

MISS FIGHT LIQUOR, SAYS WM. E. BRYAN

Secretary of State Declares the Party Cannot Afford to Take a Stand Against Prohibition.

WARNING IS PRONOUNCED FOR LIQUOR INTERESTS

Bryan Says These Interests Are in Conspiracy Against Everything Good—Hopes to See Democratic Party Favor Prohibition Wherever Question Is Raised.

Washington, April 7.—Secretary Bryan tonight made public a letter he had written to L. W. Kennington, Iowa, a prominent national committee man, expressing his opinion that the Iowa democrats would take a stand for prohibition and vote against liquor interests which could be controlled by the liquor interests.

In a statement given out with the letter Mr. Bryan said he hoped the democratic party take the prohibition side wherever the question was raised, and that if the liquor interests of a national committee man, the people opposed to the liquor traffic could not afford to ignore the question.

Mr. Bryan said that the liquor question will be an issue in the campaign next year. Mr. Bryan added that the present time is a time when the people of either the democratic or republican party, but there is no reason why the national committee should not represent the sentiment of the party on this subject as on other subjects.

Mr. Kennington had written Mr. Bryan that his name was being used in behalf of a candidate for the national committee.
