GENERALS DIRECT WAR FAR FROM BATTLE LINE

Day When Commander Shared Danger With His Men Has Passed

THE HAGUE, Feb. 26.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The famous theme of war articles depicting a general surrounded by staff officers fearful for his safety, while he watches through his field glasses from some eminence within the zone of fire the fluctuating fortunes of his army—has become obsolete as far as the German army of the east is concerned.

Thirty miles from the front line along the far extended eastern battle line the various staffs sit at their desks surrounded by topographical maps and photographs giving the most minute features of the country where the fighting is under way.

When a line officer arrives at a staff headquarters from the actual front these maps are supplemented by his reports and the latest photographs of the enemy's lines taken from an aeroplane. When he returns he takes with him orders for the next movement of the units directed by this particular staff. The brains of the army are thus kept far from any danger even of shell and the only thing that makes the work of the staff any more dangerous than the deliberations of a war college during peace times is the remote possibility of becoming the target of a raiding aeroplane.

This machine like efficiency directing the actual fighting of the German army is duplicated in the organization of the rear guard communications. Already two permanent railroads have been built to Poland by the Germans, one to Lodz and the other down the bank of the Vistula as far as the German lines have been pushed. A through train daily is now run between Lodz and Mena, thus connecting the most distant points in the east and west now under occupation by German armies of invasion.

BRITISH AND GERMANS ARE WORKING FOR TRADE

Competition for Business in Latin-America Is Keen, Says Albert Hale

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Despite war in Europe, British and German trade representatives keep hard at work in Latin-America, according to Albert Hale, American cultural attaché at Buenos Aires. "A mass of a great deal of experience in South America," Mr. Hale wrote, "told me the business men of the United States were making a mistake in refusing to send traveling men into this territory."

"He assures me the English have about five men now to three on the spot soliciting orders for any kind of future delivery, as they are determined not to let the market slip away from them. He said that even some German houses were keeping their men active here, although he one could tell when they would be able to fill their orders. This may be mere gossip, but it indicates how eager European manufacturers are to keep the field well stocked."

STRAP-HANGER MAY BE SAVED ON HEALTH PLEA

New York Makes New Move Against Over-Crowded Cars

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(Associated Press.)—New York strap-hangers may come from an unexpected source—the health department. Dr. E. E. Goldwater, commissioner of health, with the approval of Mayor Mitchell, has undertaken to regulate crowded conditions on cars on the ground that permitting passengers to be crowded together is a menace to health. Dr. Goldwater has served mandatory orders upon the New York Railways company and the Belt Line Railway corporation to stop over-crowding on the thirty-sixth and fifty-ninth street cross-town lines.

The commissioner indicated today that if this campaign is successful it will be extended to relieve conditions on all the transit lines in the city, including the elevated and subway systems. Mayor Mitchell is a letter to Commissioner Goldwater has urged prompt action, declaring he believed the courts would sustain the plan "to obtain relief from the present notorious and intolerable conditions which offend not only against health but against decency."
