The Greek rear runs through Macedonia to the city of Salonika. The Bulgarians occupy the country along the Greek border and the Serbians and the Greeks hold the positions on the opposite bank.

The information suggested that the bodies of Turkish soldiers who were lying unburied in the Balkans were being taken to the Adriatic coast.
