be prepared by medical experts to be used in the trial, showing every second and mark.

"On examining these specimens as to the purpose of the examination, Solicitor Dorsey declared Wednesday forenoon that it was not for the purpose of obtaining a record of the fingerprints. One of the principal reasons for the action, he said, was to get a strand of the girl's hair in order to compare it with the hair found on the lathing machine in the tipping department at the factory. It was at this point that the detectives discovered blood spots on the floor and other evidences of a struggle. "I cannot talk in regard to the matter," he said. "The body was exhumed, it is true, at my request. But to reveal further plans would be harmful."

Thinks She Didn't Leave Factory.

The solicitor is in entire accord with the theory that Mary Phagan never left the factory after she received her pay Saturday noon. He declared that if any search was being made for the man, search would be on Saturday, April 26, at the Terminal Station, it was not being conducted under his direction.

The results of the chemical analysis in the laboratory of Dr. Harris in the State Capitol have not yet been made public. Dr. Harris would not admit Wednesday that traces of lead had been found, bearing out the belief that the girl was drugged and rendered helpless before she was slain in the factory.

All of the remaining evidence in the case will be presented when the coroner's inquest resumes Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

It is the purpose of Coroner Doherty to limit testimony to the points that are regarded as essential, so that the hearing may be concluded by Thursday night.

Have Two Hundred Names.

The coroner and the solicitor General have the names of about 200 persons whom they may call for testimony. These include girls and women employed at the pencil factory.

So far as the line of testimony can be anticipated from the information given out by the authorities, the most important will come from the physicians and chemists who have been at work on the mystery under the direction of Coroner Doherty and Solicitor Dorsey.

Dr. H. F. Harris, director of the State Board of Health, will submit a report on his chemical analysis of the contents of Mary Phagan's stomach. Dr. Harris also made a careful examination of the wounds and bruises on the body and will report on this to the jury.

Dr. J. W. Hurt, county physician, made the first examination of the girl's body after it was found in the basement of the factory. He also was present when it was exhumed from the grave in the Marlett cemetery and another examination made in the order of Solicitor General Dorsey. He will report on the results of his examination to the jury some time during the hearing Thursday.

LONDON, May 7.—The suffragettes again today attempted to blow up St. Paul's Cathedral, the largest and most magnificent Protestant church in the world.

A policeman on his beat near St. Paul's Cathedral saw two women emerge from the church during the early morning hours. His suspicions were aroused and he investigated. At the foot of the altar he saw a splintered case and established it with his foot.

Near Explosion When Found: The case was attached to a powerful bomb and had almost burned to the ignition point when the policeman arrived. Delay of the moments would have meant the possible destruction of the Cathedral.

The bomb was taken to Scotland Yard where it was examined. It was found to contain gunpowder, dynamite and other explosives, but had no detonators. The bomb which was discovered near The Star office in Beaver Street was of similar construction.

SUFFRAGETTE DYNAMITERS FAIL IN ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

Three Bombs Placed Following Defeat of Franchise Bill Last Night. Westminster Abbey in Peril--Prize Dogs and Race Horses Doomed.

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian.
LONDON, May 7.—The suffragette dynamite squad today attempted to blow up St. Paul's Cathedral, the largest and most magnificent Protestant Church in the world. A few minutes later another bomb was discovered near the building occupied by The Star, a Liberal newspaper which has been supporting the government in its fight against granting the franchise to women.

A third bomb was discovered in the business district near a building occupied by a firm of wholesale chemists. But for the vigilance of the police and of special watchmen a large area of London would have been blown up.

A policeman on his beat near St. Paul's Cathedral saw two women emerge from the church during the early morning hours. His suspicions were aroused and he investigated. At the foot of the altar he saw a sparking fuse and extinguished it with his foot.

Near Explosion When Found.
The fuse was attached to a powerful bomb and had almost burned to the ignition point when the policeman arrived. Delay of a few moments would have meant the possible destruction of the Cathedral.

The bomb was taken to Scotland Yard where it was examined. It was found to contain gunpowder, guncotton and dynamite. It had two detonators. The bomb which was discovered near The Star office in Boar's Street was of similar construction.

Since the defeat in the House of Commons last night of the female suffrage bill by a vote of 245 against 215, the militants have been aroused to a pitch of frenzy heretofore not seen in their campaign for the vote.

Their anarchistic actions are causing grave alarm to the officers of the government, who are becoming more and more perplexed as to how to stop the outrages.

Members of the militants are threatening to destroy all the imposing cathedrals in England.

Another threat is made to kill every prize-winning dog and race horse. This threat was contained in a letter received by Miss Violet Cross, owner of Choo-Tai, the \$10,000 prize-winning Pekinese, which was poisoned by militants.

The letter said:
"Madam—We are very sorry your pretty dog was sacrificed, but our rules must be inexorably enforced, and we are resolved to stop at nothing now. Every valuable prize-winning dog or race horse will be maimed or killed when the chance presents itself until we get voters everywhere."

Never before in his history has Scotland Yard been so active. Special squads to deal with suffragettes are being formed to patrol the city. A constant guard will be kept around Westminster Abbey. Female women charged with the blowing up of this magnificent edifice.

Tried to Assure Blast.
From Scotland Yard the St. Paul's bomb was taken to the Home Office. It was found that in addition to the fuse the bomb had an electric wire in case the fuse went out. Private watchmen have been guarding the cathedral since the suffrage militants became acutely dangerous, and the police are pushed to ascertain how the women entered the church without being seen.

As a result of the attempt upon the cathedral, the public was closed to the public. Even foreign tourists who were unable to prove their identity were refused admission.

PHAGAN GIRL'S BODY EXHUMED FOR FINGER PRINTS AND OTHER CLEWS

Third Time Unfortunate Victim's Remains Have Been Exhumed--Dorsey Says Officials Are Not Looking for Finger Prints, but Other Clews.

The body of Mary Phagan was exhumed early Wednesday for the second time in two days.

The unofficial explanation is that the exhumation is made for the purpose of making a microscopic and minute examination of every wound on the body for finger prints and other clews as well.

Solicitor Dorsey let it be known that the police are not working on the idea that the finger prints would be helpful in solving the mystery, if indeed there are any finger prints to be found, as the body has been embalmed and has been handled by many persons since it was first discovered in the basement of the pencil factory.

Nevertheless, it may be safely said that a microscopic examination will be made of every mark on the body.

It was reported before the departure was made for Marietta that a Berillon expert had been engaged and that if any finger prints were found, photographs would be taken and the most careful measurements made for the purpose of the examination.

Will Compare Finger Marks.
With these records in their possession, the authorities will compare them with the finger prints of Frank and Lee, as well as with those of any suspects that are taken later.

Notwithstanding these specializations as to the purpose of the exhumation, the body was declared Wednesday forenoon that it was not for the purpose of obtaining a record of the fingerprints. One of the principal reasons for the action, he said, was to get a strand of the girl's hair in order to compare it with the hair found on the latting machine in the tipping department at the factory.

Solicitor Dorsey, on whose behalf the body was exhumed on both occasions, refused to go further into the reasons for his action.

"I cannot talk in regard to this matter," he said. "The body was exhumed at my request. But to reveal further details would be hurtful."

Thinks She Didn't Leave Factory.
The Solicitor is in entire accord with the theory that Mary Phagan never left the factory after her removal from the payroll room. He declared that if any search was being made for the man seen with a girl Saturday, April 26, at which the Terminal station, it was being conducted under his direction.

Dr. Harris will make a more thorough examination of the wounds of the girl than has been made previously. He believed that this examination is being made to confirm a new theory that has been advanced by Dr. Harris of the Solicitor General.

POLICE HAVE NEW AND STARTLING EVIDENCE IN MURDER OF MARY PHAGAN. BODY OF MARY PHAGAN EXHUMED, BLOODSTAINS ON CLOTHING ANALYZED AND EVERY EFFORT MADE TO UNCOVER ADDITIONAL CLEWS IN THE MYSTERY.

Solicitor General Dorsey, Chief of Detectives Lanford, Chief of Police Beavers, and all men working under them in the Phagan case seem thoroughly satisfied with the progress they are making in the great mystery. They are actively engaged in many unknown directions--as they say, "piling up evidence to strengthen the case."

What evidence the officials have other than that which has already been made public they refuse to divulge. Solicitor Dorsey declines to make public his case in the newspapers. He is investigating every phase of the matter through trusted men working under his own direction.

It is perfectly proper for the chief prosecuting officer to withhold any and all evidence until such time as he may present his case to the Grand Jury.

That there is new and startling evidence seems true, but just what it indicates the officials refuse to say, and the newspaper reporters, therefore, are merely guessing at what may be, or may not be, the actual facts.

Solicitor Dorsey was reticent about the nature of the most recent discovery, but his guarded statement indicated that he considered the disclosures which have been made by the force of detectives, physicians and chemists working under his direction as having a most important bearing in the solution of the crime.

Mr. Dorsey issued this statement: I see in an interview attributed to Quinn that I asked him if he said he was not paid by counsel for Frank to protect Frank.

This statement, so far as I am concerned, is absolutely false. Throughout my talk with him I did not mention the name of Quinn, nor did I intimate that counsel had been guilty of any such conduct.

It is known that a more thorough and minute examination of every locality and every article having any connection or possible connection with the slaying of Mary Phagan is being made now than was undertaken in the first few days of the mystery.

Under the direction of Solicitor Dorsey, chemists have made a new analysis of the blood found on the factory floor, where the Phagan girl was killed, through her assistant.

Dr. H. F. Harris, director of the State Board of Health, is making a second examination of the body of the slain girl, which was taken from the grave in the cemetery at Marietta.

Whether it was from any one of the sources that Solicitor Dorsey obtained his new lead in tracking down the slayer, he would not say. He would only repeat that every clue that offered the slightest ray of hope would be followed to the end.

May Have Been Hurled Down Shaft, starting theory announced by the Solicitor is that the body of Mary Phagan was thrown, alive, down the elevator shaft from the second floor to the basement. He has found that the girl was not dead when she fell to the bottom of the shaft but that she died shortly after she had been seriously injured by a fall of this distance. He would not be surprised if subsequent developments proved that the girl was slain not in the second floor of the factory, but in the basement at just about the spot where the body was found.

To insure that not the slightest particle of evidence is overlooked, Solicitor Dorsey is continuing his rigid investigation of the factory itself. Electric lights have been strung in every nook and corner of the basement, where before it was black and gloomy. To dirt and trash covering the floor is being searched painstakingly in the hope that some set-the-screw may be discovered--that the girl's missing finger may be found, or that some article disclosing the identity of the

Youth Arrested in Connection With Phagan Mystery Protests Innocence. Woman Says He Moaned, "Why Did I Do It?"--Local Men Skeptical.

Chief of Detectives George Peyton, of Houston, Texas, sent the following telegram to Chief of Police Beavers, of Atlanta, Tuesday: "Am still holding Bowen as per your wire this morning. He did stop at 185 Ivy Street. He denies everything. The evidence here is very strong against him. Mrs. A. Blanchard, formerly of Atlanta, first to suspect gave first information about him. Answer soon."

HOUSTON, TEXAS, May 6.—Paul P. Bowen, arrested because of the suspicion of the local authorities that he was connected with the murder of Mary Phagan in Atlanta, denied Tuesday all knowledge of the girl and the crime except as he read of it in the newspapers.

A score of clippings telling the story of the little girl's death were found in the young man's room. His only explanation was that Atlanta was his home town, and he was particularly interested in the crime because of that.

The police here regard as more significant than the clippings, the stories of Bowen's actions in his room at the St. Jean Hotel, and later at a rooming house. Roomers in adjoining rooms are said to have been disturbed by his moans and mutterings and by his constant pacing of the floor.

"Why did I do it? Why did I do it?" he is declared to have repeated to himself incessantly. Complaint was first made to the hotel authorities and later the police were notified.

Bowen was arrested last night by Chief of Police Davison, Chief of Detectives Peyton and Detective Hilton at 1225 Texas Avenue.

"A night of terror," as officers term it, led to the detention of Bowen. Sunday night in room 214, at the St. Jean Hotel, the young man paced the floor and moaned. Persons in adjoining rooms were unable to sleep, and reported to the management that something was wrong in the room.

An investigation by Houston Police Council appropriating \$5,000 for the purpose, to-day his move is backed by strong support.

For certain purposes a Coroner's inquest sometimes is permitted under the law prior to Grand Jury investigation.
