, MANY HURT IN BATTLE WITH FIRE AND CRAZED PASSENGERS.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The Hamburg-American liner *Imperator*, the biggest passenger-carrying ship afloat, which arrived in port last night with 1,100 passengers on board, was swept by fire to-day as she lay at her pier in Hoboken, N. J.

Second Officer Herman Gierbach lost his life while trying to close the fire doors and confine the flames to the fifth deck, an provision room. It was reported that two men had been burned to death, and for a long time they were missing, but subsequently were found.

Many of the crew were injured fighting the flames and battling with the 1,000 steaming passengers who were panic-stricken as the fire raged. The damage to the ship is estimated at \$150,000.

First Cabin Deck Saved.

By the terrific work, the flames were kept from spreading to the first cabin deck, although it was within four hours the flames were under control. They had licked their way into the coal-burning house, and the firemen settled themselves down to carry on a patient battle.

The danger, however, to the balance of the ship was entirely over, Captain Bauer said.

"If the fire had occurred at sea under the same conditions, the tragedy probably would have been a duplicate of the Titanic disaster."

The *Imperator* got into her berth at 7:15 o'clock last night with the biggest passenger record in the history of trans-Atlantic travel. Among her 763 first-class passengers were George Ade, William Ellery Channing, Samuel Lincolnton, Paul Warburg, Mrs. Rudolph Spreckels, F. W. Woolworth, Julius P. Meyer, vice president of the Hamburg-American line, and Allison Armour.

Flames Spread Quickly.

The fire was discovered in the provision room on the ship about 3 o'clock. Fed by the oil and fat of the foodstuffs, it spread rapidly. The crew was assisted by the trained fire fighters from Hoboken, Jersey City and New York.

The provision room is in the after part of the vessel. So swiftly did the flames spread that they had been communicated to the second cabin before the alarm became general. Steering room, engine room, and the crowding of the walls and stoves set up a fire of fright which echoed over the entire ship.

Smoke rolled upward from the lower decks, the impression an shore that the Hamburg-American pier was on fire. Police officers were ordered to the scene.

Captain Bauer, chief of the five commandants of the levantine line, one of the first to reach the provision room. He personally took command and directed the fight against the flames. ### ASKS U. S. TO RETAIN PRESENT DIPLOMATIC CORPS; LIND RETURNS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—John Lind, special envoy from President Wilson, in Mexico, was to-day ordered to return to Mexico City from Vera Cruz.

The order for the return to the Mexican capital of Mr. Lind followed his receipt here of a very optimistic message from Mr. Lind in Vera Cruz.

It is probable, unless the present program miscarries, that there will be a full discussion in the Mexican capital to-morrow night or Sunday relative to the chief points at issue between the United States and Mexico, the principal one of which is the elimination of Huerta.

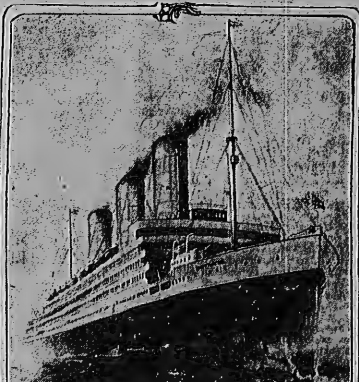

Imperator Excelled Titanic. The Imperator was launched at Hamburg, Germany, May 13, 1912, in the presence of Emperor William, who stood sponsor for the giant. The Imperator has been in commission less than three months, having left Hamburg on her maiden voyage to New York on June 11 last.

Disaster to the great ship so soon after her construction instantly brings to mind the fate of the great Titanic, which sank on her initial voyage. In comparison, however, the specifications of the Imperator are more imposing than those of the Titanic. The dimensions of the Hamburg-American liner follow:

- Length 910 feet. Beam (width) 90 feet. Gross tonnage 50,000. The Imperator's bridge is 80 feet over the water, and her two gigantic funnels extend 69 feet above the upper deck. Her masts extend 242 feet from keel to truck.

Wireless apparatus sufficiently powerful to transmit messages 1,500 miles was installed on the liner, and she carries three wireless operators on every voyage. She is equipped with five mighty anchors, one weighing 26,446 pounds, two weighing 17,636, and one 11,463. Her hedge anchor weighs 4,900 pounds.
