

WOODROW WILSON WANTS BUSINESS TO AID GOVERNMENT FOR BENEFIT OF ALL

President, Speaking Before
the Chamber of Commerce
of United States, Pleads
for Co-operation in the
Framing of Laws.

SPIRIT THAT RULES IN WAR SHOULD BE SPIRIT RULING IN PURSUITS OF PEACE

President Declares That
"When Peace Is as Hand-
some as War There Will
Be No War"—Business
Men Have Themselves to
Blame if Intelligent Laws
Affecting Them Are Not
Framed.

Washington, February 3.—Co-operation
between business and the govern-
ment in framing laws for the benefit
of all the people was urged by Pres-
ident Wilson tonight in an address
before several hundred representa-
tive business men here yesterday. He
said: "Businessmen are the
most natural and logical friends
of the government. The Chamber of
Commerce of the United States, he
declared, "we must all pool our in-
terests" to discover the best means for
handling public problems.

"We must all assist the creation in
the United States in time of peace of
the same kind of united spirit which
moves nations during war. He de-
clared that "when there is a
sense of common purpose there will be no war,"
and that "when men engage in the
pursuits of peace in the same spirit of
self-sacrifice as they engage in war,
war will be avoided."

PEACE FORGED TO GROW MORE GRAIN.

The president predicted that, while
there is a shortage of food in the
world now, there will be more
grain in the future. He pointed out that
under the guidance of the department of
agriculture, efforts must be made by
American farmers to grow more and
more grain.

Speaking of the foreign trade of the
United States, the president asked that
business men devise some way of al-
lowing American exporters to combine
to form common marketing agencies
and to give common credit in such
way that these co-operative devices
may be open to use of all. He de-
clared that apparently the anti-trust
laws prohibited such a combination.

He added that he would favor a change, in

"I would prefer that you receive

Austrian attacks along a certain line, but the British and French had driven the Germans back and driven the Americans away from the support of the railway. The Germans had given up the effort to inflict a staggering blow, under which the Austrians were.

"The Russians have crossed the crest of the Carpathians and are again on the western slopes.

RUSSIANS GAIN ALL ALONG LINE.

Petrograd, February 4.—Successes for the Russian arms in the regions of Warsaw and in the Carpathians are reported in official reports. A statement issued here today, "Confirmation is given also to the report that German troops have crossed the Carpathians to assist their Austrian allies. The text of the communiqué follows:

"The engagements in the region of Mawia have continued favorable to our troops. On the 21st January, the battle on the roads from Boholm proved a victory for the Russians. A large number of heavy and light batteries participated in the fighting.

"The German attack on the morning of the 22nd January was repulsed with great losses for the enemy. A violent storm was begun south of the Carpathians, during which we captured advanced trenches which we had been unable to hold.

"Soon after the rain increased the intensity of our bombardment, continuing its attack on the enemy's positions, so that the Germans were unable to make progress without repulse.

"In the Carpathians the conflict continued. January 21 was a day of continuous fighting, during which the principal ridge of the mountain range was captured. The Russians crossed the border, where they took a battery of six canons, two mortars, numerous machine guns, and a large number of prisoners. An offensive movement undertaken by the Germans was repulsed with enormous losses.

"News relative to the transportation of German troops to the Carpathian

front is not yet available.

FRENCH REPULSED BY RUSSIAN SUBMARINE.

Paris, February 4.—(By Wireless to London.)—The French submarine "Gambetta" was sunk by a German submarine in the Bay of Biscay.
