

THAW'S ATTORNEYS TO FIGHT BEFORE GOVERNOR FEXKER
Will Get Personal Hearing Before Chief Executive of New Hampshire When Extradition Papers Are Presented.
THREE OF ATTORNEYS ALREADY AT CAPITAL
Court Hearing in Colebrook Is Dispensed With in View of Decision to Fight the Case Out at Concord.

Colebrook, N. H., September 12.—The protracted court battle denied Harry K. Thaw in Canada by his sudden departure to New Hampshire. His newly-retained counsel hope to have a personal hearing before Governor Fexker on the writ of habeas corpus. Three of the attorneys—N. E. Martin, of Concord; William H. Olmstead, of New York; and Merrill Shattuck, of Colebrook, hurried to the capital today.

Sheriff Hornbeck, of Dutchess county, N. Y., where Thaw is located, the Massachusetts man who tonight with the requisition warrants, signed by Acting Governor Olmstead, the document was filed before Governor Fexker, the New York lawyers were charged at the sheriff's mistake in heading for Colebrook. Upon his arrival, however, another representative of the state will be hurried to Concord.

Wednesday next, according to Thaw's lawyers, they expect to have their hearing before Governor Fexker. They estimate that three days will elapse before he can render a decision. If this is so, the writ will apply at once for a writ of habeas corpus. Argument on this writ will be postponed for one week.

World News Long Delay.
This would mean days of weary waiting unless William Travers Jerome can engineer some relief. He had in mind now a plan to seize the fugitive in case his deportation is ordered and block efficiency of the habeas corpus writ by bringing Thaw to the attention of whom Thaw would be directed against the prisoner's custodian at Colebrook.

Kidnaping Rumor Rife.
Thaw left his hotel but today to go to the harbor where he and ten special guards accompanied him. Rumors of kidnaping were rampant. The citizens of Quebec, who was denounced yesterday by Jerome as the leader of the anti-terror movement, were called in his arrest on a charge of gambling, remained in Colebrook today in spite of the ill feeling of the crowd. A motor car was used to take Thaw to the fact prevented Thaw from being taken for an airing this afternoon.

The sheriff had advised to take the prisoner on a ride and Thaw and his lawyers were about to climb in the machine when the report spread that two cars bearing Canadians were stationed a half-mile or so out of town toward the Canadian frontier.

HARDWICK DRAPS CURRENCY BILL

Georgia Congressman Says It Will Cause Five Years of Inflated Credit and Then a Financial Crash.

Washington, September 12.—(Special.)—Representative W. Hardwick of the tenth district, declared in the house today that the administration currency bill would cause boom times and inflation of credits and currency for five years and then a financial crash.

Reckless Day Will Come.
"I shall vote for the bill as a good democrat, because I believe in standing by the caucus," said Mr. Hardwick, "but I will say, I did my best to change it." "I make this prediction, and I want Mr. Glass, the author of the bill, to bear it in mind in years to come. If this bill becomes a law, as I doubtless will, you will have prosperity, expansion, more loans, more credits and boom times generally for five years. The goose will look good, but it is the true of a nation, as well as of an individual, that pay day always comes around."

Trusts Banking System.
"We will enjoy for five years having our money discounted and the eye flooded with currency. There will be too great an extension of credit, overtrading and overproduction until the final reckoning comes. We have made the sky the limit in this new currency issue, and God knows there is no such limit. The bill has been issued somebody will go to the United States treasury and say: 'I will gold for this paper currency. You have promised to redeem it in gold or law. I want gold, and I want to know how are you going to get the gold?'"

Several republican members suggested that the government might redeem the notes in lawful money other than gold. "I would come in the end to the same thing," persisted Mr. Hardwick.

Trusts Banking System.
He declared that the republicans had established a national banking system, the payment of currency into the gold into the treasury in time of need. He explained that this was accomplished by the simple method of making that the present national bank notes might not be received at the treasury for the payment of custom duties. He said that the federal reserve notes, as provided in the bill, would be used to pay all debts, public and private.

HONOR TO GAYNOR PAID BY ENGLAND; BODY IS IN STATE
Never Before Has a Casket Laid in Historic Town Hall of Liverpool Where Mayor Gaynor's Remains Rest.

Indications Point to Verdict of Voluntary Manslaughter, Which Would Carry a Sentence of From Ten to Twenty Years.

While Signal Honor Was Being Paid Memory of New York's Late Mayor Plans Are Laid for Tribute.
Liverpool, September 12.—The body of William Jay Gaynor lay in state today at the foot of the grand stairway of the town hall of Liverpool.

It was an unprecedented honor that Liverpool great and small, and the British of the American metropolis, for never before had anyone lain in state in the historic edifice. Covered with the stars and stripes and with the British union jack draped over its foot, the casket rested on a catafalque brought here from Westminster Abbey, London, and on which had been placed the bodies of many of England's most famous men. It was last used at the funeral of Field Marshal Lord Wolsey, in St. Paul's cathedral last March.

Candles in the great golden chandeliers from Westminster Abbey cast a glow outside the dock gates. As soon as the funeral procession was over and the detail of picked men from the Liverpool police force, who stood guard all night about the catafalque, had retired, the mayor of the city, who is absent on vacation, had telegraphed the city officials to do something in their own honor of the dead mayor of New York, and they carried out their instructions in minute detail.

When the steamer Baltic, on board which Mayor Gaynor died as he last Wednesday, docked at 4:30 o'clock this evening the landing stage was cleared of all persons except the holders of tickets. A great crowd had assembled outside the dock gates. As soon as the steamer had left the dock, the mayor of the city, who is absent on vacation, had telegraphed the city officials to do something in their own honor of the dead mayor of New York, and they carried out their instructions in minute detail.

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BENEATH THE CRUST.

Always old, ever new, is the shock that comes to humanity with the revelation that in each of us lurks an animal with fangs and claws, ready when driven to bay to tear through the crust with which we so proudly veneer our bovine civilization.

The woman simply thought she had been thrown into the scrap-heap by her husband. This was not enough, she had enough to have displaced that pest that separates us from the animals that run on four feet.

Then reason fled. Alone with these riotous passions, nature gives us a brilliant-robin. The bird-robin was missing in this case, as it has been since the prehistoric dawn.

At our doors. A strong appeal for the churches to interest themselves in the education and morality of the negro is the substance of a communication from Bishop C. K. Nelson, of the Episcopal diocese of Atlanta, published elsewhere.

At our doors. Bishop Nelson refers to the report that the Roman Catholics have undertaken such work in Atlanta and takes exception to the statement that no other church has done the same thing.

It has been the uniform contention of the constitution that the missionary duty of the white churches of the south lay as strongly in the Christianizing of the negroes of the south as of the Hindus in India or the Chinese on the Yangtze-Kiang.

The negro is important. He is at our doors and our throats. He enters our homes. He comes in contact with us hourly in business, on the trolleys, in general public places.

He is ill, we are exposed to the contagion. And remembering that a large percentage of the race is diseased, this count is an extremely important one. One diseased negro well may menace an entire white ward.

Disease doesn't respect the color line, or the boundaries of geography. Disease and

immorality and inefficiency can't be segregated. We wish they could. It is a matter of racial prejudice. It is in the analysis which counts, a matter of self-preservation and, at that, the preservation of the white race.

That is why the Constitution views the duty of the southern churches toward the negro as a sacred trust. For a community that is well justified in the precepts of religion is a moral community. A moral community is a community that is sanitary. A moral and a sanitary community looks after the sort of education by which it nurtures and for which it is fitted.

And certainly the south is in need of leadership and assistance of that nature from the white churches to the southern negro.

LA FOLLETTE, THE WISE.

Whatever his motive in voting with the senate democrats for the Underwood-Simmons bill, the political wisdom of Senator Robert M. La Follette, of Wisconsin, impresses itself upon the observer with a firm memory. The senator could not, in the first place, have voted against the bill and maintained consistency with his previous assertions and alignments. Confessedly, the bill was not exactly such as he wished he would have favored. But as he viewed it, it carried a measure of relief, and he realized he could not oppose it and justify himself to his constituency or to the country.

Hardly less important, politically, is the contrast of the attitudes of La Follette and Roosevelt upon this paramount issue. From first to last, through his seven years' administration and through his bull moose campaign, the senator's tariff program was the most nebulous description. A wizard at reading the nation's mind as to their wishes, he failed on the tariff. This was a little question that his straddling, ineffectual and academic tariff plank cost him hundreds of thousands of votes during the recent presidential campaign.

Upon the other hand, the views of La Follette and his expression of them have been clear as a bell. You were never at a loss where to place him. You might think him eccentric and at times fanatical, but his opinions never lacked boldness and precision.

Just what bearing the tariff stand will have on La Follette's political future it is folly to attempt to predict. The situation is as yet undecided. The lines of the road, but should be driven by past deeds aptly to contest with Roosevelt for the leadership of the republican "progressives," the courage of his attitude appears to have given him a far handicap, aside from the prognostic personality of the edon.

They know that insanity, blindness, tuberculosis, susceptibility to all other so-called "respectable" diseases lurk in their train.

Yet we stand around with our hands and shut our mouths and stand our hands when it comes to placing a check upon them. We go out like a house afire after typhoid and yellow fever. We are against tuberculosis and dracoon upon their respective legs.

And when it comes to these diseases that get down to the very basis of human life, to the perpetuation of the race—we preserve a "discreet" silence! Heaven save the mark. We leave children to be miseducated, we neglect the care of their bodies, we risk the contamination of innocent women—and call ourselves "discreet."

This is nothing less than blinking blindly at a death's head. The world is coming to the point when each member of society, in justice to the other, will be forced to be wholly candid, to submit to prescribed limitations—whether the affliction be a satirically misnamed "respectable" disease or whether it be one of those murderous social evil diseases that go under the name of the "black scourge."

COTTON REAGINED MOST OF ITS LOSS

Opening at Decline of 12 to 14 Points, Market Rallied in Afternoon and Closed Near the Best of the Day.

New York, September 12.—The reactionary or more bearish sentiment noted in the cotton market during yesterday's trading was not evidenced again early today, but a sharp break in prices was recovered, and while the rally was not fully maintained, the close was steady, not unchanged to a point lower.

Weak Liverpool cables, more favorable crop reports and bearish European trade advices were responsible for the early selling, and after opening barely steady, the decline of 12 to 14 points, the market broke to a net loss of 20 to 22 points late in the morning.

Offerings tapered off, however, around 12:47 for September, when \$3 per bale under the high price of last Tuesday, and the market later, on trade reports that too much rain was falling on open cotton in the Southeast and reports that contracts sold earlier in the day had been absorbed by the market.

Reheating caused some irregularity in the late trading, but the market closed within 4 or 5 points of the previous day's closing.
