





CHILD LABOR CONFERENCE MARKED BY HOT DEBATE

Dr. A. J. McKelway Assailed
by North Carolina Editor
for Pamphlets on South

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—Dr. A. J. McKelway, southern secretary of the National Child Labor committee, and Davis Clark, a Charlotte, N. C. editor, had a lively clash at today's session of the eleventh annual conference on child labor.

Clark declared that until northern states had cleaned up their bar rooms, gambling and vice dens and Sunday theaters they had no right to complain that children under thirteen years were permitted to work in cotton mills.

"Plainly speaking, it is none of their business," said he, referring to complaints from Massachusetts and New York. He charged representatives of the committee with misrepresenting facts in the south, declared against national child labor legislation and urged the delegates to clean up affairs in their home states before taking part in the affairs of others.

Dr. McKelway replied to Clark. As to national legislation, he said, he had only to quote Clark's father, Chief Justice Clark, of the North Carolina supreme court, who had held child labor legislation unconstitutional. The committee, he said, had not exhibited to the public pictures of humanity wrecked by early employment, but he said the next generation would have living pictures of the effects. He charged that the committee had disseminated information that four and five year old children were employed in North Carolina, but he declared federal investigation had shown 15 per cent of the mill operators there violated the law by child employment.

The program for the morning session included addresses by Lewis T. Bryant, commissioner of the North Carolina department of labor, John Golden, president United Textile Workers of America, David Clark, managing editor, Southern Textile Bulletin, of Charlotte, N. C., Dr. McKelway and others.

Dr. P. P. Claxton, of the Georgia state board of education, and Julia C. Lathrop, chief of the federal children's bureau, were among those on the program for the afternoon session.

Tonight's session was to be addressed by Jane Addams, of Hull House, Chicago, Representative Murdock, of Kansas, and Senator Owen, of Oklahoma.

**NO APPLICATIONS FOR
GEORGIA COTTON LOAN**
\$135,000,000 Cotton Pool
Subscribed, But Georgians
Do Not Ask Loans

Not a single application for a loan has been made by farmers, merchants and bankers to the Georgia committee in charge of the state's allotment of the \$135,000,000 cotton pool.

The money has been subscribed, and the state committee has sent out notices that applications will be entertained.

Robert F. Maddox, chairman of the committee, could offer no explanation, except that possibly the rise in the price of cotton of about \$5 a bale since the pool was started has encouraged holders of cotton.

Mr. Maddox said that an advance of 5 cents a pound from the pool probably did not look as large now that cotton was selling around 8 cents as it would have when the price was much lower. He also suggested that as the notices had just been sent out, probably it was too early to test the feeling of cotton holders.



FINANCE COMMITTEE TO MEET MONDAY MORNING
Citizens and Heads of Departments Will Be Heard on January Budget

The new finance committee of council, of which A. W. Farlinger, councilman from the Fourth ward, is chairman, will hold its first meeting on next Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock to begin work on the January appropriation budget.

Chairman Farlinger announces that the committee will hear first from citizens, who are urging various municipal projects, and then from the various departmental heads. He anticipates the committee will be in continuous session probably for the entire week.

Interest in municipal affairs is centered in the January budget, for on it hangs the fate of all projects requiring an expenditure of the city's money during the year.

Councilman Farlinger declares that in making up the budget he will bitterly oppose the anticipation of any more revenue for 1915 than the city received during 1914. It has long been the custom of the finance committee to anticipate an increase in revenue, which has generally been justified by subsequent receipts, but Mr. Farlinger says that with general business conditions depressed the city would not be justified this year in anticipating an increase in revenue.

Often times the policy of the finance committee has held executive sessions, when it has heard the wants of citizens and department and is ready to actually make the appropriation.

Mr. Farlinger, however, has gone on record as having opposed the expenditure of the people's money behind closed doors, and says that he will fight to have open sessions of the committee.

Besides Mr. Farlinger the new finance committee is composed of the following members of council: Inman, Sewright, Keller, McDonald, Maddox, Johnson, of the Sixth, Armistead, Dunlap and Ragsdale.

And, too, the cold was intensified. The December average temperature here is 45 degrees. December 1913 showed an average of 46 degrees. December 1914 showed an average of 40 degrees. That meant more steam heat from our plant.


