Conley's Story Cinches Case Against Frank, Says Lanford

He Has Told the Whole Truth-There's Not a Lawyer Who Can Shake Him,' Asserts Chief.

IM CONLEY has told the whole truth—there's not the shadow M CONLEY has told the whole truth—there's not the shadow of a doubt about it. We feel perfectly satisfied now with the case against Frank. If we had the least suspicion that his story were false, we could not feel satisfied—we would be puzzled and worried just as much as when the crime was first committed.

Onley's evidence

Frank He will go on the winess stand in the trial of Frank and tell his story just as he has told it to the officers. There's not a lawyer in the whole United States—no matter how shrewd he may be—who could shake that negro's testimony—because it's the truth. No person could doubt this after seeing him re-mant that tragedy in the penell factory Friday. It was the most dramatic and remarkable spectacle ever witnessed here, and thoroughly convinced us that the negro was acting a role vividly mipressed on his mind from already having portrayed it in tragic realism.

Gonley's story makes the case against Frank direct and positive. It is no longer a case of circumstantial evidence. We were already convinced that we could convict Frank with the web of circumstances woven about him, but now we have direct evidence on which to rely, and which is corroborated by this maze of condemning circumstances.

Conley will make no further confession—there's none for him to make. There is not a feature of his story that causes me to doubt that he has told all be knows.

From the very first we suspected that Frank was guilty, but we were never prejudiced against him. We have entertained every possible theory and worked on many different lines, as have all of the detectives on the case, and have been open to conviction. But every bit of real evidence unearthed pointed to Frank, and now the confession of Conley makes it all plain.—NEWPORT LANFORD, Chief of Detectives.



Scott's Bitter Disappointment---He Arrives at the Pole Only To Find Capt. Amundsen's Tent and Flag

THE upper photograph shows Captain Scott peering into the tent erected by Captain Amundsen at the South Pole. The tent is in excellent condition, and one which would furnish adequate protection against Antarctic weather. Standing about it, from left to right, are Captain Oates, Petry Officer Evans, Captain Scott and Dr. Wilson. This is a most romarkable pohtograph, showing, as it does, the arrival of the Scott party at the South Pole, and at the same time the evidence of the triumph of Captain Amundsen. Flying above the tent is to be seen the Norwegian flag which Amundsen left flying as evidence of his victory.

In the lower photograph Captain Scott and his companions are shown starting their final dash over the ice and snow to the South Pole. Hauling the heavy sledges themselves, they covered the distance of more than 500 miles on skis. Some idea of the difficulties of their travel may be obtained by a glance at the weighted sledges shown in the picture.

Photograph That Captain Scott and His Comrades Made of Themselves at the South Pole, and the Tent in Which They Died

THE upper photograph was taken at the South Pole and is the last one of the five heroic members of the expedition. Standing from left to right they are Petty Officer Evans, Gaptain Scott and Dr. Wilson. Below are Lieutenant Bowers and Gaptain Oates. The photograph was taken at the pole by Lieutenant Bowers, who first focused the camera, then took his place before the group, and exposed the negative by pulling a string, which may be seen in his right hand, and is indicated by the arrow.

The lower photograph shows the tent in which were found the bodies of Captain Scott, Dr. Wilson and Lieutenant Bowers. To the right, as shown in the photograph, was found the luggage of the party resting upon a sledge. The body of Captain Scott was found in a half-sitting position against a tent pole. His head was supported by his diary, in which he had detailed the tragic last moments of the expedition, and it was in this tent that Captain Scott, starving and half frozen, wrote his last words. See that your sewerage system is in good order. Pour kerosene into the drains.

Cover food after a meal. Burn or bury all le refuse. Screen all food exposed for sale. table refuse. Buy no food that has been exposed to flies.

But our indifference and carelessness are as stupid and as harmful as their religion and without religious excuse.

Every manure pile should be covered, on the farms and everywhere else. intelligent farmer knows that this increases the value of the fertilizer more than thirty per cent. It decreases the breeding of flies to a greater degree. The manure pile, the heap of filth, such are the breeding places of the fly

No accumulation of filth in stables or elsewhere in a big city should be permit ted to stand more than six days. It takes the common fly nine days to hatch, Compel by law the removal of manure from stables every six daysand you remove the unhatched fly from the city.

This should be worked out by government through pressure of public opinion. When we have some slight threat of smallpox or of Asiatic cholera, we are all excited, health boards become active and quarantines are established, although there is very little danger now in such diseases.

Yet, with the buzzing flies everywhere, carrying disease germs on their spongy feet to the faces of the children, depositing these disease germs on food of all kinds, to be eaten later, and although these flies cause annually tens of thousands of deaths that are unnecessary, WE REMAIN CALLOUS AND INDIFFERENT.

If the foot and mouth disease oreaks out among cattle, the county and State are quarantined. Hog cholera, sheep diseases and other cases are watched and suppressed with all the energy of the Govern-

And in the meanwhile we have in every city the billions of disease carrying flies hurrying from the accumulated filth to the table, and there is no effort for a change.

And we have the swamps breed ing their endless billions of mos quitoes to keep alive malaria in the blood of human beings, and there is no real war against that plague. It is useless except for the protection of the individual family to suppress the fly nuisance in one place or drain the swamp or cover

the cesspool in another.

Darwin told us that one single pair of flies in forty-eight hoursthe quick-breeding African flywill lay enough eggs and breed enough maggots to devour a lion, leaving nothing but the white bones.

A few flies surviving through the Winter start the plague afresh the following year.

And one careless citizen leaving a breeding ground for mosquitoes supplies enough to infest the whole

Fortunately, for two or three years the people have been alive to the fact that their enemies are the tiny fly and mosquito and the invisible disease germs - enemies more deadly and dangerous than ever were the great monsters of prehistoric times or the wolves and lions of our day.

Discussion has begun, newspa-pers have taken it up and offered A few public officials have prizes. A few public officials have at least TRIED to do something. But only a beginning has been made.

The country must realize the danger and the duty. Children must be taught that the killing of flies is a good and neces-sary act, painful as it is to take life.

Do what you can to arouse public feeling

for the sake of the public safety.
And in the meanwhile DO WHAT YOU
CAN INDIVIDUALLY.

Kill the flies!





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
