Attorney Arnold Registers Another Objection Against Laughter of Spectators in the Court Room—Solicitor Draws From Schiff Change of Answers Made to Several Previous Statements of His While on the Witness Stand

The second week of the trial of Leo M. Frank, charged with the murder of Mary Phagan, ended at 12:30 o'clock Saturday when court adjourned until 9 o'clock Monday morning. Several times during the trial the National Pencil factory was on the stand for the defense in the hour of adjournment and will remain under cross-examination by Solicitor Hugh M. Dorsey on Monday, during the cross-examination of Schiff, he and the solicitor had many times regarding the factory office and were frequently interrupted by objections from Attorney Arnold for the defense. The solicitor put Frank's assistant through a grilling examination during the course of which he caused the witness to change several answers he had previously made to the jury.

That Jim Conley, the negro servant who accuses Frank, feared the crowd gathered in front of the pencil factory following the murder of Mary Phagan and that the negro declared that he would give a million dollars if he had a white skin, was the declaration of Schiff earlier during his testimony. Schiff also declared that the financial statement made out in Frank's handwriting on April 18 was accurate and the handwriting of the accused superintendent was normal. Schiff spoke with Leo M. Frank in the office and made in making up the weekly financial sheet.

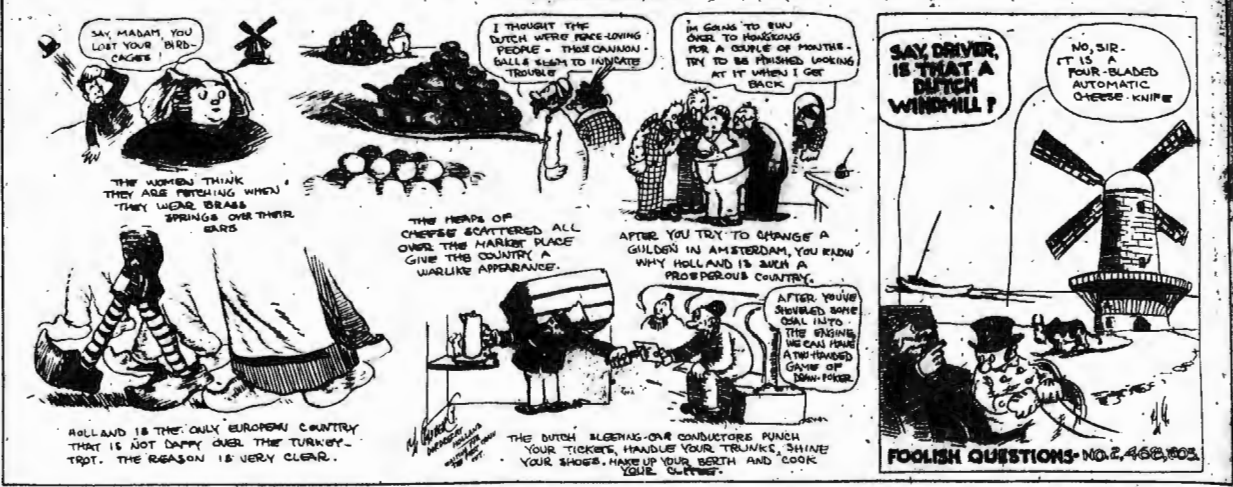
