**FOREIGN HOUSES BUYING
CAUSED RISE IN COTTON**

Market in New York Closed 13
to 18 Points Higher Than

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—The New York exchange was opened with a general rise in the cotton trade today. Trading was bare and foreign buyers and houses with foreign connections and after opening steady at 75.50, cotton rose to 76.50, a point higher, and to 10 points higher, making new high and closing at 77.50. Cotton futures and cotton futures spot markets over the holiday and in the early part of the year have been settling at the advance and fluctuations were to be under no important pressure.
