## YALE TIES PRINCETON, 3 TO 3 Frank Files Reasons for New Trial

### PHAGAN CASE IN SUPREME COURT

Argument To Be Set for Decem-  
ber 15 and Final Decision May  
Be Made by March.

All doubt as to when the argument  
will be heard by the Supreme Court  
in the Phagan case was set at rest  
Saturday, when the bill of exceptions,  
properly certified, was filed with the  
chief of the court for record.

This means the case will go on the  
calendar for argument on December  
15, although actual argument may  
not be heard for three or four days  
thereafter.

Arguments in the case may be  
made either orally and by brief or  
by brief alone. If oral arguments are  
made, the hearing likely will take  
several days. If briefs are relied upon  
entirely, however, the hearing will be  
extremely short and non-spectacular.

Following the submitting of argu-  
ments the court of review will take  
the case under advisement for such  
length of time as it deems necessary,  
not to exceed twelve months, how-  
ever. If the case takes the usual  
course a final ruling may be looked  
for about March.

If the verdict and reasons of the  
lower court are affirmed as matters  
of law, the case ends so far as the  
State of Georgia is concerned, and  
the execution of the defendant in the  
trial court alone will be necessary to  
close the case.

If the case is reversed, it will go  
back to the lower court for retrial,  
exactly as if it had never been tried,  
and likely will come on for trial again  
in July of next year.

### 3 AMERICANS DIE IN FALL OF JAUREZ

Rebels in Night Attack Rout the  
Huerta Forces--Powers Back  
U. S. in New Note.

Special Cable to The American.  
MEXICO CITY, Nov. 15.—  
Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy  
has gone to the national palace to  
see General Huerta. Indications  
at the American Embassy were  
that he was the bearer of a mes-  
sage. While he was at the pal-  
ace Mexican officials declared that  
Huerta had no intention of re-  
signing to-day.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—On re-  
ceipt of information that several  
Americans were killed during the  
capture of Juarez by the Constitu-  
tionalists early to-day, Secretary  
Bryan instructed Consul Edwards, at  
Juarez to investigate the matter and  
to report at once to the State De-  
partment.

Secretary Bryan admitted to-day  
that another note has been sent to  
President Huerta through Charge  
d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy. The Amer-  
ican charge will deliver this communi-  
cation to-day or to-morrow. Upon  
the reply of the Mexican President  
will depend whether the United  
States will withdraw its embassy  
from Mexico City.

The Secretary of State further as-  
serted that all the European nations  
have stated their intention of sup-  
porting the United States in its Mex-  
ican policy and added that Japan also  
has made plain the fact that it will  
support President Wilson.

News to this effect reached the  
State Department to-day directly  
from Tokyo and removed doubt from  
the minds of Government officials  
concerning the attitude of the Jap-  
anese government.

TOKYO, Nov. 14.—In addition to purchasing 15,000 machine guns and 15,000,000 rounds of ammunition in this country, General Huerta has placed orders for 45 pieces of artillery. The explanation given by the Mexican government was that the arms and munitions were needed to fight the rebels. According to military circles, Mexico could mount 200 effective guns, after the arrival of the 45 cannons. The armaments are en route for Mexico.

## Time for Action Here, Believes Huerta

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Secretary of State Bryan today declined to discuss the terms of the note which the United States is reported to have sent to Provisional President Huerta, but it is reported as certain that a blockade of Mexican ports by American warships is contemplated within 48 hours.

The State Department was in constant communication today with General Lina Vera Cruz and with Charge d'Affaires at Mexico City. Lina Vera Cruz reported that he has transmitted the American note to President Huerta, but no reply yet had reached Washington.

Charge d'Affaires telegraphed the department at length today concerning the developments at Mexico City, but this message was not made public.

Government officials are of the opinion that President Huerta has decided that the time for action has arrived. The Administration considers that it has given Huerta more than sufficient time to resign, and that now it is up to the United States to take more vigorous action.

To Sever Relations. The program announced includes the severance of all diplomatic relations with Mexico, the withdrawal of Charge d'Affaires and other American diplomats.

Following this, it is expected that an active blockade of all Mexican ports will be maintained by the second and third divisions of the Atlantic fleet now in Mexican waters, aided by the torpedo flotilla stationed at Charleston, S. C. As far as possible, this blockade will be peaceful, the American ships having orders only to turn back any commercial vessels carrying arms, ammunition or provisions into Mexico. When necessary to use arms, Mexican Government officials feel that they will be justified in starting out the country, and that as all Americans in Mexico have been several times warned to leave the country, their lives do not devolve on the United States.

The establishment of such blockades would preclude the entrance into Mexico of the supply of arms and

"Of course, there are some bad characters out there who have to be dealt with severely at times to keep them under control, but I have never witnessed or heard the prisoners discuss any of the cruelties which some of the men have alleged occurred there," said Howard.

"While the food has improved since the strike, it is not as good as it used to be, although I think the real food in it would be in the cooking," said Howard.

"With just a little more care it could be made much better. The quantity is small, awfully small, and if the prisoners had hard work to do they could not eat it all. But there is no hard work for them. My last meal there was dinner Thursday. It consisted of a meat ball about as big as my fist, some bread and water. The hall was made of scraps of meat, chopped up and cooked with flour."

"When a man's condition is not the best, they endeavor to care for him. For instance, I have been on a light diet for the last ten days. This consisted of oatmeal and milk three times a day. So far as my physical condition is concerned, I made progress for one day. I knew my physical condition would improve."

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## WILSON'S MONEY BILL IS READY FOR SENATE

Calls for Eight Regional Banks. Minority, Aided by Hitchcock, Frames Own Measure.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The currency reform bill, as it probably will be captioned by endorsed supporters of President Wilson, has just been completed by six Democrats of the Senate Banking and Currency Committee. Senator Hitchcock and the five Republican members of the committee continued to write late this afternoon the measure amending the White House has disapproved.

As completed, the measure provides for a system of eight regional banks, to be capitalized by endorsed subscriptions from the national banks of the country, with unlimited powers of redemption and currency issue and the power to hold reserves, the entire system to be under the control of a Federal Reserve Board.

In the final session the Democrats—Chairman Owen and Senators Pomeroy, Hollis, Reed, Overman and Shafroth—made minor amendments to the bill. They cut down the Federal Reserve Board from nine to six, as a former vote of the committee, to seven, as originally fixed in the House bill, the Secretary of the Treasury and six members to be appointed by the President "with regard to the financial, commercial and geographical divisions of the country."

Each member would hold office for six years, and would receive \$10,000 a year salary.

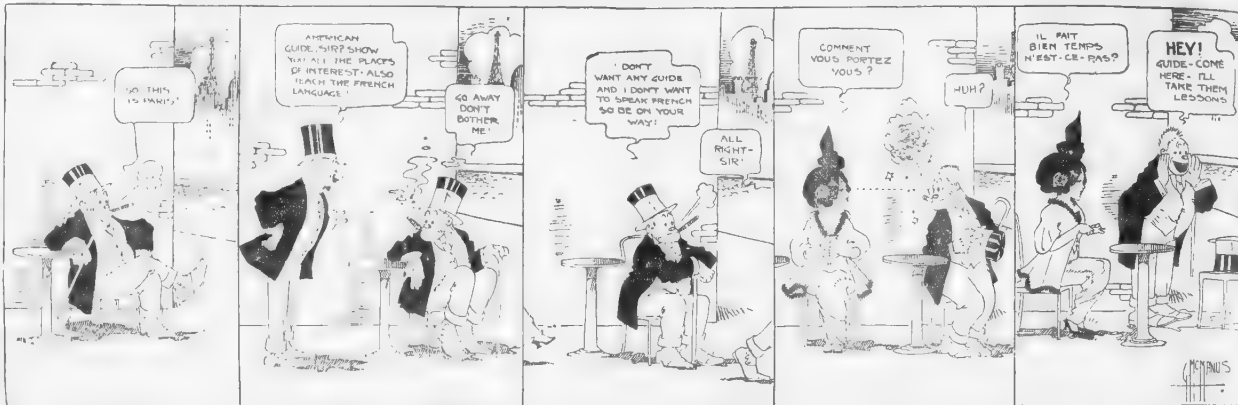
