Developments came thick and fast in the Frank case Saturday afternoon and night.

First was the disclosure of two affidavits put in the hands of Solicitor Hugh Downey by George Epps, father of the convicted slayer, in support of the prosecution, and by the boy's uncle, W. H. Epps, of Matonton, who avers that the youth confuses to having been trapped into a trap which he recently renounced his testimony.

Next was the release of newly discovered evidence which the defense will show that the murder notes found beside Mary Phagan's body were written in the basement of the papal family's second floor, and not as contended by the prosecution.

Four-liners, drives off Ford were flamed to Howard Chandler, Sam Rice, new Derrell Pratt, Eddie Collins, Gus Williams, Eddie Alsworth, Walter Schang, Sam Crawford and Joe Jackson.

The last-named probably made the longest home run of the year when he landed on one of Ford's drives and heaved it over the grand stand at the Polo grounds.

Next to Johnson and Ford, Tom Hughes of the Nationals, allowed the greatest number of smashes for the full distance. He was located for eight drives of this character. Bobby Brown of Washington, had seven homers made off his delivery and three men had six. Baltimore's Jimmie Dickson, of St. Louis, strangled of Cleveland, and Brown of Philadelphia.

Joe Wood, of the Red Sox, was even stronger than all these men previously named, for he refused to allow anyone to get a home off of his puzzling delivery.

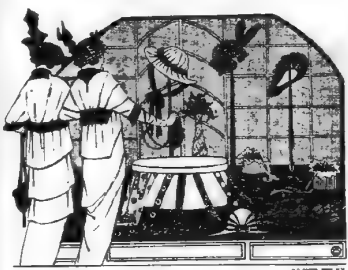

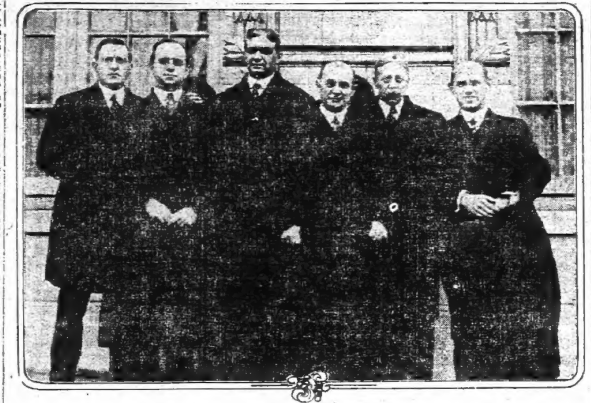
