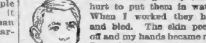

Break Big Windows and Narrow Miss Hitting Night Watchman

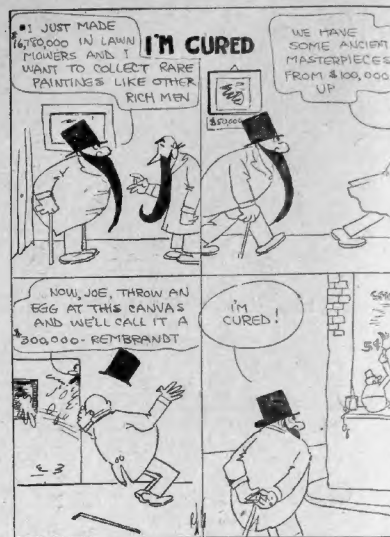
