## DIPLOMAT TAKES PROTEST TO BRYAN HOME

## POLICE STILL WITHHOLD EVIDENCE Frank To Be Examined on New Lines



Witnesses Are Quizzed in Detail, but Nothing Important Brought Out. Officials Say They Are Satisfied With Case as It Is Being Developed.

Whatever evidence the police officials may have directly to connect any one of the suspects with the killing of Mary Phagan, it was not produced at the early session of the coroner's inquest Thursday.

W. W. ("Boots") Rogers, former county policeman, and Lemmie Quinn, foreman in the tipping department at the National Penel Factory, were the principal witnesses. Neither gave testimony that was materially damaging to either Leo M. Frank or New Lee, who are being held in connection with the crime.

He said he became convinced of his mistake when Detective came out to his place and had Daisy Brown to dress as she was Saturday afternoon. When he discovered, he said, that she was the girl he had mistaken for Mary Phagan.

Daisy Brown was placed on the stand and testified that he had passed along Mitchell Avenue at that time Saturday, April 26.

She said she knew Mary Phagan, but could not understand how Watkins had mistaken her for Mary Phagan, as Mary was a little shorter and heavier.

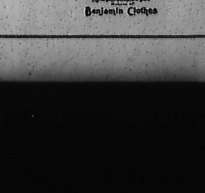

Frank's Stenographer and Girl Employee of Pencil Company Also on Stand.

Following is the testimony of the early-witnesses at the Phagan inquest today:
