(By Associated Press.) TOKYO, May 4.—The Japanese cabinet is quoted by the newspapers as saying the cabinet has decided to send an ultimatum to China, urging her to reconsider the decision to make no further concessions to Japan.

The ultimatum says the concentration of Japanese troops in Manchuria is a violation of the terms of the Twenty-One Demands.

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WAR WASTE OF CAPITAL PUT AT \$40,000,000

Greatest Test on Financial America Will Come When War Ends, Says Banker

(By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, May 4.—With the conclusion of the war, the greatest test on financial America, according to Alexander J. Hays, president of the Guaranty Trust company of New York, speaking before the Academy of Political and Social Science, Mr. Hays said that the waste of capital by the war estimated on a year's duration was \$40,000,000,000.

He discussed America's financial position as affected by the war, and after outlining how the country had reverted itself from a debtor to a creditor nation.

"The reversal in our financial position has been so sudden and complete that it really has been little less than a miracle. Most of our financiers have had little experience or training in international finance to meet the conditions involved in this sudden change. In addition to this lack of experience we had to cope with defective financial machinery. It was not until the national monetary commission published the result of its investigations of European methods that this country began to see how necessary it was that we should depart from archaic methods and adopt a banking system which would enable the creation of an acceptance discount market. These methods were wise findings of the commission were wisely incorporated into the new Federal Reserve law and comprises the chief measures of benefit that the country now derives from that act. Bank institutions have availed of this new feature in creating facilities to a larger extent than the national banks.

"London has not yet drawn an bill of exchange in order to pay that one some one may pride ourselves upon our progress. London financiers recognize our new efforts in the field of finance and applaud our aspirations. No obstacle from this source is to be expected. At the present time she is concentrating all her efforts on the one object of financing the war. Nevertheless, we must recognize that she will maintain an average of 100 per cent upon the market which she previously controlled, and our new dollar currency will be temporary unless we make our dollar exchange stable and durable.

"It is essential that our manufacturers who desire to export their goods should develop an efficient export organization. To this end they must study the markets which they desire to supply and be prepared to take the financial responsibility involved in the granting of credits and not leave this important feature to agencies. In the final analysis the manufacturer exports or must take the risks of export business rather than the foreign market. Our manufacturers desiring to export must understand that they must use the same intelligence in meeting foreign markets as they do in taking care of their domestic business. The main line of this business should, in the main, be done through New York.

"The conclusion of the war will create new conditions and the greatest danger will be made upon financial America. The destruction and wastage of capital occasioned by the war has been estimated on the basis of a year's duration at \$40,000,000,000 and while it may not be necessary to restore all of this at once, yet from present indications the demand on us will be enormous. First, there will be the call on our merchants to furnish materials in connection with the rehabilitation of the ruined and devastated country and, secondly, we will have to give credit either through making direct loans to the countries held abroad. From present indications the foreign investor will participate more actively in the reconstruction, and it is probable that the foreign countries will ask us for some of our gold in order that they may restore or help in their reconstruction. These demands upon our financial resources seem to present more than an active and firm money market. There is no doubt that the world will continue to practice economies and follow the sound business methods which we have recently learned, and we will not only have abundant resources for our prosperous business but also be able to take care of the reasonable demands of other nations.

Alies Shell Dardanelles and Smyrna Gulf Forts (By Associated Press.) ATHENS, May 4.—Via London.—The bombardment of the Turkish forts on the Gulf of Smyrna has been resumed, according to messages from Mytilene, and the warships of the allies continue shelling of the forts on the Dardanelles.

The allies are reported to have secured a landing near the site of the ancient Ephesus, a location thirty-five miles south-southwest of Smyrna.

Kaiser Sends Two Zeppelins to Aid of Austrians (By Associated Press.) ROME, May 4.—Via London.—The idea of sending two Zeppelins to aid of Austria, according to German news, has been repulsed to follow the Austrian army on the Adriatic.

First Reports Show Few Russians Captured in Galicia (By Associated Press.) VIENNA, May 4.—Via London.—War bulletins posted here today give some details of the Austrian-German victory in Galicia.

A large Austro-German army has been concentrating before Cracow for three weeks for a new offensive. All available Austro-Hungarian troops were quietly transferred during this time to the Danube front. The German army sent an unbroken stream of troops from the westward from Frankfurt, Berlin and other German rail centers. Newspaper correspondents were permitted to see the German army in Galicia in preparation and even to intimate that the blow would fall on the Carpathians. The assault was reported by the German press as a surprise. Final plans were approved at a conference in Berlin April 28. General von Falkenberg, chief of the German staff, and Field Marshal Hindenburg, chief of the Austro-Hungarian staff, were present. General Mackensen, commander of the German army, was not present. He was present, left for the front to take command of the new army that same night. So far as known Field Marshal von Hindenburg did not attend the Berlin council of war, although he visited German headquarters with General Mackensen shortly before.

It is too early to discuss the full military effect of the victory, but Austrian observers believe the German and Austrian strategists "got the jump" on the offensive which the Russians were continuing yesterday.

"In the eastern arena of the war, the number of Russians captured during the pursuit of the retreating enemy in the direction of Mitau has been increased to more than 4,000. A renewed Russian attack to the southwest of Kalvarna, north of Suwalki, Poland, has been repulsed. We took 180 prisoners. Russian attacks southeast of Austerlitz, where the enemy was believed to be planning, and of which we have heard nothing, are being watched.

SEEKS TO FACILITATE TRADE WITH NEUTRALS

British Embassy Issues Statement Designed to Help American Shippers (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 4.—British consuls throughout the country were today in receipt of an official statement from their embassy here designed to facilitate American trade with neutral nations by pointing out shipping how to prevent interference with cargoes not under the ban of the order in council. The statement recommends that shippers give notice to British consuls of the exact character of cargoes so the British government may be advised before the cargoes reach European waters.

While the United States does not recognize the right of the allies to interfere with legitimate trade between neutrals or with non-contraband goods even when ultimately destined to Germany or Austria, the state department, to assist shippers who wish to conform to the order in council, have printed the re-export lists of the countries contiguous to the belligerents. Publication of the list followed informal conferences between the state department and the British embassy with a view to guarding against unnecessary delays and detentions of American cargo ships by allied warships.

FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD LETS BANKS TRANSFER (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 4.—The federal reserve board announced that it has decided to grant the petition of banks in southern Oklahoma to be put in the Kansas City federal reserve district; that of banks in northern New Jersey to be put in the New York district; and that of Tyler and Wetzel counties, West Virginia, to be put in the Cleveland district.

The board denied the petition of banks in Wyoming and Nebraska which sought to be changed to the Chicago district. Decision on applications for relocation of reserve cities has been postponed.

BRITISH RED CROSS UNIT IS STOPPED AT MALTA (By Associated Press.) LONDON, May 4.—The British Red Cross unit en route to the front, has been stopped at Malta, where it was requisitioned for service in nursing British wounded.

\$500,000,000 INTERNAL LOAN FOR RUSSIA (By Associated Press.) LONDON, May 4.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Times says another internal loan of \$500,000,000 will be issued within a fortnight. Its success is assured.

Berlin Confirms Sinking of "Outpost Boats" by Britain (By Associated Press.) BERLIN, via London, May 4.—The official statement issued by the German admiralty in reference to Saturday's destruction of the "outpost boats" by the British version but describes the lost German ships as "outpost boats" which had been sent to the coast of the North Sea coastlines with a view to the destruction of the British coast guard vessels.

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HUGHES WILL NO BE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 4.—In view of the recent preference to the name of Associate Justice Hughes of the supreme court, as a candidate for the presidency, the following authoritative statement was made today in his behalf and with his approval: Justice Hughes wholly disapproves the use of his name in connection with the presidential campaign. Not only has he no desire to re-enter politics, but as a member of the supreme court he is not available. He is not a candidate in any sense and cannot permit his name to be used.

KRONPRINZ WILHELM IS TOWED TO PORTSMOUTH (By Associated Press.) NEWSPAPER NEWS, May 4.—The German auxiliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm left at 11:28 o'clock this morning for the Portsmouth navy yard. CAPITAL CITY CLUB TO BUY BROOKHAVEN SITE

Members Unanimously Authorize Purchase—Edward H. Inman Nominated for President of the Club—Election Tuesday

The members of the Capital City club at their annual meeting Monday night directed the club officials by resolution to purchase the Brookhaven country club property.

The Capital City club leased Brookhaven for \$100 per month with an option to buy for \$100,000, the option expiring June 1, 1915.

The purchase is endorsed. The offer was carefully gone over by a large number of the leading members of the Capital City club.

The plan for remodeling the club house was prepared by A. Ten Eyck Brown, the well known Atlanta architect. The carrying out of these plans will make it one of the most commodious and attractive country clubs in the country.

THE IMPROVED CLUB HOUSE. The basement will be enlarged and rearranged in such a way as to provide for large lockers, a bar, including 250 lockers and eight showers, giving a total of 500 lockers and sixteen showers, with a large lounge room between and with ample facilities for storing towels, bathing suits, etc.

THE NEW ROOF GARDEN. Above the first floor will be the best single feature of the remodeling plan—magnificently landscaped roof garden for dancing in summer and winter. It will have windows and screens, so that in summer it will give a breeze on four sides while in winter the windows will be closed and the roof garden heated.

These additions, together with certain changes in the exterior trim and with the necessary repainting and redecorating, will modernize the building and will afford numerous special features which are possessed by few country clubs in America.

Work on the golf course has progressed steadily since the Capital City club leased Brookhaven two years ago. The result that the second nine holes are now practically completed, and James McAnis, instructor in charge, is confident, estimates that \$7,500 will finish the full eighteen holes for play and maintain in course for a year.

It was the consensus of opinion among the leading members of the Capital City club that an up-to-date country club house and golf course were essential to the club's future success. The strong attraction exercised by a country club establishment was demonstrated by an increase of 300 members following the lease of Brookhaven. The offer made by the owners of Brookhaven seemed to every member who looked into it to be one which the club could not afford to decline.

Work on the remodeling will be started at once and will be completed in time for the use of the remodeled building during a large portion of the summer. In addition to disposing of the Brookhaven matter, the members Monday night nominated officers for the ensuing year. Colonel W. T. Gentry, the popular incumbent, declined to accept the nomination for re-election, and after a long vote of thanks he has been elected Colonel Gentry for his splendid services to the club. The nominations were accordingly made as follows:

ARBITRATION HASN'T PUT END TO STRIKES

MELBOURNE, Australia, April 27.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The theory that strikes, and other industrial disturbances can be avoided by compulsory arbitration, and the somewhat popular belief that Australia by reason of its employment of a virtually free from them, are given a somewhat negative answer by figures which have just been made available by the Commonwealth Statistician, G. H. Knibbs, covering the year 1914.

In that period the total number of industrial disputes was 237 against 291 in the year 1913, the increase being one almost wholly to labor troubles in New South Wales, mainly at collieries. The total estimated loss in wages was \$2,421,000 which was nearly 71 per cent greater than in the preceding year. In all 11,619 persons were involved. Since the outbreak of the war there has been no material reduction in the number of disputes. Indeed Mr. Knibbs figures show, the number of new disputes during the last quarter of 1914 was 178 or ten in excess of the average quarterly number for the years 1913 and 1914.

Italy's Expected Decision.

Washington advices from American diplomats in Europe indicate that Italy's long awaited decision in Europe is a matter of days. It is hinted, indeed, that arrangements already are being made to accommodate Italian interests at Vienna, Berlin and Constantinople, and that the Austrian and German navies at Rome are preparing to depart.

Since August last when Italy refused in the face of mingled threats and coaxings to join forces with her associates in the Triple Alliance, she has been expected to espouse the cause of Great Britain and France. The most that Germany and Austria have hoped for has been to keep Italy neutral, and that end German diplomacy has worked with every means at its command.

The allied fleet may enter the Dardanelles but not without knocking. England would no doubt do away with liquor if she could take it back after the war is over.

It is tough on the president, but still we feel better while he is sticking to the job at Washington. Our weather forecast is for more or less warm weather from now on, with indications that the month of May will not be as dry as April.

First in Foreign Trade.

Secretary Redfield's remark that no one would be surprised to find the United States ranking second in the world's foreign trade, or even first if the war continues long, is based on solid facts and deep-seated conditions. This country's exports for the last nine months have exceeded its imports by nearly seven hundred and twenty million dollars, and for March alone the trade balance in our favor was little less than one hundred and forty-one millions.

As the great Power at peace, the United States is called upon to carry forward the industries which she has checked in Europe and to render the service which the fighting nations have been forced to suspend. Not only are we furnishing quantities of war and supplies of food to belligerents, but also are entering markets from which British and German and French competition has withdrawn.

Italy is still on the brink of war, but isn't getting any dizzier as time goes on. All Europe is divided to three parts—Germany, the allies and the neutrals.

The fire of the allied fleet may not be terribly effective, but still one can imagine that life isn't very comfortable in Turkey just now.

Strict Accountability.

"The Government of the United States would be constrained to hold the Imperial German Government to strict accountability for such acts of their naval authorities, and to take any steps it might be necessary to take to secure American life and property and to secure to American citizens the full enjoyment of their acknowledged rights on the high seas."

So declare the United States some three months ago in its protest against Germany's "war zone" proclamation. It now seems that the time for "strict accountability" has arrived. The American steamer Guiflight has been torpedoed in the English Channel by a German submarine, and three of her crew, including the captain, are dead in consequence. Our Government will take no hasty or ill-considered step. It will act only upon complete, official knowledge of all the circumstances, and then it will act with foresight and self-control.

While producing its own foodstuffs the great empire is dependent on foreign sources for many kinds of manufactured articles, and before the war its trade of this character was chiefly with Germany.

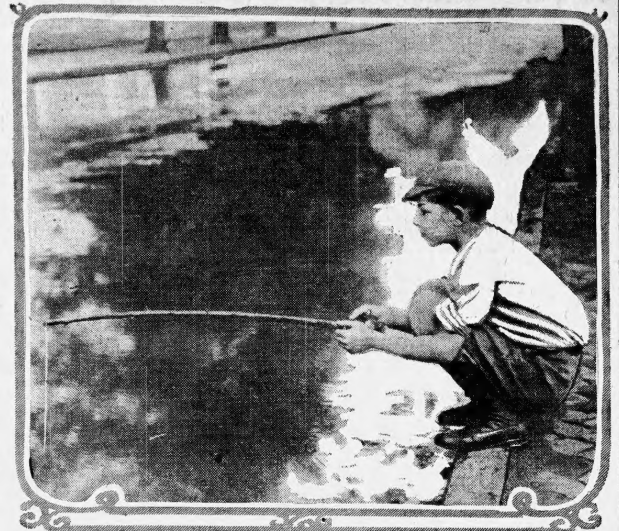
