COUNSEL FOR BURNS MEN CALL ON GRAND JURORS TO TESTIFY

Effort Will Be Made to Impeach C. B. Ragsdale and R. L. Barber in Subornation of Perjury Case

TO AIR METHODS USED IN GETTING AFFIDAVITS

Eleven Jurors Obtained to Try Lehon, Tedder and Thurman on Charge Growing Out of Frank Case

Attorneys for Dan B. Lehon, Arthur Thurman, and C. C. Tedder, charged with subornation of perjury in the Frank case, have summoned eight or ten members of the present Fulton county grand jury for the purpose of impeaching, by their testimony, C. B. Ragsdale and R. L. Barber, who made the famous affidavits which resulted in the charges.

In the affidavits Ragsdale and Barber were charged with a negro answering Jim Conley's description could not be found, but that he had killed a white girl (presumably Mary Phagan) at the National Guard camp. Subsequently they repudiated the affidavits and made affidavits swearing that the negro was not found. The indictment of Lehon, Thurman and Tedder was returned on the basis of the first affidavits, followed.

Solicitor Hugh Dorsey has presented several indictments to several grand juries against the grand jurors who swore to the affidavits. They were recently before the present grand jury. One of the questions the grand jurors were asked, when the lawyers for the defense undertook to impeach Ragsdale and Barber, was what impression Ragsdale and Barber made upon them when they were sworn to the affidavits.

Two more jurors were secured Wednesday morning, making eleven all that have been sworn. The two are A. H. Dyer, treasurer of the Georgia Insurance company, and Eugene W. Hays, Jr., well known Atlanta lawyer. The other jurors secured Tuesday are: W. L. Jones, Jr., of Milledgeville; J. A. Wilson, of Peachtree; V. J. Smith, of Atlanta; William H. Jones, of Jordan; and Curtis S. Adams, of Atlanta.

After exhausting a panel of fourteen veniremen to get the two jurors secured Wednesday morning, the court took recess until more veniremen could be secured. Fifteen veniremen were summoned without result, and shortly after 11 o'clock the court took another recess until 1 o'clock to summon still another panel.

The veniremen summoned Wednesday morning were: Werner M. Jeffries, who was called by the state; and the late Captain L. M. Frank. He was accepted as a juror by the state, but was excused by the judge.

Out of the twenty-five citizens whose names were drawn, only five were found to be qualified. The others were found to be disqualified because they were not citizens, or because they were not residents of the county.

The court room was filled with spectators Wednesday. Every seat was taken, and the doors were closed, waiting to secure every seat that was available.

Steamer May Not Be Allowed to Land Food for Germany

Seizure of All Flour and Grain in Empire Makes All Foodstuffs Absolute Contraband, View of London Globe

(By Associated Press.)
LONDON, Jan. 27.—The decision of the German government to seize all flour and grain makes these foodstuffs absolute contraband instead of conditional contraband, as they were heretofore, argues the London Globe in its leading editorial today.

"We permitted food to be imported by Germany," the newspaper says, "provided it was intended for the civil population alone, but now that it is to be used for military purposes, it becomes absolute contraband and vessels carrying food supplies to the enemy's ports or neutral ports from which these cargoes are to pass into Germany, will do so at the peril of capture."

The editorial argues that in view of the new status of flour and grain the American steamer Wilhelmina, which sailed from New York January 22 with a cargo of food for Germany, has no right to land her supplies at Rotterdam.

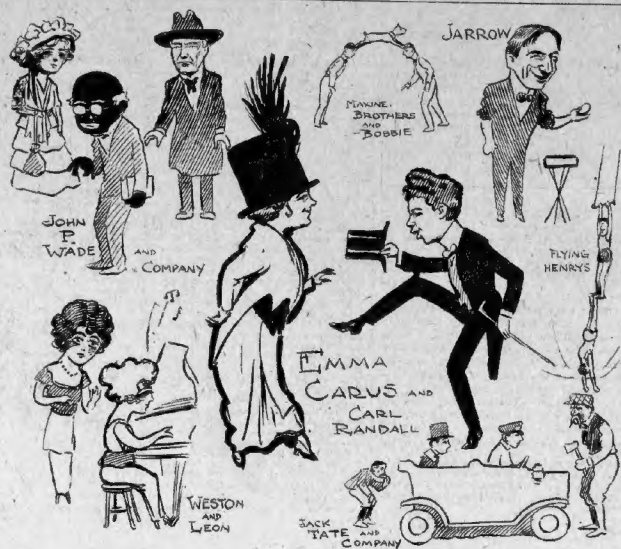

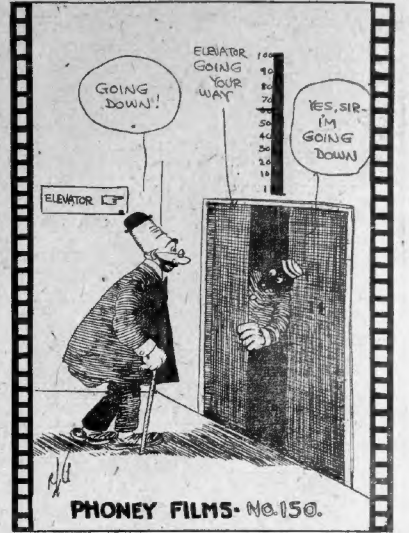
