



## DAN LEHON TAKES CHARGE OF PROBE OF FRANK CASE

Burns' Lieutenant Acts for His Chief While Latter is Out of City

Dan S. Lehon, of New Orleans, head of the southern division of the Burns agents, arrived in Atlanta yesterday morning to direct the probe of the Mary Phagan murder case in the absence of Detective Frank.

"I want to restate the statement of Mr. Burns," said Lehon, who is one of the Atlanta agents, "that this is a thoroughly impartial investigation, and that we are seeking the murderer of Mary Phagan, wherever it is."

"The man who killed this little girl should be punished to the full punishment. I tell you I am the father of seven children, and I would work on a case like this except to find the guilty man. It would be on the job to do nothing if I could not find the truth and nothing else. If the evidence points to Leo Frank as the girl's killer, then I know he may be certain we will say so."

Lehon states he has not come to Atlanta to work on any particular case of the case.

"I am going to New York, where Burns left yesterday, to go to New York," he said, "and continue the investigation of the case of Mary Phagan."

**REGULUS STUDIES OF WORK**

Lehon said his first job would be to interview the Atlanta agents, and the work which Burns has already done on the case, and that to that he would spend most of his time.

He would then go to New York to meet with C. E. Seear, head of the local agency.

Lehon declares he expects "the governor," as he calls Burns, back in a few days.

It is the famous detective's intention to make a return to Atlanta just as soon as he can get a clear view of the matter, which calls him to Washington and New York.

On his arrival in New York, another Burns lieutenant, who may be called to Atlanta on the case, may be ordered to New York to take charge of Lehon, on an important case in New York, but he, too, will hurry to Atlanta as soon as other business has been completed.

Lehon is characterized Lehon and Biddinger as two of the ablest detectives in America, and the probe by the Burns agents will be conducted by the former's arrival in the city.

There are said to be eight trained agents in the Burns organization, devoting their entire time to the Phagan case, and Lehon will direct their activities.

must be observed. What must now be done is to take the necessary steps of action being required by troops in supporting the civil power in protecting the public. The civil power, whose police is unable to do its own duty.

Attempts have been made to dissuade the men from obeying these lawful orders given to them when they are in regular service.

These attempts have amounted to the claim that officers and men of the regular army would be court-martialed if they obeyed these lawful and reasonable orders, saying they would obey in one case and not in another.

Declaratory actions have not been taken in this case, and the men in Colored Seelye continued:

At the same time as views and statements were made in the press and elsewhere made my position clear, I informed the commanding officer of each of these individuals that it was my opinion that it was my duty to support the civil power in its efforts to maintain order and to discipline. I told them they could let it be clearly understood that I would not be the man to be dealt with under the king's regulations.

If the commanding officer should tender his resignation I told the generals that they should ask for his resignation, and if he did not do so, he should be allowed to choose which order he would obey. I would submit to the king that it would be better that he be moved from the army.

**PRECAUTIONS SUGGESTED**

The following was followed by a letter dated March 14 from the war office to General Sir Arthur Paget commanding the British forces in Ireland. Sir Arthur was informed that attempts might be made to kill or injure British troops and to release persons to obtain possession of arms and ammunition. He was directed to take such steps and that special precautions should be taken to safeguard those who were sent to Ireland.


