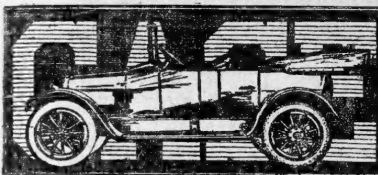

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Richard Madden, a tinsmith, alleged to be involved with Richard Peter Siegler, a German naval reservist, in a conspiracy to obtain Siegler an American passport, was arrested today by department of justice agents and arraigned before a United States commissioner. Siegler, arrested yesterday, is accused of having used Madden's name to obtain the passport. Madden is alleged to have permitted use of his name for a consideration.

MODERN CONVENIENCES PLANNED FOR CONVICTS

Shower Baths and Club Rooms
Included in Equipment of
Portable, "Cages"

Shower baths with hot and cold water, club rooms with books and magazines, compressed air water pumping system, comfort of the greatest possible kind—these are the innovations planned for Fulton county convicts, with the portable cage which will be installed at one of the camps this spring.

Specifications and prices of these features have been drawn up at the direction of the public works committee of the board of county commissioners, and will be presented for its approval at a meeting at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

The committee, composed of W. Tompkins, chairman; Oscar Mills and T. J. Lightner, Jr., decided some time ago to install the portable cage, called "cage cages" by some. While this decision met with protest from certain quarters and has resulted in bulletins from the Men and Religion Forward Movement, the committee went ahead with its plans.

When specifications were made and submitted, all of the latter were approved and within the last ten days the committee has had drawn up its own specifications for the cage. Chief Engineer P. H. Evers, Superintendent of Public Works W. A. Hannel, Jr., Purchasing Agent C. M. Holland and Varian Charles H. Givens, all together, considered the committee's ideas, and have made diagrams which they think will be approved at Thursday's meeting.

FIRST AT SANDY SPRINGS.
It is proposed to install the new portable cage first at the Sandy Springs camp, fourteen miles out the Roswell road, first moving the camp further out. This probably will be done within the next few weeks.

One of the committee's ideas is a special shower bath tent, with three shower stalls drawing hot and cold water by means of a pumping system. The installation of the bath will cost \$50, and the county already has three pumping systems at the Adamsville camp, which will be used at Sandy Springs. These pumping systems are worked by running up a stream near the camp and running the water through an elaborate piping arrangement.

The four portable cages for sleeping purposes will cost \$465 apiece. They will be used as a big club room in which will be a table books and magazines for the convicts. This tent may also be used for religious services.

MANY AUTOMOBILISTS PAY STATE LICENSE

More money was received in the secretary of state's office Wednesday than for any day in its history. Exactly \$1,000 was received. Practically all of it was for automobile licenses and the greater portion came from outside of Atlanta. More than 1,500 automobile numbers were issued at \$5 each.

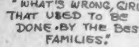
