"To meet this responsibility the school system must realize that the efficiency with which its work is done cannot be determined until those it has trained are in the midst of the activities of the next generation. Merely to train our boys and girls for the conditions prevailing at the present time is the greatest mistake a school system can make."

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SLATON IS DEFEATED; BRITAIN TO SUCCEED HIM AFTER JULY 31

(Continued from page 1) For June 22 it will remove the state in the needless trouble and expense of an election.

"In addition to these reasons, the association committee is opposed by certain forces in Atlanta in connection with the schools makes it wise for all concerned to wait for the final decision on this question. I shall ask the board of education, therefore, to give me more time for consideration before giving an answer."

The resolution was introduced by Mr. Hatcher and Mr. Moran. It reads as follows: "Whereas, the term of office of Prof. William M. Slaton as superintendent of the public schools of the city of Atlanta has expired, and it is deemed advisable to endeavor to secure the services of Prof. M. L. Brittain, state superintendent in this position, and Prof. Brittain is now necessarily employed in the duties of his office, and it is in a position to accept the election immediately, and it is the desire of the board to accept the election of the said Mr. Brittain as superintendent of the public schools of the city of Atlanta as follows: "First, That a committee of three be appointed by the president of the board to confer with Prof. M. L. Brittain and ascertain if he will accept the superintendency of the schools beginning on the 31st day of July, 1915, and report at the meeting of this board to be held on July 31, 1915, a special meeting being hereby called of this board at that time to be held at 10 o'clock a. m. at the place at 10 o'clock a. m. to hear the report of this committee, and to act thereon."

"Resolved, by the board of education of the city of Atlanta as follows: "First, That a committee of three be appointed by the president of the board to confer with Prof. M. L. Brittain and ascertain if he will accept the superintendency of the schools beginning on the 31st day of July, 1915, and report at the meeting of this board to be held on July 31, 1915, a special meeting being hereby called of this board at that time to be held at 10 o'clock a. m. at the place at 10 o'clock a. m. to hear the report of this committee, and to act thereon."

"I claim this resolution is illegal," he said, because it attempts to do those things. I make the point that it is out of order. The man, William M. Slaton, who is now superintendent of schools, was overruled by Major Guinn.

"The motion to move as a substitute," said Mr. Farrell, "that Mr. William M. Slaton be elected superintendent for a term of twelve months."

FORMAL VOTE IS TAKEN. On this motion Major Guinn called the vote and says: "The substitute was defeated by a vote of nine to three, the vote being as above stated. The vote then returned to the adoption of the original resolution. The yeas and nays were called and the resolution was adopted by a vote of nine to three."

"I now move that we go into the election of principals and teachers, since this is the day for those elections," he said.

The motion was lost and the board adopted another motion postponing these elections until a special meeting to be held on the 15th day of July. The board then adjourned.

The reason for drawing the resolution in the form it was drawn was two-fold. It was to accommodate the city of Atlanta which prohibits any person from holding office in the city government who at the same time holds any other public office of the city. Mr. Brittain could not have been elected Saturday, unless in the meantime he had resigned his present position. The date of July 31 was named in the resolution to accommodate Mr. Brittain. Should he accept the superintendency of the Atlanta public schools, he desires first to carry the affairs of his present office through the preparation of the legislative budget for the Georgia legislature this summer; and, furthermore, to carry the affairs of the Georgia legislature, a matter which would necessitate a special called session of the legislature, and thus put the state to a heavy expense. If he resigns during the legislature the government to name his successor, pending the next general state election.

MADE OPEN ELECTION. Major Guinn called the board to order at 10 o'clock. A full attendance was present. Major Guinn said it had been the customary rule of the board to hold all elections in executive session, but on this occasion he would entertain a motion to suspend the rule and elect a superintendent of schools in open session. Mr. H. T. Moran moved the motion and it was seconded by several members of the board and passed unanimously.

Major Guinn then read the resignation of Mr. L. M. Landrum as a member of the board, which position he has held in connection with his duties as state superintendent. The resignation was accepted and he was asked to act as secretary at this meeting, which he did.

Harvey Hatcher then introduced the resolution. As soon as he had finished reading it, Alderman Armstrong was on his feet with an objection. He stated that the resolution was out of order. Major Guinn overruled the objection and the man Armstrong then moved to table the resolution and the motion was carried.

LIMIT PUT ON DEBATE. "You will be allowed to do so," said Major Guinn. "But in this connection I desire to say that this is no time to spend in feeling and for that reason I shall, for the first time since I have been chairman of this board, in view of the rule limiting each member to one discussion of the subject under consideration and limiting his discussion to five minutes."

Alderman Armstrong then proceeded to speak in opposition to the resolution. "I object to this resolution because it is worded in such a way as to prevent me from nominating some other man for superintendent," said he. "The resolution elects Mr. Landrum as superintendent and then sends a committee to tender the position to Mr. Brittain. Such a thing is irregular and it is my desire to place in nomination the name of Mr. William M. Slaton for superintendent and under this resolution I cannot do so."

James L. Key followed Alderman Armstrong. He spoke in support of the resolution. "This resolution," said he, "proceeds

The meeting will continue until Wednesday. More than 200 prominent suffragists were expected to attend.

Chief of the subjects to be discussed, it was announced, is the policy of the national association in the next congressional campaign. The national association favors the Sharps amendment providing a referendum of the states on the question of suffrage, while the congressional union for woman suffrage favors the Briscoe-McKendall amendment, providing for nation-wide suffrage without referendum.

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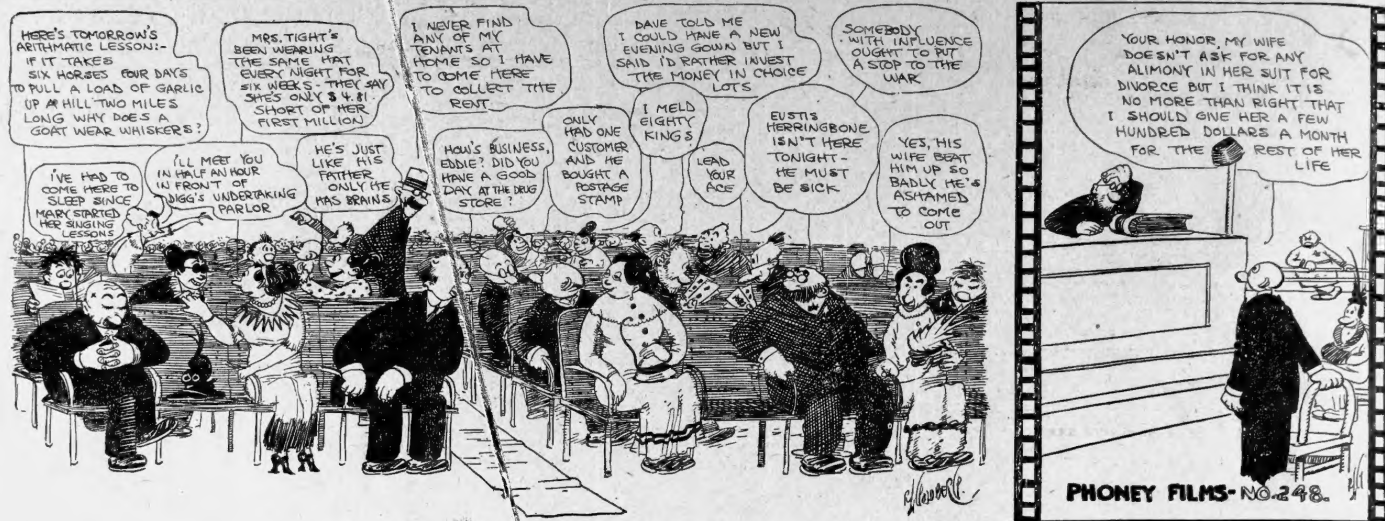
