A. & W. P. 1915 TAX RETURNS TURNED DOWN

Comptroller General Holds Reduction of \$1,500,000 Is Not Warranted

Comptroller General William A. Wright has declined to accept the 1915 tax returns of the Atlanta & West Point railroad and they will probably have to be examined by a board of arbitration.

The railroad this year returned its taxes on a valuation of \$15,000,000, and \$14,500,000 last year, the difference being \$150,000. The reduction was explained by President Charles A. Wickesham on the ground that the state has heterogeneous property, and that the basis of earnings and that, due to the general business depression, there has been a reduction in the railroad's Point's earnings during the past several months, it is entitled to a reduced tax assessment.

In answer to this contention the controller general points out that the 1915 tax returns have been accepted by the assessors of 1914 and argues that if these were reduced now the state would be in a difficult position.

He also points out that the business depression is only temporary and says that there has been no reduction in general tax assessments throughout the country.

The general further says that the 1915 assessors have agreed to let the 1915 assessments stand the same as those of 1914 and says there have been no decreases except in instances where the railroad has been assessed or there is a reduction in the amount of cash on hand.

RAILROADS ATTITUDE.

The attitude of the West Point is made clear in a letter recently written to the Comptroller General by General Wright, which follows in part:

"Our total capitalization is only \$24,000,000, and we have no property which we offer to pay taxes on \$25,000,000 more than we have in property. This is not only reasonable, but it is also in accordance with the law.

"The law is not sought to tax other classes of property at more than sixty per cent of its value, and the railroad's capitalization is only \$24,000,000.

"It is a fact that we are not the highest and pay more taxes than any other road in the state; and our hill for taxes is about 10 per cent higher than the hill paid by the next highest road, while the general tax is only 10 per cent higher.

"We offer to pay taxes on our physical properties, and the Comptroller General has agreed to let the 1915 assessments stand the same as those of 1914 and says there have been no decreases except in instances where the railroad has been assessed or there is a reduction in the amount of cash on hand.



JITNEY BUS CLUB HAS OPENED HEADQUARTERS

Waiting Room Has Been Established for Patrons at 11 Walton Street

The Jitney Bus Club of Atlanta, an organization composed of individual owners of jitneys, has opened its headquarters at 11 Walton street and will announce cars leaving for the various points of the state and the purchase of gas, water, cigar, etc., and read magazines provided by the club.

All jitney buses operated by members of the club will meet their town turn around the block bounded by Peachtree, Walton, Broad and Martin streets.

A peachtree bus, for example, will turn to the right at Walton street, pass the bus turn, then swing around by the caller and take on passengers if any are waiting, and will then go on to Peachtree, then to Walton, then down Peachtree to Peachtree, and then north on its route.

Whitfield bus will drive to Walton and make the turn, then swing around the block and back to Whitfield, then go out Whitfield and its route.

A Mayfield bus will drive to Peachtree and turn north to the Walton corner, where it will swing past Peachtree and turn back to Peachtree street and on to its route.

A Decatur street bus will turn to the right at Peachtree and go up to the block and make the turn in the circle of the block.

Although all buses will, in this manner, drive past headquarters, the Rev. Mrs. Rosser, the Rev. Mrs. Rosser, will not prevent passengers from getting on the buses reach headquarters.

The club urges every individual owner of a jitney bus to join. The initial fee is \$100, and the monthly fee is 15 cents per day for each car operated. The club has thirty some odd members who own forty-five cars.

for a moment, its effect is soon dissipated. The fact
is, audiences of every rank and mixture are becoming
less and less susceptible to the bellowing school of
public speakers. The Courier-Journal truly remarks
that "a few plain words from Woodrow Wilson,
spoken without figurative bodily heat, carry much
more weight than a picturesque speech from Mr.
Cannon or verbal violence from Mr. Roosevelt."

The heart is often praised in contrast to the
head, and emotion regarded as more important than
reason. Yet, one of the biggest problems on this
bewildering planet is the proneness of men to feel
rather than to think. Thence springs prejudice, that
arch foe of all progress; thence come the terrible
and stupid masses of so many lives. One orator of
the Wilson type who can help men to think is worth
a legion of persipers.

Lesson of the Dyestuff Dilemma.

The stoppage of imports of dyestuffs from Ger-
many has thrown many American manufacturers
into a great perplexity. A thirty percent tariff duty,
maintained for more than a quarter of a century,
has failed to encourage and upbuild the production
of dyestuffs in the United States. From the protec-
tionist theory, one would expect that this industry,
butressed as it has been against foreign competition,
would be a giant. On the contrary, it is a dwarfish
weakling. The tariff, instead of fostering a home
industry, has merely added to the cost of imports,
and has left the country almost wholly dependent on
overseas resources.

"We have produced coal in abundance
and water, observe the New York World.
"We have land, soil, and could have secured
more, and have been educating chemists, and
could have borrowed plenty abroad; but some-
thing more essential was lacking. The boasted
spirit of American enterprise, the traditional
American initiative, in spite of the protection
assured by the high tariff wall, was not equal
to the occasion; and the rich market of this
great manufacturing country was abandoned to the
Germans because they wanted it and worked
it."

Driven to extreme necessity, we shall doubtless
remedy this situation. But it will be remedied
through self help, not through tariff patronage. It
will be remedied by science, whose skilful ministries
American capital is now favored to summon. The idea
that industries must be coddled by the Government
in order that they may get a start and thrive is ex-
ploded. Coddling does not protect or strengthen; it
merely sterilizes.
