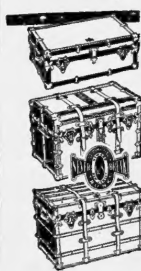

U. S. SOLDIER WOUNDED BY MEXICAN BULLET

Shot Came From Trenches Occupied by Troops Defending Naco, Sonora

(By Associated Press.) NACO, Ariz., Oct. 6.—Private Leroy Bradford of troop G, Tenth U. S. cavalry border patrol, was struck in the breast today by a bullet fired from trenches occupied by troops of General Benjamin Hill, defending Naco, Sonora, from the attacks of Governor Maytorena.

Bradford was in a trench dug for the protection of the American troops on the border line. His wound is said to be serious. Private Wilson of troop G, was hit by a stray bullet Sunday night. A boy was hit in the hand by a stray bullet yesterday. Two cavalry soldiers also have been shot. United States army officers reported that their men have been subjected to Mexican fire every time they stood up in their observation trenches, 400 yards north of the boundary. Captain Holcomb, commanding troop B, Tenth cavalry, said a machine gun was turned on his men yesterday. He himself was the target for five Mexican bullets as he was riding back to camp last night.

At midnight Colonel Guilfoyle, commanding the American troops, notified General Hill he personally would be held responsible if Mexican bullets were fired into American territory. Hill held his men back from the trenches for those who fired across the boundary. Maytorena sent emissaries to Hill last night with a proposition said to have been inspired by General Villa that an armistice be declared pending the Aguacateles peace conference. Hill declined to answer, and Maytorena's Yaqui Indians advanced for an attack but retreated under heavy fire.

Reforms Proposed by Carranza for Mexico

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, Oct. 6.—General Carranza proposed the following reforms for Mexico in the statement which he submitted last week, when offering resignation to the constitutional generals and governors of the states of Mexico: Assurance of municipal liberty; division of national lands and of lands which the government may acquire from large holders; reorganization of lands in the vicinity of municipalities of 50 population or more; the proceeds to be used in erecting schools, markets and public houses; obliging all large business interests to pay weekly, and in cash, all their employees; limitation of hours of labor and of Sunday work; workmen compensation laws for injuries; total taxation of land; tariff laws intended to help the poorer classes; imposition of necessities such as the country does not cultivate and reformation of banking laws to permit the establishment of state banks. He also proposes giving the marriage contract a civil character, at the same time taking away all undue interference of state officials; acquisition of absolute divorce laws when both parties consent, and the general betterment of the working classes.

The company has constructed a new plant and intends to manufacture considerable quantities of the brand, using Georgia cotton seed oil for the purpose. Many Atlanta grocery stores Tuesday carried the new output.

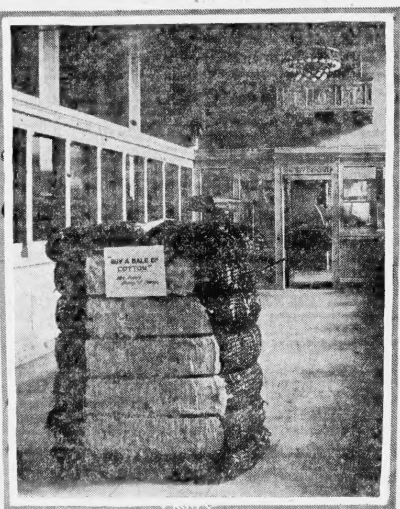

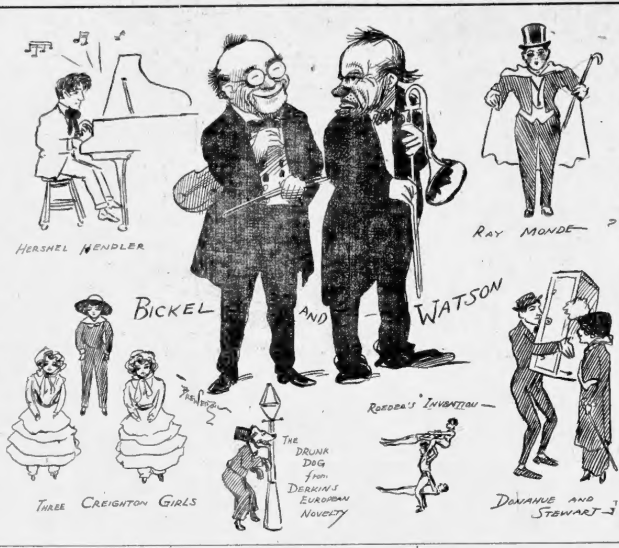
