## THREAT OF EMBARGO MAY OPEN UP SEAS TO NEUTRAL VESSELS

Hishman plainly presents what he considers a hint at an attempt to interfere with the American trade of neutrals through Great Britain or France.

Meantime, in spite of the statement of four British ministers involving the loss of four lives, Great Britain still holds off from sending food destined to Germany, as far as possible.

Believe it if this step is taken it will be postponed until the American proposal has been accepted at Washington.

Just what this proposal is, the public both here and in Berlin is unaware. It is, however, a proposal to be made by the American and qualified dispatches from Washington. There seems no doubt, however, that the British government is determined to declare food contraband at any time she deems it necessary, especially as Germany's so-called blockade has been extended to the point where it now covers all the seas.

GAZETTE STANDS FIRM.

"We are of the opinion that there can be no bargaining on this subject," says the Atlanta *Gazette*, referring to the latest American notes.

German Officials Discuss Late Note From Washington

BERLIN, Feb. 25.—High officials were summoned to a conference to consider the identical notes on marine warfare and the freedom of civilian populations sent by the United States to Great Britain and Germany. The meeting was held at the residence of Dr. Alexander Göttsche, the German chancellor. Göttsche, von Jagow, the foreign minister, was present.

Clash With School Board Over Normal School Salaries

Expected Thursday

Major Woodward is expected to clash with the board of education over salaries of teachers at the Normal Training school when the board meets Thursday afternoon.

The finance committee of the board in making up its salary lists for the month includes the salaries for teachers at the Normal Training school, and Major Woodward will likely be adopted by the board Thursday.

Major Woodward contends in calling \$4,500 from the school appropriation for salaries of teachers at the Normal Training school, but Alderman Jesse W. Armistead and several members of the board and the school administration say the amount was taken from the general school appropriation for salaries and do not admit that the salaries of the teachers at the Normal Training school were to be eliminated.

Major Woodward declares that the normal school was to be eliminated and that he will refuse to sign checks for their salaries. The school administration is not now legally established.

**WILL SIGN NO WARRANTS.**

Major Woodward, however, says he will sign warrants for the payment of the teachers in that school, and if checks are not out to cover the salaries of all the other teachers, he will sign those of the normal, I will hold up the whole business.

Major Woodward declares that the checks not being made separate, as the issue will be simply on the salaries of three teachers of the normal school.

Alderman Armistead, who has been leading the efforts to keep the school going to stand squarely behind the institution.

PLANNED FOR CONVICTS**

Shower Baths and Club Rooms  
Included in Equipment of  
Portable, "Cages"

Shower baths with hot and cold water, club rooms with books and magazines, composed are great pumping systems, composed of the greatest possible efficiency, which will be used for the comfort of Fulton county convicts with the portable cages which will be installed at one of the camps this spring.

Specifications and prices of these features have been drawn up at the direction of the State Board of Corrections of the State Board of County Commissioners, and will be presented for its approval at a meeting at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The committee, composed of W. Tom Williams, Oscar M. Williams, W. J. Lightfoot, Jr., decided some time ago to install the portable cars, called "convict cages" by some. While this decision met with protest from certain quarters and has resulted in bulletins from the American and Religion Forward movement, the committee went ahead with its plans.

When specifications were made and bids submitted, all of the latter were rejected and within the next ten days the committee had drawn up its own special ideas for the cars. Chief Engineer E. H. Evers, Superintendent of the State Penitentiary, Mr. P. C. Pugh, and Sheriff Charles C. Holland got together and the cars were built, and have made diagrams which they think will be approved at Thursday's meeting.

**FIRST AT SANDY SPRINGS.** It is proposed to install the new portable cages first at the Sandy Springs camp, which is on the main road, first moving the camp there. This probably will be done within the next month.

One of the committee's ideas is a special shower bath, which will be built by means of a pumping system. The installation of the baths will cost \$1,000, and the pumping system \$1,000. The pumping system at the Adamsville camp which will be used at Sandy Springs will be pumping system which will be worked by damming up a stream near the camp and running the water through a pipe.

The four portable cars for sleeping purposes will cost \$565 apiece. There will be a double decker tent which will hold a table and two bunks and aimes for the convicts. This tent may also be used for religious services.
