

DEMOCRATIC PARTY  
MUST FIGHT LIQUOR,  
SAYS WM. J. BRYAN

Secretary of State Declares the Party Cannot Afford to Take a Stand Against Prohibition.

WARNING IS PRONOUNCED  
FOR LIQUOR INTERESTS

Bryan Says These Interests Are in Conspiracy Against Everything Good—Hopes to See Democratic Party Favor Prohibition Whenever Question Is Raised.

Washington, April 7.—Secretary Bryan tonight made public a letter he had written to L. W. Kennington, democratic national committeeman from Iowa, expressing the hope that Iowa democrats would take a stand for prohibition and vote against officials who could be controlled by the liquor interests.

In a statement given out with the letter, Mr. Bryan said he hoped that the democrats would take the position side where the question was raised, and that if the liquor interests insisted on making an issue in the election of a national committee, the people would be compelled to take a stand not to afford it.

"I do not know what the extent of the liquor question will be an issue in the campaign next year," Mr. Bryan added. "But I am sure that the liquor interests will find a place in the platform of either the democratic or the republican party, but there is no reason why the national committee should not represent the sentiment of the party on this subject as on other subjects."

Mr. Kennington had written Mr. Bryan as his name was being used in behalf of a candidate for the national committee.

BRYAN'S LETTER  
ON IOWA SITUATION.

In his letter to Mr. Kennington, Mr. Bryan said:

"The legislature of Iowa has also submitted to the people a prohibition amendment to the constitution. It became necessary therefore for the voters of Iowa to act upon the liquor question, both in choosing another legislature and in voting on the amendment submitted. The democrats of Iowa, considering a considerable portion of the voting population, took a stand in support of the nomination and election of legislators and other officials who vote upon the amendment."

"I take it for granted that the democratic party will act upon the amendment in the same way, and even if it does not, the individual action of the party will be such that the organization will to a greater or less extent, commit the party to the same stand as the party's strength in the state."

### HONEST ADVERTISING.

The national awakening to the importance of honest advertising is growing rapidly into national demand. The public is being educated; it is learning to recognize the stamp of the faker, and as it does it will pass him up.

In a recent well-timed address before a gathering of New-York business men, Richard H. Waldo, of The New York Tribune, told them:

The elimination of the unfair competition of the bar will make truthful advertising the most important factor in present dreams, and we would thus see advertising become the cheapest in the world, the most useful among all the business forces.

As Mr. Waldo put it, "Advertising is identification." The dishonest advertiser may flourish for the moment, but his methods soon betray him; he becomes known and must perform travel from community to community to get away from rapid depletion of his trade due to the awakening of consumers who have not been "stung." The honest advertiser who has not identified himself; he builds business upon reputation which is his most valuable asset.

Commenting upon Mr. Waldo's presentation of the case, The Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter of New York remarks:

The man who will make an astute and incisive statement in an advertising campaign will be the one who practices as though he sells short weight and short measure, or grossly adulterated goods. The dishonest advertiser is not better morally than the swindler, the swindler, the gambler who cheats at cards, and the con man who identifies himself with false or misleading advertising. There is little hope for sympathy from honest, fair dealing business men.

The case is well put, in the matter of foods products, federal and state governments have recognized this aspect of the matter, and made it a criminal offense to misrepresent the quality or quantity of a package. There are other necessities of life in which the public is just as much entitled to protection against the fraud and the cheat. They can get that protection today only through such publicity as The Constitution and other papers have given to unscrupulous business methods.

### LAYING A BIG FOUNDATION.

Fulton county's commissioners have put the first stone in the foundation for a greater cattle industry for Georgia, and perhaps the entire south. The possibilities, the facilities, the opportunity are all here for the translation of an industry that now brings but a few millions a year into one of hundreds of millions. Impetus has been the one thinking; something is needed which will transform possibility into action.

In their adoption of The Constitution's suggestion, Fulton's commissioners have taken the initial step toward putting life and activity into the business of more and better cattle growing. In pursuance of this suggestion, directed to every county in the state and the south, Fulton has decided to purchase at once three pure bred, registered Hereford bulls to be placed at the disposal, free of charge, of the farmers of the county who will agree only to preserve all heifer calves for breeding purposes.

Every county in Georgia and in the south should take the same step at once. There is not one county in the state in which good beef cattle cannot be grown economically and profitably; with those which have the advantage of the open ranges, there is no excuse. With each of the 152 counties made a breeding center for good beef cattle, the aggregate of increased production within five years would be something. We might not only begin to live at home, but have a substantial surplus for sale.

Georgia, too long given over to a one-crop idea, is spending \$1,000,000 a month outside the state for meat, in addition to

the millions more that are going away for hay, grain and feedstuffs. Georgia farmers need anticipate no difficulty in finding a market for every pound of feedstuffs grown; and if they will convert their surplus into fattened steers or well-rounded hogs, their market at a good profit is as sure as sunrise in the morning.

The gradual advent of packing houses has wonderfully helped Georgia's cattle industry the last few years, perhaps more than doubled it. But further stimulus has been needed. It will be found, largely, there can be no question in the plan The Constitution has suggested. But the counties should act now; a year's wait will mean a year's loss.

The year 1910 should not only see Georgia growing every pound of meat needed for home consumption, but taking orders from other states and other countries. We can do it, if we begin now.

### A WORTHY WORK.

Mrs. Beaumont Davison took a step in the right direction yesterday, when in winding up the activities of the Emergency Association, a temporary organization for aiding unemployed women, she appointed a strong committee from among her coworkers to make a fair survey of the conditions surrounding many of the unemployed women whose inefficiency made it difficult to secure work for them.

The bureau established for the registration of women who needed, and wanted, work showed a too large percentage of applicants who could not be classified because of their inefficiency in every line of work, and the number who could not hope, through their lack of knowledge, to obtain any very even of menial kind. With but a partial investigation of many cases, and with the records of the Emergency Association have kept in their four weeks of experience in placing unemployed women, they have acquired a knowledge of conditions which should be put to practical use in some permanent movement to handle the problem of the unemployed.

The committee will ask conference with the committee from the chamber of commerce looking after unemployed men hoping that the co-operation of these two committees may lead to a survey which will be at the very basis of the number of inefficient young people compelled to earn a living, and yet unqualified to do so.

The fact that many of the unqualified come from the city where opportunities of training are easier, as well as from the country districts, raises the question as to where the responsibility of so much inefficiency lies; whether with the city or with the state.

The work of Mrs. Davison's committee, with their experience acquired in the splendid activity of the Emergency Association, and their desire to co-operate with the men's committee of the chamber of commerce, with the view of a broader survey into conditions which are ever apt to confront the city and the state looking to the industries as a great factor of prosperity, means much for the city.

It means the acquirement and exploitation of such facts that the public at large should be apprised of, and it means the possibility of helping people to help themselves, separating industrial welfare work from any form of public charity or alms giving.
