

YOUNG HUSBAND ENDS HIS LIFE WITH CARBOLIC ACID IN GEORGIA, SAYS PASTOR

Inquest Held Over Body of Fred Prince Because No One Saw Act

Because there were no eye-witnesses to the deed, an inquest was begun Monday at noon in Donehoo's undertaking parlor on the body of Fred C. Prince, who killed himself Sunday night in the Evidence apartments, 10 Castle place, while his young wife and baby sat in a sitting room.

Prince had been drinking heavily and his face and an empty phial and glass of smelling of carbolic acid, told Coroner Donehoo, who officially stated that he stated it was unmistakably suicide.

It is now three years, said deposed, married by financial troubles and shattered nerves, never having brought out the reason for her husband's death.

He came into his apartment at the Evidence Sunday evening about 7 o'clock, said Dr. Bricker, who was called in by his wife, who told her he was heavily. Mrs. Prince said she did not heed this, and when her husband told her he was too old to be a father, who was ill, Prince went into his bed room and locked the door.

Shortly after 9 o'clock Mrs. Prince became uneasy, as no sounds issued from the room. She might have gone to sleep, she said, but was worried, remembering a bottle of carbolic acid Prince had bought, which she had taken and had hidden.

A. C. Foster, a young dental student who boards with the Princes, was called on to break the news to the wife of Prince's bed room, reaching it by a porch roof but found locked, with the door fastened.

Foster then called the police. They broke in the door, and found Prince's body lying on the floor. He had taken 50 drops of carbolic acid. Dr. Bricker's sum on the face and mouth. Great hospital physicians and Coroner Donehoo were called.

The body was taken to the home of his mother, Mrs. L. J. Prince, of Knoxville, two sisters, Mrs. Gaines Call and Mrs. L. E. Ladd, and three brothers, Cecil Prince, of Chicago, and Harry Prince, of Atlanta, and Ladd.

The body is being held at Donehoo's, it will be sent to Knoxville for funeral and interment.

The Associated Charities of Atlanta's inaugurate a test that enables it to determine with the utmost precision of a chemical analysis between genuine and spurious applications for aid.

The test, which is the first to consist simply in offering an applicant an opportunity to earn his bread and butter.

When a man or boy applies to the Associated Charities for money to buy and maintain his wife and children, claiming he has tried to find work and failed and consequently is reduced to the last extremity, he is sent to the Friend's Rescue Mission on Decatur street, and the mission introduces him to a pile of men who have been given the power of authority to him to go to the workhouse.

The applicant accepts the invitation and gives the authority that extended, the mission provides him with three meals a day and a clean bed and clothing, and when he has earned his name and undertake to find better work as opportunity offers.

Dr. Bricker Believes Most Domestic Rows Could be Patched Up

It's easy to get married or get a divorce in Georgia. In fact, it's easier than in any other state in the union, in the opinion of Dr. Rev. Dr. L. O. Bricker, who passed Sunday night in the First Christian church, which he is pastor, on the topic "Should Married People Divorce?"

The question propounded in the sermon was answered by Dr. Bricker in this way:

"To obtain every possible means to make your married life a success and not disrupt it except for one just and sufficient reason—indeedly to the salvation of your soul."

He insisted that the petty bickerings and trials that generally lead husbands or wife to the divorce court could easily be patched up by the exercise of a little common sense.

He declared the first need to be a new marriage and divorce law.

Marriage is too careless and divorce is too easy, he declared. Dr. Bricker told of the unsuccessful efforts of the Atlanta Evangelical Ministers' Conference to get the Georgia legislature to pass adequate laws. The ministers wanted marriage license application to be made to the clerk of the county and the couple appear before the minister to be performed, a physical examination of the prospective bride and bridegroom, and a provision that if the defendant fails to appear, the plaintiff may acknowledge the allegations of the defendant, his or her disabilities are to be removed.

"In spite of the fact," said Dr. Bricker, "that this bill was the best, and the most carefully thought out measure ever presented to the Georgia legislature, was defeated. Had this bill been passed, it would have prevented eight out of every ten divorces granted by the courts."
