The recent suggestion from German sources that American merchantmen might attack if conveyed by an American warship, has not met with approval in naval circles here. It was suggested that the German war zone order may be a blockade of the German coast, in that case, no American man-of-war would have the right to pass the blockade line alone, much less with a convoy of merchant ships.

Formal notice by the British of the blockade, and recognition of it by the United States, would remove from the field of diplomatic negotiations all questions relating to the right of neutral nations to send cargoes of food to the civil population of the blockaded state.

GERMAN'S OFFER IN REGARD TO FOOD.

Washington, February 17.—The text of Germany's note proposing that cargoes be distributed under supervision of American consular officers and urging the United States to concur in the right to ship cargoes for non-combatants, was made public today. It follows:

"The federal council's decision concerning the seizure of food products, and the stipulations of this regulation do not apply to grain or flour intended from abroad after January 31."

Although that provision had for its object simply to throw open to the public the channels as supply the private consumption of civilians, and in consequence of orders of prohibition the importation of the federal council's order was to prevent the use of the population from speculators and entrepreneurs were fully met, it was never intended to be applied to any proposition looking to control by the federal council the importation of the population of the country. Although these principles are generally known and obtain in the United States

as well as in England itself, the German government desired to point out that it is absolutely assured that imported food products will be consumed by the civilian population in Germany exclusively and that remains no doubt upon which England can prevent the exportation of food products to Germany for the use of civilians.

The German imperial government expresses the firm hope that the American government will pursue its right in this matter."

GERMAN'S OFFER IN REGARD TO FOOD.

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NO FOOD SHORTAGE FOR UNITED STATES

Plenty to Eat Despite Enormous Exports—Great Surplus of Wheat Above the Domestic Needs.

Washington, February 12.—Assurance that the United States is in no danger of a food shortage, despite enormous exports to Europe, was given tonight by the department of agriculture in a statement to the public.

The surplus of wheat, above domestic needs, on hand February 1, the statement said, would permit the exportation of nearly 1,000,000 bushels until the recent average—until the new crop is available. Moreover, there were large supplies of corn and other grains, meat, animal dairy products, potatoes and fruit at the opening of 1915 than for many years.

Incidentally, it was pointed out that the average price of meat animals was 7 per cent lower in January than a year ago; butter 2 per cent, potatoes 15 per cent, apples 37 per cent, the price of chickens slightly lower.

The 1914 Wheat Crop.

"The 1914 wheat crop of the United States was estimated to be 3,918,000 bushels," said the statement. "The estimated surplus carried over from the 1913 crop was about 75,000,000 bushels, making a total available supply of 3,993,000,000 bushels. As the normal annual per capita consumption of wheat in the United States is about 3.3 bushels, 55,000,000 bushels should meet our normal domestic requirements for food; 3,938,000 bushels are required annually for seed; therefore, 610,000,000 bushels should supply the normal domestic demand. This would leave a surplus of 3,328,000,000 bushels.

"Of this surplus about 210,000,000 bushels were exported by January 30. This left 3,118,000,000 bushels or 46,000,000 bushels more than our average annual export for the past five years, for exportation between February 1 and the opening of the new crop, or for carrying over into the next crop year.

"The new American crop will begin to appear before July. The Argentine crop is now coming on the market. It is estimated that from that source there will be available 10,000,000 bushels. A surplus of 75,000,000 bushels or more from India will be available in May and June. The increase in the foreign wheat average of the United States in 1914 was 1.1 per cent, or over 1,000,000 acres.

Wheat Average Shows Increase.

The statement added that the average of winter wheat crops in Denmark, Italy, Switzerland, United Kingdom, United Kingdom-United States, India and Canada shows an increase of from 3 to 33 per cent.

Washington, February 12.—The amended government bill rushed through the house early today failed to gain any ground in the senate, and administration leaders tonight were uncertain as to its fate.

Early in the day it was discovered that the amended bill had failed to satisfy recalcitrant democrats or progressive republicans. Without support of either of these factions the bill could not be passed. Democrats had realized nothing could be done unless the measure could be changed in conference. Efforts to reach an agreement failed. Another attempt will be made tomorrow.

Tonight it was reported that a pending motion to take the bill off the calendar would prevail, but republican leaders, it was declared, would insist upon an understanding that the bill would be reconsidered before they would cease opposition.

CHARGES OF OUTSIDE INFLUENCE.

Three leaders centered today in the special senate committee's inquiry into charges of outside influences in the handling of the bill. Bernard S.
