

BREAD QUESTION WORRIES EUROPE

Italians Protest Against High Prices—Austrians Put on Short Rations—Prices Advancing in England.

Rome, January 31.—A royal decree issued today suspends the duty on cereals and flour. The duty already had been reduced more than half. The decree declares that if it is necessary wheat will be transported on the railways and steamships at half rates. The decree authorizes the government to ascertain the quantity of cereals in private storehouses and whether it is necessary to govern the manufacture and sale of bread.

Notwithstanding the decree and the measures adopted by the government a meeting was held at the Labor exchange today to protest against the high price of bread. It was charged that the high price was due to the government being unable to prevent speculation and hoarding of wheat.

The resolution was passed, declaring the situation would continue until the government was able to prevent speculation and hoarding of wheat.

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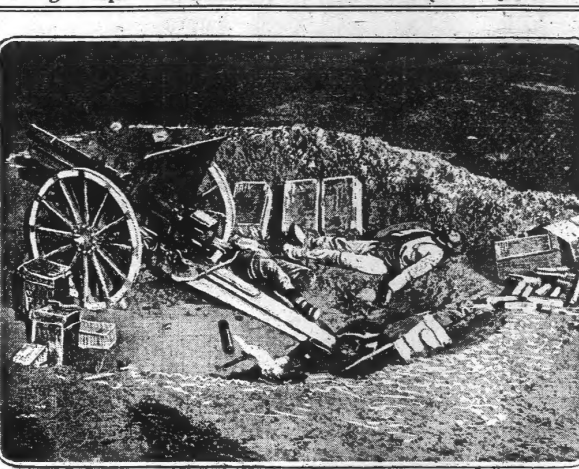
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Tragic Episode of War in Serbia Graphically Told

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PLANNING TO DESTROY VILA-ZAPATA FORCES

Gen. Carranza's Army Expected to Move Vigorously During This Week.

Vera Cruz, January 31.—General Carranza's army is expected, beginning this week, to endeavor to force to an early conclusion its offensive campaign against the Villa and Zapata forces. The belief is expressed at the Carranza headquarters that defections from the enemy's forces will make the campaign comparatively easy. Large numbers of Zapata men, it is said, have offered their services to Carranza.

Reports that Villa is losing many minor leaders, in addition to one or two men of more importance, continue in circulation here.

Carranza and his counselors expect to issue more decrees concerning private persons or corporations who are making concessions granted by former administrations. Of the decrees issued last week the one that creates the widest interest empowers the government to appropriate any work done by private persons or corporations in some paralleling waterways which are styled federal zones.

Denier that Villa has been wounded.

Washington, January 31.—Denial of reports that General Villa had been seriously wounded was received at the state department today from the American agent, Carothers, at El Paso. Carothers said that Villa himself, at Aguas Calientes, yesterday telegraphed that he was all right and had not been injured. Carothers is the department's special agent and has been traveling with Villa.

San Francisco, January 31.—General Francisco Villa, reported shot and seriously wounded, was seen yesterday by passengers arriving there today from Aguas Calientes, where Villa recently established headquarters. Apparently he was not suffering from a serious wound.

Fretilmar fighting is reported at Queretaro, where General Lucio Blanco is said to have attacked the Villa garrison under General Manuel Chao. The outcome is not known here.

An aeroplane was shipped today from Juarez for use by Villa troops. The Carranza forces also have aeroplanes.

With Bayonets and Fists British Soldiers Stopped Charges by the Germans

One "Tommy" Bayoneted Four Germans and Captured Four, All the Time Sucking at His Clay Pipe. Desperate Fighting Near La Basse Canal.

London, January 31.—"Our men in many cases fought with bayonets and soon knocked out many Germans with their fists. A story is told of one man who broke into a house held by eight Germans, bayoneted four and captured four, all the time sucking at his clay pipe."

The battle, which commenced early in the morning, was preceded by the usual artillery duel.

Met With Cold Steel.

"At 8 o'clock in the morning," says the eyewitness, "the Germans assaulted the British and French south of the canal and at one point penetrated one line. About the same time they attacked Olvenhove, north of the canal, temporarily gained a foothold in the place. But at their infantry, surged forward our men met them with cold steel, killing 120 with the bayonet."

The fighting then proceeded for some hours at close quarters, but by noon we had recaptured the whole of our original trenches around the village. The Germans showed the utmost determination, delivering no less than five attacks on the northeast corner of Olvenhove. These were repulsed, several scattered bodies which had penetrated our line being killed practically to a man. Our casualties were comparatively light.

"Meanwhile on the south of the canal the struggle was continued heroically throughout the day. The Germans advanced along the main road, were caught by our machine guns and lost several hundred men. By the end of the day the estimated number of 200. As they came back they were met by our machine guns and they suffered a severe loss. But as has been said, they persisted all the time at one point."

Fought Hand-to-Hand.

By a contest-act, however, under the circumstances, in co-operation with the French, the allies drove them back. Though we did not win back our original position we established ourselves in a fresh line close behind it. A great part of the area where this fighting took place consisted of brick fields, where the adversaries fought hand-to-hand. The day was a desperate one, fifty-three prisoners, including two officers, were taken.

The total casualties of the Germans are estimated to have amounted to more than a thousand in their effort against the British and French.

Councilman Claude Mason, who led the floor of council for the amendment which fourteen members of the committee favor, declared that he did not know of any combination, and expressed the opinion that the sheet was drafted for the sole and only purpose of making the sheet carry out the city's needs.

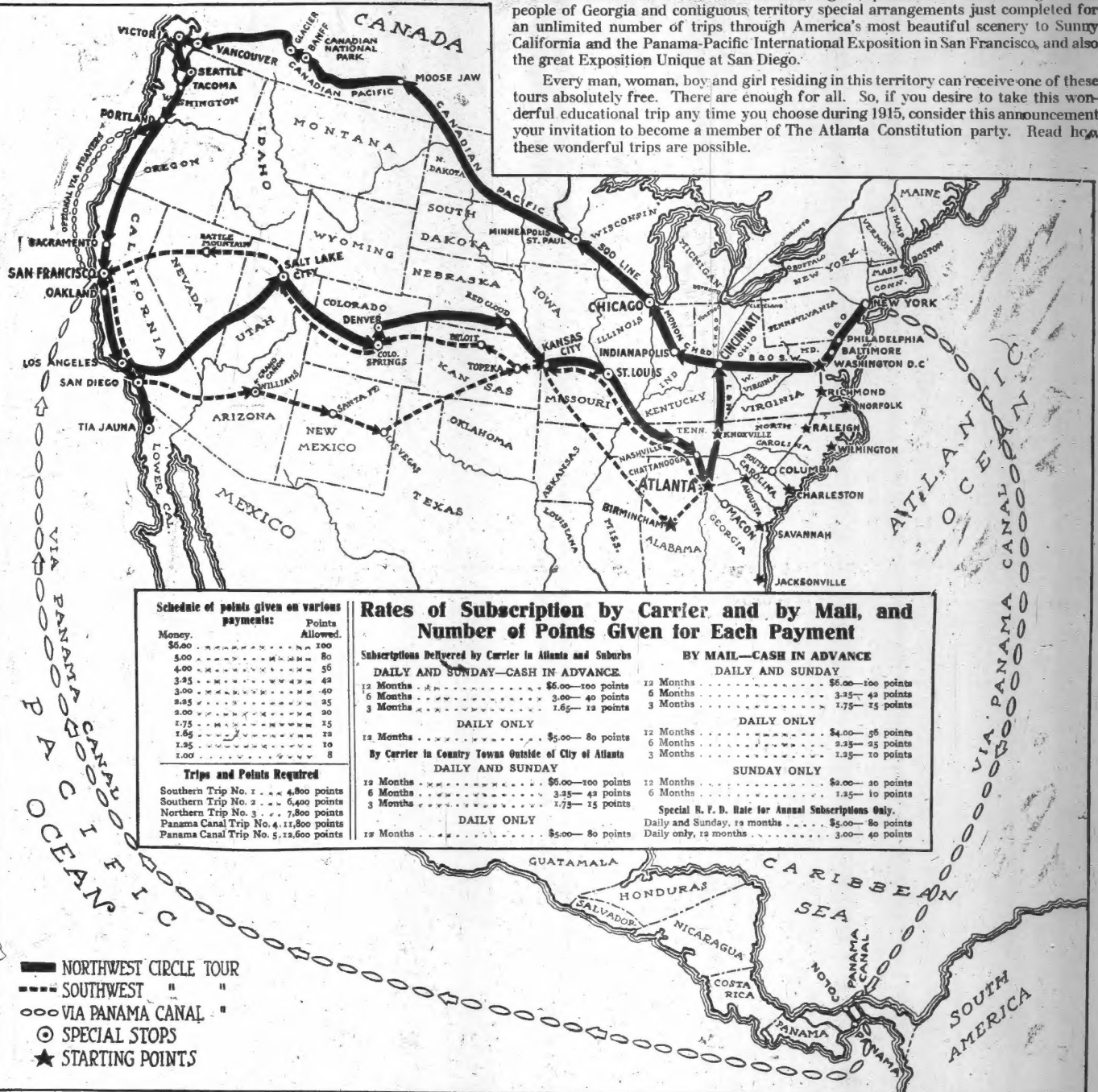
