State's Witnesses Saw Girl On Forsyth Viaduct Shortly After Noon Day of Tragedy

Two of the state's principal witnesses in the Frank trial, put on the stand last Tuesday afternoon swore that they saw Mary Phagan soon after her fall from Forsyth viaduct early in the afternoon of April 18, waiting for the girl to get up.
