MISS BOMBARDERS COMMONS WITH FLOUR SHELS

Suffrage Sympathizer Keeps Up Pelting From Gallery Fifteen Minutes Till Subdued.

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian. LONDON, June 11.—A man sympathizer with the woman suffrage cause created a wild scene in the House of Commons this afternoon and was ejected after a struggle.

Armed with a number of "bombs" composed of paper bases filled with flour and a great sheet of waterproof paper, the man galloped across to the speaker's gallery. He remained quiet until Premier Aquith started an address. Then he stood up and hurled an awful shower of pamphlets from the gallery.

The members of the House looked up in alarm at the cloudburst of literature, but while they were still open-mouthed the suffrage adherent threw a "bomb" at Mr. Aquith. The missile missed its mark but struck a parliamentary clerk in the face. He fell to the floor and arose like a ghost, a member sitting near the ministerial bench shouting and calling for a glass of water. By this time numbers were rushing about the gallery, screaming to the speaker.

Four bombs were dropped and popping all about Premier Aquith was the sound of the bombardment. He was not hit. Several others near the speaker were nearly smothered by the deluge of flour.

Police men rushed into the gallery and tried to arrest the "bomb" thrower, but it was over fifteen minutes before he submitted. He was put down to and warned not to enter the Parliament Building again.

G. M. NAPIER ANALYZES PHAGAN CASE

In a Brilliant Letter He Arrays
Facts as They Affect Leo M.
Frank and Conley.

The Georgian publishes the following letter written by George M. Napier, the well-known lawyer, on the Phagan case, as it gives for the first time a legal analysis of the case for and against Frank.

"To the Editor of The Georgian:
This section of our country has held very few criminal cases so profoundly interesting as the Phagan case. Indeed, it is a questionable whether the entire South has ever had enacted within it a crime which has created such intense and widespread interest.

Personally, I have no concern in the case, save as a citizen of the State, desiring that the guilty party or parties may receive condign punishment.

Profoundly interested as I am as a lawyer, being interested more intimately perhaps than those not of that profession, certain aspects of the case—the procedure taken in the trial—a legal analysis of the case for and against Frank.

One thing had been made evident: The people generally are disposed to see the guilt to one who has the opportunity to commit crime. This was shown by the widely-accepted conclusion that Leo Frank and his colored were guilty of the murder of the Phagan girl, as soon as it became known that they had been in the pencil factory on the day of the homicide.

Man's Daughter as President
of \$500,000 Concern.

JACKSONVILLE, June 11.—Miss Orla Painter, daughter of the late E. O. Painter, was elected president of the E. O. Painter Fertilizer Company at a meeting of the stockholders held last night. At the same time it was decided to increase the capital stock of the company from \$250,000 to \$500,000, with the privilege of increasing the liabilities to an equal amount.

Another reason why the daughter is the logical person for president of the company is that she controls the majority portion of the stock. Her father had \$100,000 of the outstanding \$250,000 issue. Under his will all of this, except \$25,000 distributed in special bequests, goes equally to Miss Painter and her mother, Mrs. Martha Painter. The daughter retains the exclusive voting power of the \$25,000 issue. She also represents her mother in the estate.

Painter Planned Increase.
The action of the stockholders in doubling the capital stock is simply carrying out the plans made by Painter. He had worked out the details whereby most stock of the stock would be sold to planters in Florida and South Georgia, who in turn would buy their fertilizer from the Painter company, thus increasing the volume of business done and give the painter stockholders small returns in the form of dividends.

And at the same time Painter, giving her the control of the company, was able to declare a stock dividend, paying the old stockholders proportionate shares of the new stock. The plan, of course, was to secure enough of the new stock to give him a majority of the company, but he plans to retain full control of the business.

REYNOLDS QUIT NOW WITH WILSON

Attorney General's Split With President Open Secret at Capital--Resignation Expected.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The first sign of the anticipated friction in President Wilson's Cabinet was made in the appearance, and as a result Washington to-day confidently awaits the news that a member of the President's official family is preparing to resign. Attorney General J. C. McReynolds is the most prominent member of the official family who is getting ready to quit the Cabinet because of trouble with his chief. The friction between the President and the Attorney General dates back almost to the inauguration. The President considers that the work of the Department of Justice should be kept entirely secret. "Private publications," according to the President, "are inclined to apply to the operations of all of the governmental branches except the Department of State and Justice—the former because international politics is not thought to be fit matter for exploitation in the public prints, the latter because of the danger of warning those about to be prosecuted when the Government agents are on their trail."

"Leaks" in Department. The Attorney General had other ideas, which he did not hesitate to express to his chief, who, as usual, was unyielding. In the Department of Justice, there were a number of "leaks" in the Department of Justice.
