## TWO STEAMERS REACH BREMEN WITH COTTON

H. M. Atkinson, Part Owner of One Ship, Confirms Reported Arrival

Further evidence that cargoes of cotton from the United States are getting into European ports without serious interference by any of the belligerent powers is contained in an Associated Press dispatch from London which reads as follows:

"LONDON, Jan. 18.—The Cologne Gazette of last Friday, a copy of which has been received here, announced that the steamers Denver and Greenhaur, loaded with American cotton, and which had been stopped by British warships, had arrived safely in Bremen and were discharging."

This dispatch was confirmed in Atlanta Tuesday by H. M. Atkinson, who is a part owner of the steamship Greenhaur, and two other capitalists being the chief stockholders of the Coast Steamship company, which owns and operates the Greenhaur and other vessels.

Mr. Atkinson states that the Greenhaur sailed from New Orleans three weeks ago with 6,000 bales of cotton, and good time. Considering the fact that her cargo was examined at sea by British warships.

Mr. Atkinson believes this vessel is the first to reach Bremen, a German port with no cotton embargo, and the war began. He states that she will have back a full return cargo and will sail again to Bremen with cotton.
