

# BOY TO CONVINCE NAB RABBI TO DISCUSS ISSUE

Will Decide on Size of the Issue Needed to Finance Plans for Big Civic Improvements.

## NOTHING MAKES ANSWER TO HILLERY'S OBJECTION

Says Atlanta Bonds Possess Greater Attractiveness Than Those of New York. President Hope Resigns.

Convinced that Atlanta has reached a stage which prevents the development of the city with the current resources, the bond issue committee will today formulate a report recommending that council authorize a bond election to finance plans for improving schools, waterworks, sewers and other municipal needs.

Just what amount the committee will recommend is not certain, but the amount will amount to \$1,000,000 or \$1,500,000 for all purposes.

Two members of the subcommittee which has been investigating the needs of the various departments—Aldermen Armstrong and Councilman Smith—are of the opinion that the city should not issue a bond issue of less than \$1,000,000 for school purposes only and \$2,000,000 for the use of the various other departments, or \$3,000,000 for all purposes.

Needs of the Schools. The committee is unanimous as to the amount needed by all other departments except the schools.

# WAR'S STORES SLIGHTLY CRISISING 7,000,000 BELGIANS IN FIGHT AT LODZ

## Cut From Food Supply by Both Germans and Allies, Their Only Hope Is in Relief From America.

London, December 4.—Hubert Clark Hooper, chairman of the American Committee for Relief in Belgium, returned to London today after a week's trip to Belgium. He reported that distribution of food is waiting; but declared famine still threatens the population and that on account of the attitude of the belligerents the Belgians must still appeal to the people of the United States for relief.

## Report Is Contradicted by Statement From Berlin, Which Announces That German Offensive in Poland Is Taking Normal Course.

London, December 4.—(10:30 p. m.) Reliable news of the progress of the battle in Poland which contains the slightest objection to the Belgians or to the German offensive in Poland is lacking. An unofficial dispatch from Cologne says the battle of Lodz has ended in success for the Russians, but this statement contradicts the Berlin official report, which says the German offensive in Poland is taking its normal course.

# Canadian Pacific Issues Met Ready Sale in Wall Street

**\$12,000,000 Worth of 4-1/2 Per Cent Certificates Is Taken Up—This Shows Improvement Conditions Are Promising—Relaxation of Rates in Money Market.**

New York, December 4.—Investment conditions were more promising today. This was demonstrated by the ready sale of the \$12,000,000 worth of Canadian Pacific railway 4 1/2 per cent certificates offered by a banking syndicate. There was also a further extension of the inquiry for various short-term notes, including New York city, which retained their recent advance.

Monetary conditions were again pronounced favorable, the relaxation of rates in 30 and 45-day loans being most apparent. There was an even larger supply of call money than yesterday, and most time renewals were reduced to 5 per cent, with a further relaxation of prime collateral. This phase of the financial situation gave rise to renewed rumors of foreign loans by our bankers, as well as the probability of considerable home borrowing. It was known that a number of domestic corporations were endeavoring to obtain loans for funds to meet maturing obligations, and the approach of the New Year was expected to witness similar operations of this character.

A few changes, mainly in the direction of improvement, were seen in the rates of stock prices. The New York change, people's gas, of Chicago, gained 3 points and St. Paul 1 1/2, with fractional advances in Pennsylvania and Union Pacific.

Trading in bonds was marked by more nervousness and smaller offerings, with an irregular mixture of gains and losses, the latter being more pronounced in relatively unseasoned issues. Gains extended generally from 10 points in Virginia Debt certificates to 3 points.

Foreign exchange played less than its usual part in the day's business. Light requests for dollars, however, lost sight of their former importance, the market again being attracted to German assets. One of the largest railroads placed an order for the present and prospective requirements of the year, and the market for like materials are said to be plentiful. Planting and other textile markets also made an increase showing on increased jobbing demand.

Private London cables hinted at a hitch in the proposed repurchase of the exchange, with a resultant depressing effect on speculative sentiment.
