Aeroplane Drops, Killing Soldier of Fortune and His Companion

Pictureque F. S. Cody, English Aviator, Dies in Crash

LONDON, Aug. 11.—(Special P. M.)—The famous English aviator F. S. Cody was killed in an aeroplane accident at Alderbury today.

Cody was trying out a new aeroplane when he met his death. In the machine he was using was a new model known as the "Cody." He was flying over the open country in the Alderbury district and had reached the ground when the aeroplane fell. Cody was killed instantly. His companion, a young woman, was also killed. The aeroplane was flying at a height of about 1,000 feet. The cause of the accident is not yet known.

Doctor Would Take Arsenic to Aid in Freeing Another Convicted of Murder

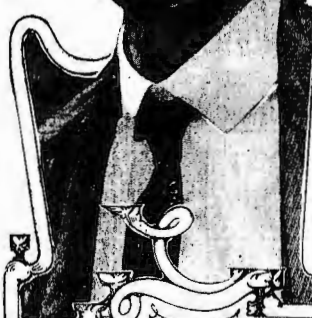
