

Scores of Persons Killed in Storm Sweeping Coast

ZEPPELIN AIRCRAFT DOWN IN SUBURBS; TEN KILLED

PROPERLY DAMAGED AT GALVESTON REPORTED GREATER HAIN IN 1900

Death List at this Point Has Already Reached Thirty-Eight and Will Be Increased, Is Belief

MANY SOLDIERS KILLED AND HURT AT TEXAS CITY

Many Other Small Towns Along Gulf Also Suffered Heavy Death and Property Loss in Hurricane

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 18.—Scores of persons perished in the West Indian hurricane that swept Texas coast points, according to roundabout reports received here today from the stricken district. Eighteen soldiers, it is said, were killed at Texas City, the regular army camp near Galveston, and thirty or forty civilians also are reported dead. Sixty soldiers were reported killed at Texas City, eight from Morgan's Point and three from Sibley Beach.

Between fifty and sixty soldiers are said to have been injured at Texas City. Three are reported lost at Seabrook, near Houston.

According to the Houston Chronicle, a copy of which has reached Temple, Tex., J. R. Montgomery, a correspondent of the Chronicle, who viewed Galveston from the shore, reported that the property damage at Galveston will exceed that of the 1900 storm.

HOUSTON ALSO SUFFERED
Storm damage at Houston, according to the Chronicle, which was issued Tuesday afternoon, is estimated at \$1,000,000, but no official figures have been received.

Eight of the soldiers killed at Texas City were caught under the ruins of the Thompson building, a three-story brick structure. The others were drowned. Most of the two score odd civilians who are said to have perished were women and children. Military records have been established at Texas City.

State officials at Austin were busy today trying to communicate with Galveston. In the meantime, telegrams, blanketed with reports of the disaster, were being sent to the state capital. Rhodes, who brought an appeal for aid to Texas City, the bodies of eight women were found washed ashore at Texas City Tuesday. These bodies were supposed to have come from Galveston. Point Isabel, which yesterday was reported to have been flooded, is safe, according to a news dispatch from Texas City. The storm is said to have from Corpus Christi to Brownsville and no lives were reported lost.

COTTON DAMAGED
Damage, which is estimated will run into millions of dollars, has been done to the cotton crop in Texas by the storm. Monday and Tuesday reports received at Austin from towns in Texas state that where cotton was open in the fields it has been blown out and beaten into the ground by the heavy rain.

It is estimated that 50 per cent of all the cotton in this section was opened and that from one-fourth to one-half of the staple was lost.

"I Will Undertake to Bring Men Who Took a Hand in Lynching to Justice," Says Governor

BODY IS ON ITS WAY TO BROOKLYN FOR BURIAL

State Prison Farm Officials Held Blameless for Removal of Frank, Says Commissioner E. L. Rainey

Governor Nat E. Harris stated Wednesday that he will make every effort within his power to ascertain the identity of the men composing the mob that took Leo M. Frank from the state prison farm and lynched him in Cobb county, near Marietta, and to bring them to justice for their act.

"I am inexpressibly shocked," said the governor. "This affair places a blot upon the fair name of our state that can never be wiped out. The lynching will be probed to the bottom and every effort within my power will be made to bring the members of the mob to justice. At the proper time I will offer suitable rewards for the arrest and conviction of the men, and I will urge the judges, the solicitor and the sheriff to make diligent effort to apprehend them."

The governor cut short his visit to the reunion of the Confederate veterans of Georgia at Marietta and returned to Atlanta Tuesday night. In order to begin his investigation of the lynching without delay.

He will first hold a conference with the members of the prison commission to determine whether the officials and guards at the state prison farm should be held responsible for allowing the mob to take Frank out of their hands. He will also undertake, if possible, to obtain from the officials and guards some description of the men composing the mob. Then he will direct his attention to the apprehension of the guilty parties.

It was the operation known to the layman as blood transfusion, and tried at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning at the Grady for the first time in many months. At noon it was pronounced a success. The woman will live.

She is Miss Ida Bruce, twenty-seven years old, of 292 Courtland street. Last November she fell. She was injured so that from that time she suffered from internal hemorrhages. Weakened by loss of blood, she was taken to the hospital three weeks ago. Every means failed to change her anemic condition and physicians declared on the last report, blood transfusion.

FRIEND IS HERE
A cousin, E. L. Stewart, offered his blood, but when his artery was tapped Tuesday night coagulation set in and it could not be used. Then J. M. Stallings, a friend, volunteered. It was his blood which will be responsible for a life saved if Miss Bruce continues to grow better.

GEORGIA FARMS ARE IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

S. B. Turman Brings Optimistic Report After Trip to the Country

Good conditions on central Georgia farms are reported by S. B. Turman, who has just returned from a business trip to Jones and Spalding counties. If we have any sort of shipping facilities

"From what I saw and from what I learned from talking to farmers from various points," Mr. Turman said, "the cotton crop around central Georgia will show a reduction of 25 per cent and in some cases more.

"The stalk looks fine enough, but

where there ought to be twelve or fifteen bolls there are only three or four. Lack of fertilizers and drouth combined have caused this.

"Cotton is opening freely around Macon and is also opening between Atlanta and Macon. Farmers will not sell under five cents a pound, for the merchants, bankers and growers are co-operating.

"Cotton has been raised cheaply. The merchants have been unable to extend much credit and much of the cultivation has been done without hired labor. There has also been a great increase

"I found, too, that Georgia farms are attracting the attention of loan concerns. Western concerns which formerly loaned on farms out there are beginning to be afraid of the high land values, and at Macon several loan agencies have been opened to handle farm loans.

"Georgia farms are much cheaper than those out west, and there are other conditions more favorable to farming."

BUTTERMILK BACTERIA NATURAL, SAYS CHEMIST

First Instance in Atlanta, and Dairyman Not Responsible, He Says

Investigation by city authorities of the poisoning of a score of people Monday afternoon from drinking buttermilk has developed a case unique in the history of health and sanitation in Atlanta, according to Dr. Claude Smith, city chemist and bacteriologist.

This is the first instance in buttermilk of the formation in buttermilk of the poisonous bacteria, rare instances of this kind have been reported from other communities, generally about once a year, said Dr. Smith Wednesday, but never before has one occurred in Atlanta.

Dr. Smith went to the Forrest Park dairy, 113 1-2 Peachtree street, where the victims said they got the buttermilk they drank, and made a full investigation Tuesday.

"We closed the dairy temporarily," he said. "And poured out all the milk in the place. This was done with the full cooperation of the proprietor, who is very sorry the affair occurred and is doing everything in his power to help us. The Forrest Park dairy is one of the best in Atlanta. Although there is no city ordinance now providing, it is fully equipped with modern machinery and is modern in every respect. Since Tuesday we have allowed the dairy to distribute milk which has been tested since it was sterilized and bottled. The sweet milk we found to be absolutely pure, and the bacteria in the buttermilk a natural, though injurious product. It was not the fault of the dairyman that the bacteria formed.

"Buttermilk is always formed of bacteria. Millions go to make it, but these millions are generally harmless and, indeed, beneficial. At rare intervals bacteria will get into it which are harmful. Such cases have been known in other cities. I do not know of any that ever happened before in Atlanta." Discussing dairy sanitation here as a whole, Dr. Smith said the conditions in this summer have been the best in the city's history. The amount of bacteria in sweet milk is a much lower percentage than last year, he said, and Monday's affair was the first reported from buttermilk.

Of the several people taken to Grady hospital suffering from acute indigestion, believed to have been caused by the buttermilk, all had fully recovered Wednesday and were back at work.

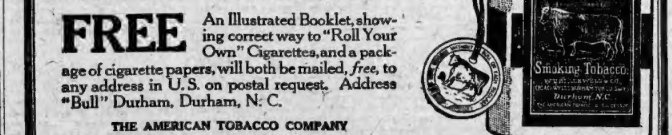

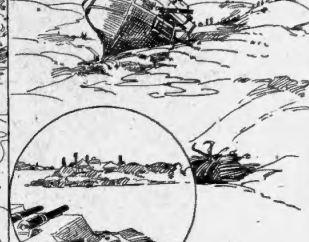

Twelve Soldiers Killed; Eight Others Perish at Texas City

(By Associated Press.)

Twelve soldiers were killed at Texas City during last night's storm when the Thompson building, a new three-story structure, collapsed. Eight soldiers were killed by falling brick, while four drowned. About thirty or forty civilians, including women and children, also lost their lives.

Those killed were enlisted men and commissioned officers lost their lives. Military rule has been established at Texas City and the soldiers are fishing out the bodies of the dead from the wreckage of the water as fast as they can be located.

The first rumor to reach Houston was that between 200 and 250 soldiers were killed, but this report was denied by Major and T. J. Moran, who reached Houston late Tuesday after making a trip to Texas City in an automobile.

He said that the soldiers lost their lives and property as many were injured.

Eight men are reported dead near Texas City. They were drowned while fishing. Reports reach that there were an authentic source that the bodies of a woman, a baby and a sailor had been found near Sylvan. They were identified and apparently had floated from some place on the bay.

Galveston Partly Wrecked; Conditions Worse Than 1900

(By Associated Press.)

HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 18.—(Via Telegram and telephone to Dallas.)—The Houston Chronicle prints the following interview with J. R. Montgomery, Houston correspondent of the Galveston News, who got as far as Virginia Point, the north end of the causeway, Tuesday, and viewed the wrecked city of Galveston.

I am confident the number of dead in Galveston is large. I could not see the elevator on the port side of the city and my opinion is that the number of buildings destroyed will run into thousands. I believe the property loss will be greater than that of 1900.

Montgomery made his way to the draw bridge of the Galveston causeway, and seeing to the fact that this structure was swept away, he was forced to return to Houston. The man made the trip in an automobile.

"We encountered indescribable conditions," he said. "The road bridges at Clear Creek and Dickinson were washed out and we ran our automobile over the railroad tracks and across the ties. We saw thousands of bales of cotton on the prairie all the way from Virginia Point to the town of La Marque, far inland. These were washed into Galveston docks by the great tidal waves."

The water must have been several feet over the causeway and serious damage must have been done to it by the washing out of large quantities of fill in the center."

The railroad drawbridge has been washed away at Seabrook, about twenty miles from Houston. Three persons are reported to have lost their lives at that point.

\$1,000,000 Damage Is Estimated in Houston

(By Associated Press.)

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Aug. 18.—A copy of the Houston Chronicle, Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon received here early today, estimates the storm damage in that city at about \$1,000,000. No mention is made of loss of life in Houston, but it is stated that persons were drowned at Laguna, 20 miles southeast of Houston, on Trinity Bay.

This is the first authentic report of deaths on the Texas coast due to the tropical storm to reach the outside world.

RUMORS OF BIG WAR LOAN BOOSTS FOREIGN EXCHANGE

U. S. May Not Approve Bankers' Plan to Furnish the Allies \$500,000,000

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Reports that negotiations were underway for the flotation of a big foreign loan here improved strength to the foreign exchange market today, notwithstanding the opinion in well informed circles that a remedy for the situation was no nearer than several days ago.

Two questions loomed large in the discussion of American bankers attempting to underwrite a loan to Great Britain or her allies of from \$300,000,000 to \$500,000,000. These questions were:

Would the Washington administration regard the underwriting of such a loan as tantamount to the spirit of neutrality?

Could a loan of these huge proportions be placed in this country, if underwritten on terms that Great Britain could afford to grant?

International bankers recalled the attitude taken by Washington early in the war when the subject of a large French loan was broached. They remembered that J. P. Morgan then went to Washington and when he returned the loan was not placed.

Since then several loans to France and Great Britain have been placed, but for only nominal sums and they were distinctly of a credit character. Since then European buyers have flooded American manufacturers with war orders, so that bills coming due ran into the hundreds of millions.

Matters have reached a stage, in the belief of financiers, where there must be little further delay in providing the way to pay these bills. Failure to do so, it is believed may result in heavy curtailment of American shipments abroad.

Reports current in Wall street today, cabled from London over night that Great Britain and her allies were said to be contemplating shipment of \$100,000,000 gold to the United States were received with skepticism. Not only would such shipments be without parallel, but even if made, they would have to extend over a long period, and the debt then probably would be as large as ever.

These and other considerations, it was learned, were acting as a brake on negotiations while the plans to relieve the situation seemed to mark time. The markets showed a tendency to strengthen and took on a quieter tone and appearance.

Speculating opened at a range of from 4.65 to 4.85 1-2. France showed the decided advance of 1 cent from yesterday's low record, being quoted at 4.95 opening at 5.30, while lire were correspondingly stronger at 6.45.

Later, bills on London and Paris showed greater strength, demand sterling being quoted at 4.47 1-4 and Paris checks at 5.97 1-2.

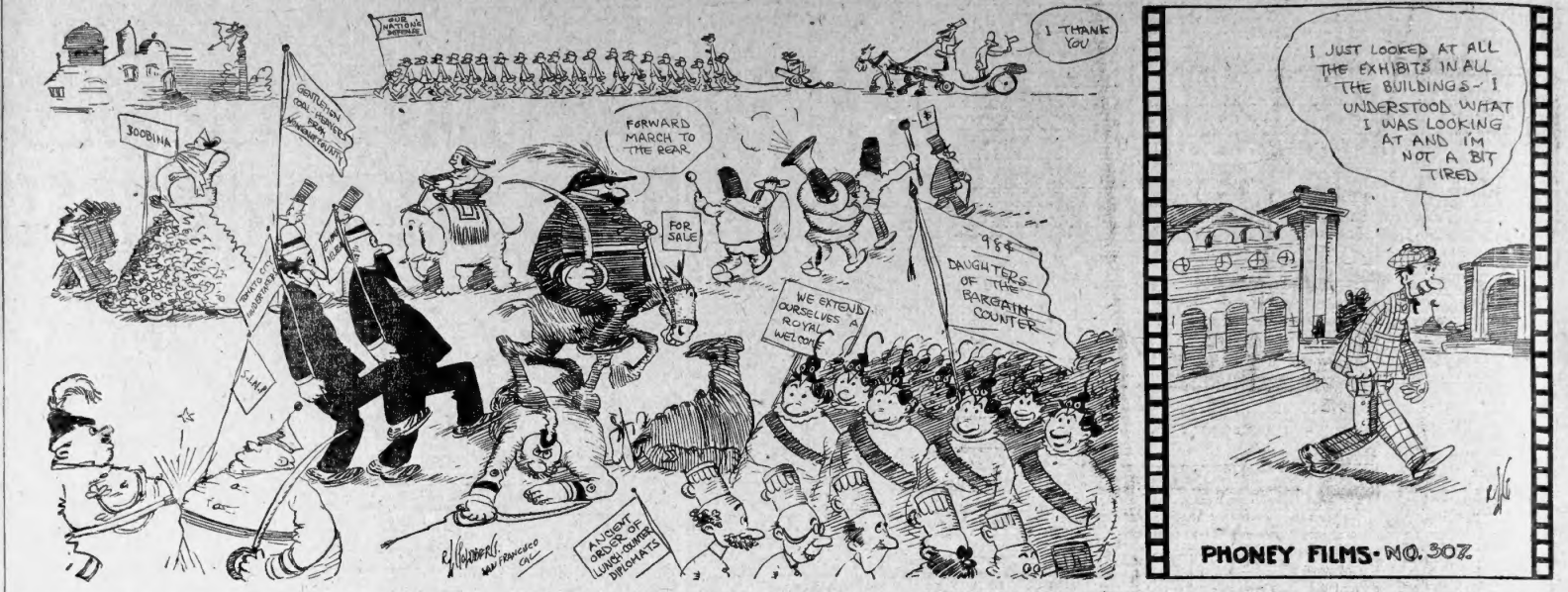

Slaton Says Lynching Better Than Judicial Murder

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—In an address yesterday to the San Francisco center of the California Civic League, former Governor John M. Slaton of Georgia, who committed the death sentence of Leo M. Frank to life imprisonment, declared he would prefer to have Frank lynched by a mob than to have him hanged by judicial mistake, because "one reached the soul of civilization the other merely reached the body."

Mr. Slaton's address, devoted almost entirely to discussion of the Frank case and the lynching of Frank, was delivered in the presence of a majority of members of the California supreme court and other prominent persons.

State Farm Officials Are Held to Be Blameless

MILLEDGEVILLE, Ga., Aug. 17.—Prison officials here are held to be without blame for the lynching resulting from the taking of Leo M. Frank from the Georgia state penitentiary by a mob numbering about twenty-five men, in a statement given out by R. E. Davidson, chairman of the state prison commission, Mr. Davidson with the other two members of the body, Commissioner H. H. Hines and Patterson, were here to inspect the penitentiary when Frank was taken away.

The prison commission has full power, not excepting that vested in the governor, to conduct or order any investigation that it may deem fit.

Mr. Davidson is accredited with the statement that as the mob worked quickly and was so well organized and immediately upon its arrival at the prison so completely controlled the situation that "no responsibility rested upon either the commission or anybody at the farm."

Some comment was heard here as to why the mob had to deal with five men—the warden, the superintendent, two guards and a "trusty" in charge at the farm.

That Warden J. E. Smith and Superintendent J. M. Barker were powerless with facilities they had at hand when the mob arrived is not questioned here. Barker said the mob numbered about twenty-five men; Smith said about six minutes.

First all wires were cut at the prison. Then Warden Smith was made prisoner of a part of the mob while another squad handcuffed Barker and him to the gate they wished to enter. A command to "trusty" to open the gate was demurred to, but a threat to kill him if he did not open immediately quickly gave the mob easy access to the inside.

As the gate was opened a guard came up. He was overpowered. Another guard was murdered, but was soon at the mercy of the mob. Frank was grabbed by five men, according to reports, hurried outside and thrust into the tonneau of an automobile along with the one rope that was dangled in front of his eyes.

He did not utter a word. An occasional groan escaped his lips, but no word. What he said, if anything, during the five or six-hour trip from Milledgeville to the outskirts of Marietta probably never will be known.

Secretary Daniels Deplores Lynching of Leo M. Frank

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels said today in a formal statement denouncing the lynching of Leo M. Frank as the worst blot on the name of Georgia and declaring it would be more sincerely condemned in the south than in any other part of the republic.

WARDEN SMITH TALKS.

Warden J. E. Smith, of the state prison here, said today that he knew of nothing he could do that would aid in whatever investigation might be made of the kidnapping of Leo M. Frank from the prison Monday night.

"I don't know of anything I can do, do you?" Mr. Smith said. "The mob overpowered me and everyone connected with the prison that stood in its way. The work was done too quickly and we were taken too much by surprise to offer resistance."

"I am very glad members of the prison commission were here when the attack occurred. Two of them told me no one at the prison was to blame."

Several persons went to the prison yesterday to ascertain definitely the movements of the mob. Conditions were normal at the prison today.

"The public is entitled to all facts in this case, and if any have been withheld I would gladly give them out. The newspapers have told the story correctly, as far as I know, and have covered every detail. There is nothing left in my knowledge to be brought out at an investigation."

A number of persons went to the prison yesterday to definitely ascertain the exact movements of the mob. Warden Smith said they all were orderly. Prison routine was being performed as usual as if nothing had happened, he added.

Little Interest Manifested as Body Passes Through State

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Aug. 18.—The body of Leo M. Frank, the noted Georgia prisoner, who was lynched from the state farm and put to death by a mob near the home of his alleged victim, Mary Phagan, last yesterday morning, was on board a Southern railway train passing here at 10 o'clock this morning en route to Brooklyn for burial. The body was accompanied by Mrs. Frank and her brother, Rabbi David I. Marx, A. E. Marcus, H. A. Alexander and Herbert Haas, the last two named being attorneys who defended Frank through the courts.

According to members of the train crew little interest was attached to the trip through Georgia and only a small crowd of curious was present in this city while the train remained here.

Mrs. Frank refused to see newspaper men.

No Funeral Arrangements Yet Made in New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—No arrangements have as yet been made for the funeral of Leo M. Frank, whose body is expected to arrive here early tomorrow. His parents today requested that they be left alone to bury the body of their son as quietly as possible.

Marietta Is Quiet Following Lynching

MARIETTA, Ga., Aug. 18.—Further efforts to investigate the lynching of Leo M. Frank on the outskirts of this town yesterday had been taken by tonight. Official opinion here is that Milledgeville and not Marietta should be the scene of any investigation other than that conducted by the coroner's jury.

Mayor Woodward Gives His Views of Lynching

(By Associated Press.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—J. G. Woodward, mayor of Atlanta, Ga., in an address here last night, declared that Leo M. Frank suffered the "just penalty for an unappealable crime."

Mayor Woodward's address was made at a banquet of the California State Assessors' association.

Little or no applause greeted his remarks, although he was listened to with close attention.

Mr. Woodward said: "I am going to take occasion tonight to tell of the events that have put Georgia on the map in a very undesirable light. I am going to endeavor to tell you right. People throughout the United States have obtained their ideas of the Frank case from a poisoned and subsidized press and press reports."

"Common decency prevents me from telling you the revolting truths of the murder of Mary Phagan. I wish you all know the truth as I know them. I know them, for I have been with this case ever since it started, and I have read every line of evidence that was introduced. I know that there is not a member of the jury that tried Leo M. Frank who would change his decision if put to the test again."

"Georgia is the leading state of the south. Its people cannot be classified with tramps, hoodlums, bandits and lawbreakers, but things had come to a point where every avenue of the law had been exhausted and the judgment of the courts set aside by one man, and the people felt that it was up to them to take the law into their hands."

"While we people of Georgia deplore this deed of Monday night, we know what is behind the feeling that prompted it, and I want it understood that it is simply emphasizing the fact that when it comes to a woman's honor there is no limit we will not go to avenge and to protect."

"There were only two people implicated in the death of Mary Phagan. I know the negro did not commit the deed, and am positive that 75 per cent of the people of Georgia are convinced that the man lynched Monday night committed the deed, and they are on the ground and ought to know."

"As mayor Atlanta, I have received many and true letters and petitions and requests asking that something be done for Frank, and they have all gone into the waste basket, for like all Georgia people who are in a position to get at the truth, I know the facts."
