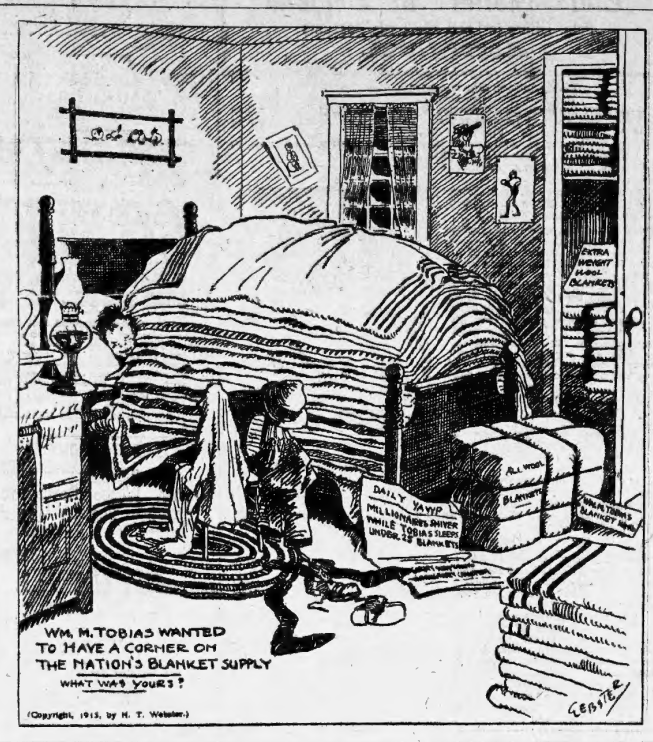

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DISPOSITION OF ROAD IS PUZZLE TO COURTS

It is Only Fourteen Miles Long but It Has Them All Busy

So complicated and involved have become the affairs of the Fitzgerald, Ocala and Brocton road, a four-mile line traversing a portion of Coffee and Irwin counties, that the combined efforts of the state courts, the federal courts and the state railroad commission will not, it appears, be able to untangle them.

The little road, which runs between Brocton and Ocala, was about two years ago placed in the hands of a receiver on a mortgage foreclosure to secure its bonds. Judge George, of the Ben Hill superior court, appointed E. H. Lamb receiver for the road. Mr. Lamb being receiver for the Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlanta, with which the road connects.

During the two years Mr. Lamb has operated the F. O. & B. railroad it has not only not paid expenses, but it has been unable to pay the rental on its engine, coaches, and is even in arrears on the salaries of its conductor, engineer, section hands and other employees.

For three weeks ago the engine and coaches, Judge Pardes ordered Receiver Lamb to withdraw this equipment from the F. O. & B. In the meantime Receiver Lamb, as receiver of the F. O. & B., applied to Judge George, of the Ben Hill superior court, for an order authorizing him to expose the road to public sale.

Two ways of sale were prescribed in the court order. First, the road was to be offered as a going concern, with its franchise and physical property, the purchaser to assume the obligation to continue the operation of the road. Second, the physical property of the road only was to be offered for sale, which included its coaches, rails, ties, etc., and which would not carry an obligation to continue its operation.

It was put on the block on the first Tuesday in June. There were no bidders under the first plan, but a Chicago concern bid \$3,000 for it under the second plan with a view to taking up the tracks and using the rails as scrap iron, it is said.

The sale, under the second plan, was reported to Judge George, who continued it. Before payment could be made and possession taken citizens from Brocton and other towns along the road, appeared before Judge George and applied for an injunction to restrain the purchaser from taking possession of the road's property.

Judge George granted a temporary injunction and set June 28 as the date upon which he would hear arguments on the application for a permanent injunction.

After the petition was filed Mr. Lamb, as receiver of the F. O. & B., took away from himself, as receiver for the F. O. & B., the engine and coaches, as receiver Judge Pardes' order. This left nothing to pull the train over the F. O. & B., and the operation of the road was discontinued.

Whereupon the citizens of Brocton and other stations applied to the central railroad commission for an order to compel Receiver Lamb to resume operation of the train and reopen the stations which had been closed.

Receiver Lamb has no engine and no train with which to operate the road. Last Saturday he reported to Judge George, of the Ben Hill court, that he had ordered him to take away the engine, but had no money to operate the road and asked Judge George to tell him what to do. Judge George has not answered his question.

The railroad commission has jurisdiction over the receiver, but it cannot "bleed out of a turnip," and it is at a loss to know how to afford the relief prayed for by the citizens along the road. In the meantime the road is not being operated.

SOUTHERN MAKES GOOD RECORD FOR SCHEDULES

A report Saturday from Vice President W. Miller, that of the 15,889 of regular passenger trains operated during the year by the Southern railway, 15,925 were on time, made schedule time. The number leaving and arriving all points on time was 15,193, or 83 per cent. Of 11,655 local trains run during the year, 10,854, or 93 per cent, made schedule time, and 10,447, or 89 per cent, were on time at all stations. Of 2,184 through trains, 1,782, or 81 per cent, made schedule time over the Southern tracks and 1,428, or 78 per cent, were on time.

And the contract was accepted by the board Friday afternoon, which wrote to Curry to come on Monday.

Some fear was expressed by snobbish-minded members of the board that Curry, fly-slayer, might be a filthy swabber of quarts of flies would be killed by him as fast as they were born, thus working a film-film fly same on the city. However, the majority of the board expressed faith in the liberate and dignified character of the unblemished Curry, and wrote to him to come on Monday.

Curry will have to kill from 2,600 to 35,000 flies a day to make 25 cents a day, 2,600 being the minimum and 35,000 the maximum of estimates of quart of flies submitted to the board Friday afternoon.

The increase in business of southern jobbers has been such, it was stated, that many of the dealers have reduced their sales force in this territory. This increase is largely due, it was brought out, to the fact that competition in all lines which southern firms offer to the best from other sections of the country.

Although manufacturers and commission men have shortened their terms to the jobber trade, the delegates expressed the opinion that the jobbers will not shorten their terms to great extent to retailers and that the usual discounts will not be changed.
